



1. GENERAL


- 1.1. Introduction. The United Fire Protection PREACTION-PAC is a fully assembled and factory tested pre-action fire suppression system, including pre-action valve, trim, and control panel providing one complete zone of pre-action water sprinkler fire protection. All components are contained in two steel enclosures assembled one above the other. The system pressure gages and the required manual release handle are mounted on the front of the lower enclosure. The system detection and control panel is mounted behind a door in the upper enclosure with a clear polycarbonate window allowing visual access to the system indicators. Lockable latches on both doors permit authorized access to all system components. Both enclosures are finished in powder-coat red paint. Gasketing provides sealing of the enclosure doors. Knockouts permit easy attachment of external electrical conduits.
- **1.1.1.Pre-Action-Valve.** The pre-action valve installed in the PREACTION-PAC is a low-differential, latched clapper valve that uses a unique direct-acting diaphragm to separate the system water supply from the system piping. The positive latching system uses the supply water pressure to hold the clapper shut. When the water pressure in the diaphragm chamber is released, the latch retracts from the clapper and the valve actuates. The low differential and unique latch and actuator design of the valve allows the valve to be self-resetting.
- **1.1.2.Piping.** Water inlet pipe connections are located on the lower left and lower right sides and the upper right corner of the lower enclosure. (NOTE: Assemblies equipped with 1/2HP compressors do not have upper right corner inlet connection.) The unused inlets are left plugged. Grooved pipe is used for the inlet connection. The water outlet pipe connection is located at the top center of the lower enclosure, behind the upper enclosure. The drain connection is accessible within the lower enclosure, and knockouts are provided allowing exit of the drain from either side. All pipe connections are done in the lower enclosure.
- **1.1.3.Control Panel.** A Fenwal FN-6000 addressable releasing control panel is factory-installed in the upper enclosure. Programming for a basic pre-action system is factory programmed and tested. Additional programming may be necessary after installation to suit field conditions. This manual provides complete instructions for additional programming. All necessary internal wiring connections are factory-installed and tested.
- **1.1.4.Wiring.** All wiring from the integral control panel to the valve solenoid and all switches is factory installed and tested. Wiring for compressor power and control is also factory installed and tested. All field wiring for control panel power, compressor power, detection circuits, notification appliance circuits, and circuits requiring contact closure is connected to terminal strips in the upper enclosure. No access to the lower enclosure is necessary to complete the wiring installation.
- **1.1.5.Compressor.** The compressor for air pressurization of the pre-action sprinkler piping is preinstalled, wired and adjusted. Three sizes of compressor are available, depending on the volume of installed piping to be pressurized. The compressor is mounted using molded rubber mounts and bushings to minimize noise and vibration during motor operation. A compressor disconnect switch is located in the upper enclosure.

1.2. Features

- **1.2.1.**Attractive and rugged metal enclosure. The entire enclosure is manufactured from steel with continuous welded seams. The lower enclosure is 12 gage, while the upper enclosure is 14 gage. Both enclosures are coated with red powder-coat paint inside and out. Continuous piano-style hinges attach the doors to the enclosures.
- **1.2.2.**Easy-to-see gages on front of enclosure. Three pressure gages are mounted on the front of the lower enclosure, and are visible at all times. These gages monitor the air pressure in the system piping, the water supply pressure up to the pre-action valve, and the water pressure keeping the valve clapper piston closed.
- 1.2.3.Easy access to manual release valve. The emergency manual release ball valve is located behind a small unlocked door on the front of the lower enclosure. Operation of this ball valve opens the pre-action valve, filling the system piping with water. No power is necessary to accomplish this

operation. The key for the lower enclosure main door does not have to be available to accomplish this operation.

- 1.2.4.Lower and upper water inlet connections. The water inlet piping may attach to the lower enclosure either near the bottom on either side, or to a pre-piped upper inlet at the top of the lower enclosure. (NOTE: Assemblies equipped with 1/2HP compressor do not have upper inlet connection.)
- **1.2.5.**Easy-to-follow instructions on enclosure front. System instructions, mounted behind clear plastic, are located on the front of the upper enclosure.
- **1.2.6.**Space for required spare sprinkler heads and wrench. As required by NFPA 13, a built-in storage location for spare sprinkler heads and a sprinkler wrench is behind the door of the upper enclosure.
- **1.2.7.**Separate mechanical and electrical enclosures. This allows mechanical and electrical trades to keep their work areas separate.






Figure 3 – Diagram - Functional Description

1.3. Functional Description. Refer to Figure 3 on page 4.

- **1.3.1.Control panel (1).** The control panel receives signals from fire detectors located in the protected space, as well as signals from various switches within the assembly. The panel processes the input signals per a pre-determined sequence of operation, and operates outputs for external audible / visual devices and building fire alarm signaling, as well as the signal to open the pre-action valve within the assembly. Refer to the control panel instruction manuals in Section 4 for details on the panel and the sequence of operation.
- **1.3.2.Terminal strip (2).** The terminal strip provides a convenient point for landing some of the required field wiring, and also serves as the interface point between the control panel (1) and the various connections in the lower enclosure.
- **1.3.3.Pre-action valve (3).** The pre-action valve is the heart of the assembly. The valve holds back the sprinkler water until the control panel (1) reacts to the signal from the fire detectors and sends a signal to the valve actuation solenoid (4). In single-interlock assemblies, actuation of the valve actuation solenoid (4) sends water into the sprinkler pipe. In double-interlock assemblies, fusing of a sprinkler head from heat is required, along with valve actuation solenoid (4) actuation, to send water into the sprinkler pipe. Refer to Manual I-769P in Section 2 for more detailed information on the pre-action valve.
- **1.3.4.Valve actuation solenoid (4).** The valve actuation solenoid receives the signal from the control panel (1), and actuates the pre-action valve (3). The solenoid is the Victaulic Series 753-E, and is rated at 24VDC, 0.364 amps, 8.7 watts, 66 ohms. The solenoid is FM Approved under Group I (as in India). Refer to Manual I-769P in Section 2 for more detailed information.
- **1.3.5.Waterflow signal switch (5).** The waterflow signal switch responds to waterflow in the pipe downstream of the pre-action valve (3). The switch contains Quantity 2, SPDT switches, rated at 10A-125/250VAC, 1/2HP, 2.5A-6/12/24VDC. Contacts transfer when waterflow begins after pre-action valve opens. Contacts automatically restore when waterflow ceases. One contact is factory-wired to send a signal to the control panel (1). Refer to the control panel instruction manuals in Section 4 for details on the response of the panel to the waterflow signal switch.
- **1.3.6.Manual shutoff valve (6).** The manual shutoff valve is used to shut off the flow of water after actuation of the pre-action valve (3). The normal position of this valve when the system is in service is open. Refer to Manual I-769P in Section 2 for more detailed information on the use of this valve.
- **1.3.7.Shutoff valve tamper signal switch (7).** The shutoff valve tamper signal switch sends a supervisory signal to the control panel (1) when the manual shutoff valve (6) is closed. The switch contains Quantity 2, SPDT switches, rated at 10A-125/250VAC, 0.5A-125VDC. Contacts transfer when valve begins to close. Contacts restore when valve is fully open. One contact is factory-wired to send a signal to the control panel (1). Refer to the control panel instruction manuals in Section 4 for details on the response of the panel to the shutoff valve tamper signal switch.
- **1.3.8.Compressor (8).** The compressor supplies supervisory air pressure to fill the sprinkler pipe downstream of the pre-action valve (3). The sprinkler pipe is pressurized to 13 PSIG minimum and 18 PSIG maximum by the compressor (8). Loss of this pressure, from damage to the pipe or a sprinkler head, results in a supervisory signal at the control panel (1).
- 1.3.9.High / low air pressure limit switch (9). The high / low air pressure limit switch is built in to the compressor (8). When pressure in the pipe falls below 13 PSIG, the switch turns the compressor (8) on. When pressure in the pipe rises to 18 PSIG, the switch turns the compressor (8) off.
- **1.3.10. Low air pressure signal switch (10).** The low air pressure signal switch sends the supervisory signal for low air pressure to the control panel (1). The switch contains Quantity 2, SPDT switches, rated at 10A-125/250VAC, 1/2HP, 2.5A-6/12/24VDC. Contacts transfer when pressure in the piping falls below 13PSIG. Contacts automatically restore when pressure rises above 13PSIG. One contact is factory-wired to send a signal to the control panel (1). Refer to the control panel instruction manual in Section 4 for details on the response of the panel to the low air pressure signal switch.
- **1.3.11.Compressor disconnect switch (11).** The compressor disconnect switch is used to manually interrupt the 110VAC power to the compressor motor, during inspection, maintenance, and

resetting of the assembly. Only trained personnel should use this switch. The normal position of this switch when the system is in service is ON.

1.3.12. Manual station valve (12). The manual station valve is located behind a separate door on the front of the lower enclosure. No key is needed to open this door. To manually open the pre-action valve (3), open the door and pull the lever on the manual station valve forward. The pre-action valve (3) will open, and the sprinkler pipe will fill with water. No power is needed to manually open the pre-action valve (3) in this manner.



Fusing of a sprinkler head by heat is necessary for water to be discharged onto a fire, even after operation of the manual station valve.

- **1.3.13. Drain valve (13).** The drain valve is used to drain the sprinkler pipe after actuation of the preaction valve (3). This valve is used only during inspection, maintenance, and resetting of the assembly. Only trained personnel should use this valve. Refer to Manual I-769P in Section 2 for more detailed information on this valve. The normal position of this valve is closed.
- 1.3.14. Input connection for 110 VAC power (14). 110VAC is required to power the assembly. This power shall come from a source in compliance with all applicable codes and standards. Internal wiring (factory assembled) takes this power to the control panel (1) and the compressor (8). If local codes require individual 110VAC power sources for the control panel (1) and the compressor (8), jumpers may be removed from the terminal strip (2) permitting this. Refer to Section 1.10 for additional information on this connection.
- 1.3.15. Input connection for automatic fire detectors (15). Automatic fire detectors are required to provide the signal for opening the pre-action valve (3). These detectors are field-connected to this connection. See Section 1.10, and refer to the control panel instruction manuals in Section 4. And 4.2 for details on these detectors and this connection.



- 1.3.16. Water inlet connection (16). The sprinkler water supply is field-connected to this connection. One of three optional water inlet connections may be chosen. The first is at the upper right corner of the lower enclosure. Use this connection if it is desired to bring the pipe to the assembly from above. (NOTE: Assemblies equipped with 1/2HP compressors do not have upper right corner inlet connection.) If it is desired to bring the pipe to the assembly from a location close to the floor, the connection may be made on the lower left of the assembly, or by disconnecting the top inlet piping, the connection may be made on the lower right of the assembly. Refer to Section 1.10 and Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P for more detailed information on this connection.
- 1.3.17. Outlet connection to fire sprinklers (17). The outlet connection from the assembly to the fire sprinklers is field-connected to this connection. The connection is located in the top center of the lower enclosure, behind the upper enclosure. Refer to Section 1.10 and Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P for more detailed information on this connection.

- **1.3.18. Notification appliance output connection (18).** Notification appliances are required by code to alert occupants that a fire has been detected. These appliances are field-connected to this connection. Refer to the control panel instruction manuals in Section 4 for details on this connection.
- **1.3.19. Output connection to building fire alarm system (19).** Most codes require a fire protection subsystem to signal the building fire alarm system. This signal is field-connected to this connection. Refer to the control panel instruction manuals in Section 4 for details on this connection.
- **1.3.20. Drain connection (20).** Drain water from the assembly must be piped away to a drain. The drain piping may be connected to the assembly on the left or the right side. Refer to Section 1.10 and Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P for more detailed information on this connection.
- **1.4. Configurations.** United Fire Protection PREACTION-PAC sprinkler valve assemblies are available in the following configurations:
- **1.4.1.Valve sizes:** 1-1/2" through 4".
- **1.4.2.Valve types:** Single-interlock and double-interlock available in all valve sizes.
- 1.4.3. Compressor sizes:
- 1.4.3.1. For 1-1/2" and 2" valves: 1/6HP compressor only.
- 1.4.3.2. For 2-1/2" valves: 1/6HP and 1/3HP compressors available.
- 1.4.3.3. For 3" and 4" valves: 1/6HP, 1/3HP, and 1/2HP compressors available.
- **1.4.3.4.** Compressors are capable of pressurizing piping systems up to the following limits:
- **1.4.3.4.1.** 1/6HP compressor: maximum system capacity is 290 gallons.
- **1.4.3.4.2.** 1/3HP compressor: maximum system capacity is 475 gallons.
- **1.4.3.4.3.** 1/2HP compressor: maximum system capacity is 780 gallons.
- **1.4.4.Control panel:** A Fenwal FN-6000 addressable detection control panel is factory-installed in the upper enclosure.
- **1.5. Options.** None at this time.
- **1.6. Approvals.** United Fire Protection PREACTION-PAC sprinkler valve assemblies, as listed in this Manual, are Approved by FM Approvals under the heading "Automatic Water Control Valves." See pages 13 and 14 for Approved assemblies. NOTE: Although most PREACTION-PAC assemblies are FM Approved, custom-built units are supplied from time to time upon request. Various components within these custom assemblies maintain their individual approvals, but these custom assemblies are not FM Approved as a unit.
- **1.7. Applicable Standards.** United Fire Protection PREACTION-PAC sprinkler valve assemblies are to be installed and maintained by qualified, trained personnel in accordance with:

Care should be taken to be clear on what is applicable and what is not when referring to these manuals for installation, operation, inspection, and maintenance instructions.



1.9 FM Approved Assemblies

PREACTION-PAC assemblies with indicated part numbers are FM Approved. From time to time, custombuilt units are supplied upon request. The components in these custom-built units retain their individual approvals, but these custom-built units are not FM Approved.

When the Preaction-Pac is installed where FM Global is an AHJ, follow the requirements of FM Approvals Class Numbers 1011, 1012, 1013 and FM Global Property Loss Prevention Data Sheet 5-40 dated 2007, especially:

- Alarm control panels for automatic release of preaction sprinkler systems are required to have 90 hours of secondary power followed by 10 minutes of release power and alarm operation.
- Include the installation of Class A (Style D or E) initiating device circuits. All FM Approved systems / installations must be configured as Class A for Deluge and Preaction Releasing Service.
- Do not include abort switches to abort the preaction sprinkler actuation function.



1.10. Installation.

- **1.10.1.** Location. Locate the PREACTION-PAC assembly as shown on the system shop drawings or design plans. The location should be dry, clean, and within the Approved temperature range of the assembly (+40 deg F to +110 deg F). Refer to Figure 4 for overall dimensions.
- 1.10.2. Unpacking, Placement & Leveling. Unpack the PREACTION-PAC as follows:
- **1.10.2.1.** Remove the outer carton and any other packing material surrounding the assembly.
- **1.10.2.2.** Open the lower enclosure door.





Figure 5 – Diagram - Location of Pallet Bolts and Leveling Feet

- **1.10.2.3.** Use a flat-bladed or Phillips screwdriver to remove the (4) bolts holding the assembly to the pallet. See Figure 5.
- **1.10.2.4.** Close the lower enclosure door. Remove the unit from the pallet, and place in the intended installation location.

1.10.2.5. Level the unit:

- **1.10.2.5.1.** Open the lower enclosure door.
- **1.10.2.5.2.** Using a flat-bladed screwdriver, adjust the (4) leveling feet from inside the enclosure until all feet are firmly in contact with the floor. See Figure 5.
- **1.10.2.5.3.** Using a spirit level, adjust the leveling feet until the assembly is level both front-to-back and side-to-side.

Figure 4 – Diagram - Overall Dimensions

1.10.3. Serial Number. The serial number of each assembly is located on a permanent metal nameplate, located behind the upper enclosure door above the compressor disconnect switch. The serial number is coded as follows:



Note the serial number, date of installation, and date of commissioning on the front of this manual where indicated.

1.10.4. External Attachments.


- **1.10.4.1. Pre-Action Valve.** Use Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P to guide the installation of inlet, outlet, and drain piping. See Figure 6 for details.
- **1.10.4.1.1. Inlet Piping.** Inlet piping may be attached to the PREACTION-PAC in one of three locations:
- The standard connection is at the upper right corner of the lower enclosure. The assembly is prepiped to accept inlet piping at this location. This location is labeled INLET. (NOTE: Assemblies equipped with 1/2HP compressors do not have upper right corner inlet connection. Use either lower left center or lower right center connection as described below.) Remove the plastic protection cap from the inlet pipe, and use a field-supplied grooved coupling to make this connection.
- An optional connection at the lower left center of the lower enclosure. Remove the precut knockout from the lower left center of the lower enclosure. Remove the steel cap from the grooved coupling on the left side of the tee at the bottom of the enclosure. Attach the inlet piping to the left side of the tee using the grooved coupling. Remove the plastic protection cap from the top inlet connection, and assemble the steel cap removed from the tee to the top inlet connection using a field-supplied grooved coupling.



Failure to assemble the steel cap to the top inlet will result in property damage due to water escaping from the top inlet.

- An optional connection at the lower right center of the lower enclosure. Remove the precut knockout from the lower right center of the lower enclosure. Remove the two grooved couplings from the elbow attached to the right side of the tee. (The elbow and one coupling may be discarded.) Attach the inlet piping to the right side of the tee using one of the grooved couplings. DO NOT attempt to remove any of the rest of the top inlet piping.
- **1.10.4.1.2. Outlet Piping.** Outlet piping is attached to the PREACTION-PAC in one location; at the top center of the lower enclosure. This location is labeled OUTLET. Remove the plastic protection cap from the outlet pipe, and used a field-supplied grooved coupling to make this connection.

1.10.4.1.3. Drain Piping. Drain piping is attached to the PREACTION-PAC at a nipple located in the lower enclosure. The drain pipe may exit the enclosure on either the left or right side. Remove the precut knockout from the chosen side. Attach the drain pipe to the nipple with two field-supplied grooved couplings and a field-supplied grooved elbow.




Figure 7 – Diagram - Terminal Strip Wiring Detail

1.10.4.2. Terminal Strip and Control Panel. See Figure 7 for information on connection to the terminal strip in the upper enclosure. Use Section 4.1 – Fenwal manual 06-236529-001 to guide the installation of connections to the control panel. Terminals for 110VAC power accept qty. (1) 10 ga. max. conductor. NOTE: All conductors used for field wiring must comply with NFPA 70 – National Electrical Code, and control panel manufacturer's instructions (see Section 4). See Section 4, pages E-1 and E-2 for information on power-limited conductor runs.



DO NOT drill or punch the upper enclosure to attach conduit. Use the knockouts supplied at the lower back of the upper enclosure. Failure to follow these instructions can result in damage to the control panel. United Fire Protection Corporation will not be responsible for warranty adjustment of damaged control panels when these instructions are not followed.

1.10.4.2.1. Power. 110VAC, 3-wire, single-phase power is attached to the terminal strip in the upper enclosure. See Figure 7. Terminals for 110VAC power accept qty. (1) 10 ga. max. conductor. Current draw: With 1/6HP compressor = 8.8 amps; with 1/3HP compressor = 8.8 amps; with 1/2HP compressor = 10.2 amps.



Only qualified electricians should connect incoming power to the assembly. Failure to follow this instruction could result in death or serious personal injury.

- A. Turn off circuit breaker at the main power distribution panel.
- B. Connect service ground conductor to terminal marked GROUND.
- C. Connect primary neutral conductor to terminal marked NEUTRAL.
- D. Connect primary hot conductor to terminal marked HOT.
- 1.10.4.2.2. Backup Batteries. Calculate backup battery requirements, and connect backup batteries, per Section 4.1 – Fenwal manual 06-236529-001. The upper enclosure is capable of holding batteries up to 26 A-H. If larger batteries are needed, use an external battery enclosure per Section 4.1 – Fenwal manual 06-236529-001.
- 1.10.4.2.3. Fire Detectors (Initiating Devices). Fire detectors (initiating devices), located in the area protected by the sprinklers connected to the PREACTION-PAC, are necessary to provide the signal to open the pre-action valve. Refer to NFPA 72 for information on the number, type, and spacing of fire detectors. Install detectors, wiring, and panel connections per Section 4.1 Fenwal manual 06-236529-001. All FM Approved systems / installations must be configured as Class A for Deluge and Preaction Releasing Service.
- 1.10.4.2.4. Audible / Visual Appliances (Indicating Devices). Audible / visual appliances (indicating devices), located in and around the area protected by the sprinklers connected to the PREACTION-PAC, are necessary to warn occupants that a fire has been detected. Refer to NFPA 72 for information on the number, type, and spacing of audible / visual appliances. Install audible / visual devices, wiring, and panel connections per Section 4.1 Fenwal manual 06-236529-001.
- 1.10.4.2.5. Building Fire Alarm Systems. In buildings with fire alarm systems separate from the PREACTION-PAC detection system, most national and local codes and authorities having jurisdiction require the PREACTION-PAC to provide signals to the building fire alarm system. The Fenwal control panel installed in the PREACTION-PAC contains dry contacts capable of providing the necessary signals. Install audible / visual devices, wiring, and panel connections per Section 4.1 Fenwal manual 06-236529-001.
- **1.10.4.2.6. Other Connections.** From time to time, additional signals from the PREACTION-PAC control panel may be required. Such signals can be associated with building management systems, equipment shutdown, or security notification. Additional dry contacts may be needed to satisfy all of these requirements.
- **1.10.4.3. Compressor.** See Figure 7. 110VAC, 3-wire, single-phase power is attached to the terminal strip in the upper enclosure. The compressor power is factory-wired to the terminal strip in the upper enclosure. In the default configuration, the same 110VAC source used for the control panel serves for the compressor. If the local authority having jurisdiction requires separate power sources for the control panel and the compressor, jumpers can be removed from the terminal strip. The compressor pressure outlet is factory-attached to the system piping within the lower enclosure.
- 1.10.4.4. Options None available at this time.

- **1.10.5. Prior To Placing In Service.** Before placing the PREACTION-PAC in service, perform the following steps. Ensure that all discrepancies are corrected before proceeding to the next step.
- **1.10.5.1.** Ensure the entire system is installed per the latest revision of all applicable shop drawings.
- **1.10.5.2.** Ensure all testing has been performed on the sprinkler piping per the requirements of the authority having jurisdiction and NFPA 13.
- **1.10.5.3.** Use Sections 4.1 and 4.2 Fenwal manuals 06-236529-001 and 06-236529-002 to perform all preliminary tests on the control panel, field wiring, and field devices.
- **1.10.5.4.** Use Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P to perform all preliminary tests on the pre-action valve, trim, and sprinkler piping.
- **1.10.5.5.** Perform all tests required to be witnessed by the authority having jurisdiction. Obtain AHJ approval of the installation.

1.10.6. Placing In Service.

- **1.10.6.1.** Verify that the control panel is indicating POWER ON, with no alarm or trouble indicators illuminated, and no error messages on the display.
- **1.10.6.2.** Verify that the water supply is on.
- **1.10.6.3.** Using Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P, verify that all valves are in the proper position for inservice status. Verify that the three pressure gages on the front of the lower enclosure are indicating expected values within expected limits.
- **1.10.6.4.** Ensure that the owner of the system has received adequate introductory training.
- **1.10.6.5.** Turn over this manual and the enclosure door keys to the owner. The manual may be stored in the pocket on the inside of the lower enclosure door.

1.11. Operation.

1.11.1. Automatic. Fully automatic operation of the system will be conducted by the control panel. Power from 110VAC and / or batteries is required for the control panel to function in this way. No manual intervention is required for the control panel to perform its functions. Manual intervention to acknowledge and silence signals may be performed. Refer to Section 4.1 – Fenwal manual 06-236529-001 for information on signals.

1.11.2. Manual. Manual operation of the pre-action valve is accomplished with the manual release valve. Open the door marked IN CASE OF FIRE OPEN DOOR AND PULL LEVER. No key is needed to open this door. Pull the lever. No power is needed to open the pre-action valve in this manner. The door may not be closed until the lever is restored to its normal position.

- **1.11.3. Restoring To Service.** After automatic or manual system operation, follow instructions in Section 2 Victaulic manual I-769P and Section 4.1 Fenwal manual 06-236529-001 to restore the individual parts of the PREACTION-PAC to service.
- **1.12. Inspection, Testing, and Maintenance.** Regular inspection, testing and maintenance of the PREACTION-PAC assembly is essential to the assembly's continued proper operation. Follow all instructions in the documents described in this section. Pay particular attention to the required minimum interval for each item of inspection, testing, and maintenance. The owner of the system (or their designated representative) is responsible for the overall condition of the system, and ensuring that all inspection, testing, and maintenance items are conducted as recommended.



The United Fire Protection PREACTION-PAC sprinkler valve assembly is a vital part of the fire protection of any facility where these units are installed. Life safety and property protection depends on continuing proper operation of the assembly. The owner of the PREACTION-PAC is responsible for the condition of the assembly and its continued proper operation. United Fire Protection strongly recommends that all owners of PREACTION-PACs engage the services of qualified, trained fire protection professionals to inspect, test, maintain, and repair the assembly.

- **1.12.1. Inspection.** Inspection involves carrying out a set of procedures to discover and note any and all discrepancies that could render the system impaired, inoperative, or ineffective. The result of an inspection is a comprehensive list of these discrepancies. Inspection does not specifically include maintenance or repair; however, maintenance and repair can be and usually is conducted at the time of inspection.
- **1.12.2. Testing.** Testing involves carrying out procedures to discover if tested components function as intended. Testing is an integral part of performing inspection. Testing is also done after the performance of some maintenance procedures.
- **1.12.3. Maintenance.** Maintenance involves carrying out procedures to ensure that maintained components continue to function as intended. Maintenance is usually preventive in nature. Maintenance can be conducted during inspection.
- **1.12.4. Repair.** Repair involves carrying out procedures to correct the deficiencies found during inspection, or as a result of other events such as system actuation or control panel trouble / alarm signals.



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

SECTION VIEW DRAWING AND DESCRIPTION – SERIES 776 LOW-PRESSURE ACTUATOR

The Series 776 Low-Pressure Actuator is located in the trim of Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valves and acts as the trigger for these systems.


Diaphragms separate the low-pressure actuator into three chambers. The upper air chamber controls activation, while the middle and lower chambers act as the water valve.

During setup, system air is applied to the upper chamber of the lowpressure actuator. When the Auto Vent Sleeve of the low-pressure actuator is pulled up, the upper chamber manually sets. Air pressure in the upper chamber holds the Auto Vent closed, while it exerts force on the water seal of the middle chamber.

When the diaphragm charge line is opened, water enters the lower chamber of the low-pressure actuator. Water that enters the lowpressure actuator flows to the middle chamber through the inlet eyelet, which is pressurized by system air pressure in the upper chamber. Since the area of the lower diaphragm (exposed to water pressure in the middle chamber) is greater than the area of the lower chamber, the lower chamber seals off. Water does not flow to the outlet of the low-pressure actuator, and the supply water pressure creates the water seal.

When system air pressure decays to 7 psi/48 kPa/0.5 Bar, the force exerted by the compression spring in the Auto Vent is greater than the force exerted by air in the upper chamber. The Auto Vent opens, and all air pressure in the upper chamber evacuates.

The upper diaphragm releases water pressure in the middle chamber of the low-pressure actuator, which allows the lower diaphragm to lift and water to flow from the inlet to the outlet. This flow of water releases pressure from the diaphragm charge line of the Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valve, thus allowing the diaphragm to retract. The clapper opens, and water flows into the sprinkler system.

SECTION VIEW DRAWING AND DESCRIPTION -SERIES 746-LPA DRY ACCELERATOR

The Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator is a quick-opening device, which exhausts air from the Series 776 Low-Pressure Actuator to speed valve operation.

A diaphragm separates the Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator into two chambers. The closing chamber contains a compression spring, which maintains the chamber in the closed position. The closed position is maintained as long as the pressure differential between the opening and closing chambers is less than 3 psi/21 kPa/0.2 Bar.

When the system introduces air pressure into the dry accelerator, air enters the closing chamber and passes through a check valve to the opening chamber. The check valve, which allows flow into the opening chamber, prevents pressure from escaping the opening chamber. Therefore, air can escape only through the restrictor.


When a rapid loss of system air pressure occurs, such as an open sprinkler, air escapes from the closing chamber faster than it escapes from the opening chamber. As the sprinkler system's pressure continues to decay, a differential pressure develops across the diaphragm. When this differential pressure reaches 3 - 5 psi/21 - 34 kPa/0.2 - 0.3 Bar, the opening chamber's pressure overcomes the compression spring's closing force, causing the closing chamber to open to the atmosphere. The closing chamber opens immediately and releases pressure from the actuator, resulting in valve operation.

NOTE: The Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator must be used only on systems operating below 30 psi/206 kPa/2.1 Bar of air. If air pressure higher than 30 psi/206 kPa/2.1 Bar is required, the Series 746 Dry Accelerator should be used.

AIR SUPPLY REQUIREMENTS

The required air pressure for Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valves is 13 psi/90kPa/0.9 Bar minimum, regardless of the system supply water pressure. Normal air pressure should not exceed 18 psi/124 kPa/1.2 Bar. Failure to maintain air pressure within the 13 psi/90kPa to 18 psi/124 kPa/1.2 Bar range may reduce system operation response time.

Systems with air pressure higher than 18 psi/124 kPa/1.2 Bar may require the addition of a Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator. **NOTE:** The Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator must be used only on systems operating below 30 psi/206 kPa/2.1 Bar of air. If air pressure higher than 30 psi/206 kPa/2.1 Bar is required, the Series 746 Dry Accelerator should be used.


If multiple Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valves are installed with a common air supply, isolate the systems with a spring-loaded, softseated ball check valve to ensure air integrity for each system. Good practice is to include a ball valve for isolation and service of each individual system.

Set the air pressure to the required system air pressure. Air pressure differing from the required system air pressure could reduce system operation response time.

The engineer/system designer is responsible for sizing the compressor so that the entire system is charged to the required air pressure within 30 minutes. DO NOT oversize the compressor to provide more airflow. An oversized compressor will slow down or possibly prevent valve operation.

If the compressor fills the system too fast, it may be necessary to restrict the air supply. Restricting the air supply will ensure that air being exhausted from an open sprinkler or manual release valve is not replaced by the air supply system as fast as it is being exhausted.

COMPRESSOR SIZING



BASE OR RISER-MOUNTED AIR COMPRESSORS

For base or riser-mounted air compressors, the recommended air pressure of 13 psi/90 kPa/0.9 Bar is the "on" or "low" pressure setting for the compressor. The "off" or "high" pressure setting should be 18 psi/124 kPa/1.2 Bar.

When a base or riser-mounted air compressor supplies air to a Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valve, it is not necessary to install the Victaulic Series 757 Regulated Air Maintenance Trim Assembly (AMTA). In this case, the air line of the compressor connects to the trim at the fitting where the Series 757 Regulated AMTA is normally installed (refer to the applicable trim drawing). If the compressor is not equipped with a pressure switch, the Series 757P Air Maintenance Trim Assembly with Pressure Switch should be installed.

SHOP AIR OR TANK-MOUNTED AIR COMPRESSORS

In the event a compressor becomes inoperative, a properly sized tankmounted air compressor provides the greatest protection for systems.

When shop air or a tank-mounted air compressor is used, the Series 757 Regulated AMTA must be installed. The Series 757 Regulated AMTA provides proper air regulation from the air reservoir to the sprinkler system.

For tank-mounted air compressors, the recommended air pressure of 13 psi/90 kPa/0.9 Bar should be used as the set point for the air regulator. The "on" pressure of the compressor should be at least 5 psi/34 kPa/0.3 Bar above the set point of the air regulator.





COMPRESSOR REQUIREMENTS AND SETTINGS FOR SERIES 769 FIRELOCK NXT PREACTION VALVES INSTALLED WITH SERIES 746-LPA DRY ACCELERATORS

Set the air regulator of the Series 757 Regulated AMTA to a minimum of 13 psi/90 kPa/0.9 Bar.

The Series 757P Air Maintenance Trim Assembly with Pressure Switch MUST NOT be used on a Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valve installed with a Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator, unless a tank and air regulator are added.

In the event a compressor becomes inoperative, a properly sized tankmounted air compressor provides the greatest protection for systems installed with a Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator. In this situation, air can be supplied continuously to the sprinkler system for an extended time period. **NOTE:** The Series 757 Regulated AMTA should be used with a tank-mounted air compressor to supply air to a Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valve when the Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator is used. The use of an air regulator with a base or riser-mounted air compressor could cause short cycling, resulting in premature wear of the compressor.

The air regulator of the Series 757 Regulated AMTA is a relief-type design. Any pressure in the system that is above the set point of the air regulator will be released. Therefore, charging the air regulator above the set point could cause premature operation of a valve installed with a Series 746-LPA Dry Accelerator.

SETTINGS FOR AIR SUPERVISORY PRESSURE SWITCHES AND ALARM PRESSURE SWITCHES

- 1. Air supervisory pressure switches are required for preaction systems and must be set according to the following notes. **NOTE:** Switches for Vic-Quick Risers are pre-set at the factory.
 - Wire the air supervisory pressure switches to activate a low-pressure alarm signal. NOTE: In addition, the local authority having jurisdiction may require a high-pressure alarm. Contact the local authority having jurisdiction for this requirement.
 - 1b. Set the air supervisory pressure switches to activate at $2-4\,psi/14-28\,kPa/0.1-0.3\,Bar$ below the minimum air pressure required (but not lower than $10\,psi/69\,kPa/0.7\,Bar$).
 - 1c. Wire the alarm pressure switch to activate a water flow alarm.
 - 1d. Set the alarm pressure switch to activate on a pressure rise of 4 8 psi/28 55 kPa/0.3 0.6 Bar.

REMOTE SYSTEM TEST VALVE REQUIREMENTS

The remote system test valve (inspector's test connection) should contain a UL Listed and/or FM Approved valve (normally closed), which can be opened to simulate the operation of a sprinkler.

The remote system test valve (inspector's test connection) should be located at the most hydraulically demanding location in the release system. **NOTE:** Multiple restrictions on the remote system test valve (inspector's test connection) may slow the air decay rate and cause the system to respond slower than required.

The remote system test valve (inspector's test connection) should terminate with an orifice equal to the smallest orifice in the releasing system.

The remote system test valve (inspector's test connection) is used to ensure that water reaches the most remote part of the system within 60 seconds.



- 4. It is the system designer's responsibility to confirm material compatibility of the Series 769 FireLock NXT Preaction Valve, trim, and associated accessories when a corrosive environment or contaminated water is present.
- SERIES 769 FIRELOCK NXT PREACTION VALVES MUST BE 5. INSTALLED ONLY IN THE VERTICAL POSITION WITH THE ARROW ON THE BODY POINTING UPWARD.
- 6. Air or nitrogen supply to the dry piping system must be clean, dry, and oil-free.

6a. If using the same clapper seal assembly and the seal ring was removed from the clapper seal in the previous step: Re-insert the seal ring carefully underneath the outer lip of the clapper seal. Make sure the smaller diameter of the seal ring is toward the sealing surface of the clapper seal.



- 7. Insert the seal washer carefully underneath the sealing lip of the gasket.
- 8. Remove any contaminants, dirt, and mineral deposits from the clapper.

9. Install the clapper seal into the clapper carefully. Make sure the seal ring snaps into the clapper completely.




10. Place the seal-retaining ring onto the seal washer of the clapper seal. Install the seal-assembly bolt/bolt seal through the seal-retaining ring and clapper.



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11. Tighten the seal-assembly bolt/bolt seal to the torque value, listed in the table below, to ensure a proper seal.



OIL-LESS COMPRESSOR INSTRUCTION SHEETS

NOTE

This compressor is intended for installation indoors for use on dry sprinkler systems in accordance with the Standard for Installation of Sprinkler Systems, NFPA 13 and the National Electrical Code, NFPA 70. The compressor should be sized to restore and maintain the air pressure in the sprinkler system in accordance with the requirements in NFPA 13.

DANGER

This compressor is not equipped and should NOT be used "as is" to supply breathing quality air.

WARNING

Motors, electrical equipment and controls can cause electrical arcs that will ignite a flammable gas or vapor. Never operate or repair in or near a flammable gas or vapor. Never store flammable liquids or gases near the compressor.

WARNING

These compressors are suitable for pumping only atmospheric air. As defined in Compressed Gas Association Pamphlet G-7, page 3, atmospheric air is a mixture of elements and compounds where nitrogen and oxygen comprise more than 99% with all other trace gases comprising less than 1%. DO NOT USE THIS COMPRESSOR IN CONTAMINATED ENVIRONMENTS OR FOR PUMPING MIXTURES OTHER THAN ATMOSPHERIC AIR

WARNING

Compressed air contains liquid water and is saturated with water vapor, which can freeze. Do not connect compressor outlet to freezer rooms or systems exposed to temperatures below freezing. Receiving

Location

<u>NOTE</u>: Do not connect compressor intake to freezer room. – CALL 1-800-345-8207.

Locate the compressor in a clean, well-ventilated area where the air is relatively cool, clean, and dry. A $110^{\circ}F$ (35 C) maximum and $40^{\circ}F$ (4.5 C) minimum temperature for surrounding and inlet air are recommended. Provide at least 12 to 18 inches from any wall or other obstruction that will interfere with airflow through the motor's fan built into the motor. Blocking airflow through the fan may cause the compressor to over heat. Do not place the compressor in an area of excessive heat, such as near a boiler.

Mounting

Riser mounted compressors may be mounted to a firm level floor, wall or system riser. A mounting bracket

and straps are provided. Tank mounted compressors should be bolted to the floor using the bolt holes provided in the tank legs. Always shim the unit level before bolting it to the floor. Vibration isolators (P/N KVP4X4) are recommended. When using isolator pads, do not draw bolts tight. Allow the pad to absorb vibrations. When isolators are used, a flexible hose (P/N P1202MP) should be installed between the compressor and service piping.

Lubrication

<u>NOTE</u>: This compressor is designed for non-lubricated service. Bearings are permanently lubricated. Do not lubricate any part of the compressor or motor.

diameter to minimize pressure drop from the compressor to system. Larger pipe size may be required by code and may be substituted with no adverse effects. Smaller line size must not be used and will restrict the compressor flow, lowering capacity and causing the compressor/motor to work harder, which shortens compressor/motor life. All piping connected to the compressor must be fully supported and not transfer any loads to the compressor.

If an AMD-1 is used, allow sufficient distance between the compressor and AMD-1 to ensure that the maximum temperature at the AMD-1 is 200° F or less. When an AMD is used with riser mounted units, a riser mounted tank kit (p/n OLR-TK) should be installed to prevent short cycling the compressor.

All oil-less compressors include a relief valve. For riser mounted models, the relief valve is installed on the compressor outlet. For tank mounted models, an ASME Code relief valve is mounted on the compressor's tank. This valve will open at a preset value above the pressure switch setting to prevent excess tank pressure in the event of switch failure.

<u>WARNING</u>: Do not attempt to change the safety relief valve setting.

A manual drain is provided on the bottom of each tank mounted compressor. Moisture accumulated in the tank, must be drained weekly. An automatic drain , P/N DVA-2T, is recommended in areas of high humidity.

The compressor outlet piping should contain an accessible drain. As a minimum a manual drain may be used, but an automatic drain is recommended to remove excess water.

<u>NOTE:</u> Accumulation of condensed water in a system causes corrosion of components and reduces system capacity.

<u>NOTICE:</u> Warranty is void if a separate check valve is not installed to prevent water back flow.

<u>Wiring (reference "Wiring Instructions"</u> <u>drawings)</u>

WARNING

Have a qualified electrician wire the compressor to ensure that the supply line has the same characteristics (voltage, frequency and phasing) as the motor. Wiring must comply with all local and national codes.

CAUTION

Inadequate wiring size can cause insufficient voltage at the compressor during start-up. Overheating and damage to the motor and controls may result

The supply wire must be of adequate size and no other equipment should be connected to the same line. The table below lists the recommended wire size for each model, based on a 100' run. Consult factory for longer runs.

The motors supplied are multiple voltage motors. A label on the pressure switch cover indicates the voltage the motor is pre-wired for. If the supply voltage, on site, is different from the voltage indicated on this label, change the internal motor voltage connections to match the supply voltage. To change internal voltage connections, remove the cover plate located on the rear or side of the motor and reconnect the wire leads as shown on the motor's wiring diagram.

On all three phase and $\frac{1}{2}$ Hp and $\frac{3}{4}$ Hp single phase models, an arrow on the motor indicates the direction of rotation of the compressor. If the compressor rotates in the opposite direction, reverse the rotation of the motor. On single phase units, reverse motor rotation by interchanging the red and black motor leads. Interchanging any two incoming supply wires reverses rotation of three phase motors.

NOTICE: Single-phase oil-less compressors can not be operated at 208V. Operating the compressor at 208V voids the warranty.

<u>NOTICE</u>: Single-phase motors include internal thermal overload protection, which has an automatic reset device.

<u>WARNING</u>: Disconnect electrical power before servicing to disable reset devices. Thermal protection can automatically start the motor when the protector resets.

On single phase models, the motor is pre-wired to the pressure switch provided, which controls starting (cut

in pressure) and stopping (cut out pressure) of the motor. The pressure switch is factory set. Standard models switch is set at 27 psig cut in and 40 psig cut out. Low pressure models ("-LP") switch is set at 13 psig cut in and 18 psig cut out. Consult General Air Products before adjusting the pressure switch.

On three-phase compressors, the motor is not prewired to the pressure switch. Refer to the three phase wiring instruction drawing for recommended wiring.

A magnetic starter is required, for all three phase models, to protect the motor from overload conditions. A magnetic starter is recommended, for all single phase models. Consult the National Electric Code and local codes for motor starter requirements. Refer to

the proper wiring instruction drawing for recommended wiring to a starter.

<u>NOTE:</u> Do not run two phases of a three phase supply through the pressure switch. Serious damage can result.

<u>NOTE</u>: Failure to use the pressure switch may result in overpressure of the compressor or other components in the system. Overpressure of the compressor may result in blown head gaskets or other damage.

Adherence to the following will aid in problem-free installation with long-term reliability:

WARNINGSeveral different sources of power can be connected to this fire alarm control unit.Disconnect all sources of power before servicing. Control unit and associated equipment
may be damaged by servicing while the unit is energized. Do not attempt to install,
service, or operate this control unit until this manual is read and understood.



System Re-acceptance Test after Re-Programming: To ensure proper system operation, this system must be retested in accordance with NFPA 72 Chapter 10 after any programming change. Re-acceptance testing is also required after any addition or deletion of system components, and after any modification, repair or adjustment to system hardware or wiring.

All components, circuits and system operations known to be affected by a change must be 100% tested. In addition, to ensure that other operations are not inadvertently affected, at least 10% of initiating devices that are not directly affected by the change, up to a maximum of 50 devices, must also be tested and proper system operation verified.

This system meets UL/FM requirements for operation at $32^{\circ}-120^{\circ}F$ (0 to $49^{\circ}C$) and at a relative humidity of 93% (non-condensing) @ 90°F (32.2°C). However, the useful life of the system's standby batteries and the electronic components may be adversely effected by continuous operation at these environmental limits. Therefore, it is recommended that this system and its peripherals be installed in an environment with a nominal room temperature of 60-80°F.

Like all solid state electronic devices, this system may operate erratically or can be damaged when subjected to lightning induced transients. Although no system is completely immune from lightning transients and interference, proper grounding will reduce susceptibility. *The use of overhead or outside aerial wiring is not recommended due to the increased susceptibility to nearby lightning strikes.* Consult with the Applications Engineering Department if any problems are anticipated or encountered.

Do not install electronic assemblies prior to mounting and attaching conduit for field wiring to the enclosure. Before making modifications, verify that they will not interfere with battery and printed circuit board locations. Do not over tighten screw terminals. Over tightening may damage threads, resulting in reduced terminal contact pressure and difficulty with screw terminal removal.

This system contains static-sensitive components. Always ground yourself with a proper wrist strap before handling any circuits so that static charges are removed from the body. Use static suppressive packaging to protect electronic assemblies removed from the control unit.

Follow the instructions in this manual. These instructions must be followed to avoid damage to the control unit and associated equipment. System operation and reliability depend upon proper installation.

Fire Alarm System Limitations

While installing a fire alarm system may make lower insurance rates possible, it is not a substitute for fire insurance!

An automatic fire alarm system – typically made up of smoke detectors, heat detectors, manual pull stations, notification appliances, and a fire alarm control unit with remote-notification capability – can provide early warning of a developing fire. Such a system, however, does not assure protection against property damage or loss of life resulting from a fire.

Any fire alarm system may fail for a variety of reasons:

Smoke detectors may not sense fire where smoke cannot reach the detectors such as in chimneys, in walls, on roofs, or on the other side of closed doors. 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CHAPTER 1 SYSTEM OVERVIEW

1-1 SYSTEM DESCRIPTION

The FENWALNETTM 6000 Control Unit is an intelligent control unit in a compact housing for fire suppression system and/or fire-alarm system applications. The control unit uses a single printed circuit board (PCB) design and a switching power supply. A keypad display membrane (hereinafter referred to as the display) is mounted to the PCB for system status and user operation.

The FENWALNET 6000 has one signaling line circuit (SLC) that can communicate with up to 255 intelligent devices.




Figure 1-1. Typical FENWALNET 6000 System

See Figure 1-1 for a typical fire suppression system application.

The FENWALNET 6000 coordinates the operations of the varied components of a protected-premises fire protection or notification system. These operations include:

- Interpreting initiating signals from automatic detectors or monitor modules. Initiating signals can be any of the following:
 - Automatic detector pre-alarm
 - Automatic detector alarm
 - Manual alarm
 - Manual extinguishing-system release
 - Extinguishing-system abort
 - Sprinkler-system waterflow
 - Sprinkler-system supervisory
 - Point-specific trouble report
- Annunciating the initiating-device report, or any other system event, via the display and associated peripheral annunciation equipment
- Notifying the occupants of an emergency situation
- Activating control equipment to aid with building evacuation or to prepare an area for specialextinguishing-system discharge
- Discharging the special-extinguishing system, if necessary
- Actuating ancillary equipment to call the fire department
- Warning of any trouble condition that could inhibit alarm transmission or annunciation or whose occurrence could prevent the system from carrying out its mission.

1-1.1 Standard Features

The following standard features are incorporated in the control unit's single-printed-circuitboard design:

- One (1) signaling-line circuit (SLC) for Class-A, Style -6 or -7 or Class-B, Style-4 operation
- 255 intelligent-device capacity
- Two (2) notification-appliance circuits (NACs) for Class-A, Style-Z or Class-B, Style-Y operation. Each NAC is capable of creating the following master-coded patterns for audible notification appliances: 60 beats per minute (bpm), 120 bpm, temporal pattern per ANSI S3.41, and steady activation.
- Two (2) releasing circuits for electro-explosive initiators or solenoid-operated control heads and valves
- Two (2) field-configurable outputs for notification appliances or solenoid-operated control heads and valves. Each output operates in Class-A, Style-Z or Class-B, Style-Y manner when configured as a NAC, and is capable of creating the following master-coded patterns for audible notification appliances: 60 beats per minute (bpm), 120 bpm, temporal pattern per ANSI S3.41, and steady activation.
- One (1) unpowered, Form-C relay contact for trouble conditions
- Three (3) programmable, unpowered, Form-C relay contacts
- One (1) RS-485 communications circuit for remote-display units or annunciator-driver modules
- One (1) USB-style communications port for device capability
- Two (2) RS-232 serial-style communications ports
- One (1) network-interface-card connector for integration of up to 32 control units in full peer-to-peer operation
- One (1) operator interface with 80-character liquid-crystal display, status-indicating LEDs and control/numeric keys

A switching power supply is located behind the printed-circuit board and supplies 5.4 A @ 24 Vdc to support the basic control unit and its associated peripheral devices and to charge the standby battery. The switching power supply is user-configurable to operate from either 120 or 240 Vac, 50/60 Hz primary power.

1-2.1 Display




Figure 1-2. FENWALNET 6000 Display

The display (Figure 1-2) has control switches, system status LEDs, an 80 character (2×40) LCD for event annunciation and an integral numeric keypad. The keypad is used for entering the security password and navigating through the user menus.

1-2.1.1 LCD AND LEDS

A window for the 80-character (two lines by 40 characters each) LCD and six systemstatus LEDs. The six system-status LEDs are:

- Power On (green)
- Alarm (red)
- Pre-Alarm (yellow)
- Trouble (yellow)
- Supervisory (yellow)
- Silence (yellow)

1-2.1.2 OPERATOR CONTROL KEYS

The operator control keys are:

- Acknowledge
- Silence
- Reset
- Scroll

1-2.1.3 DIGIT AND FUNCTIONALITY KEYS


The 12-position keypad has the following digit and functionality keys:

- Digits, 0-9
- Backspace
- Enter

Refer to Chapter 3 for system operations using the display.

1-2.2 Printed-Circuit Board (PCB)

The FENWALNET 6000's Printed Circuit Board (PCB) contains the system's central processing unit (CPU) and all of the primary circuits. The PCB is packaged separately and shipped inside the control-unit's enclosure. Figure 1-3 shows the layout of the PCB, including terminals for external components, the operator interface, and connectors.



Note: Polarities shown reflect the condition when the circuit is either active or in the alarm state.



1-2.3 FENWALNET 6000 Cabinet

The PCB mounts in a compact (19.50" x 14.25" x 5.00") cabinet. The cabinet is key locked, and provides space for two batteries (up to 12 AH).




Figure 1-4. FENWALNET 6000 Cabinet

1-2.4 Power-Supply/Battery-Charger Assembly

The power-supply/battery-charger assembly is an AC to DC switching power-supply unit that provides a total output of 5.4 A @ 27 Vdc. The power supply unit is user configurable for either 120 Vac or 220/ 240 Vac, 50/60 Hz line voltage and its DC output is both filtered and regulated. The

power supply/battery-charger assembly can charge standby batteries of up to 70 AH capacity.




Figure 1-5. Power-Supply Assembly

The power-supply/battery-charger assembly is packaged separately and shipped inside the control unit's enclosure. Figure 1-5 shows the placement of the power-supply/battery-charger assembly in the FENWALNET 6000's back box.

1-2.4.1 BATTERIES

The cabinet provides space for two 12-AH batteries. Use a separate battery enclosure, P/N 74-600000-014 (Blue) or P/N 74-600000-514 (Red), for 17-AH or larger batteries. Batteries must be ordered separately.

1-3 OPTIONAL DEVICES

Several optional devices and modules can be used with the FENWALNET 6000.

1-3.1 Remote Display/Control Module (RDCM)

The remote display control module permits system events to be displayed, and operator intervention to be accomplished, from more than one location in a facility. Remote display control module, Model RDCM, is a duplicate of the FENWALNET 6000's Display/Control Module and allows full operator intervention and system control.




Figure 1-6. Remote Display/Control Module

1-3.2 ATM Series Driver Modules

The ATM Series Driver Modules permit third-party graphical annunciators and large numbers of auxiliary relays to be used with the FENWALNET 6000. Two types of driver modules can be used, Models ATM-L and ATM-R.

The FENWALNET 6000 supports up to 16 ATM-L or ATM-R Driver Modules, or any combination of these two modules, together with RDCMs, that does not exceed 31 total addresses.

1-3.2.1 MODEL ATM-L ANNUNICATOR DRIVER MODULE

The Model ATM-L Annunciator Driver Module provides the FENWALNET 6000 with up to 32 programmable, supervised LED outputs for graphical or tabular annunciators, along with 6 system-level LED outputs and 5 system-level input circuits for functional switches.

The system-level LEDs correspond to the following general conditions: Module Power, Pre-Alarm, Alarm, Alarm Silence, Supervisory, and Trouble.

The input circuits for functional switches provide for the following operator intervention: System Reset, Event Acknowledgement, Alarm Silence, Fire Drill, and Lamp Test.

1-3.2.2 MODEL ATM-R RELAY DRIVER MODULE




Figure 1-7. Model ATM-R Relay Driver Module

The Model ATM-R Relay Driver Module (Figure 1-7) can activate up to 32 programmable, supervised relays.

1-3.3 Intelligent Interface Module (IIM)




Figure 1-8. Intelligent Interface Module

The Intelligent Interface Module (IIM), shown in Figure 1-8, provides a communications link to a network up to 127 AnaLASER II Detectors for centralized data exchange, alarm reporting, detector configuration, and history-log downloading.

Refer to the AnaLASER II Installation, Operation and Maintenance Manual (Part Number 89-200) for a complete description of the Intelligent Interface Module.

1-3.4 Network Interface Card (NIC)




Figure 1-9. Network Interface Card (shown mounted to PCB)

The Network Interface Card (NIC), shown in Figure 1-9, allows up to 32 FENWALNET 6000 Control Units to be combined into an integrated, peer-to-peer network for annunciation, event output control, and operator intervention. The NIC regenerates and boosts network communications between FENWALNET 6000 Control Units and electrically isolates the networked control units from each other.

1-3.5 Fiber Optic Converter Card




Figure 1-10. Fiber Optic Converter Card

The Fiber Optic Converter Card (OCC), shown in Figure 1-10, converts electrical signals from the Network Interface Card into light pulses for data transmission over $62.5/125 \mu m$ duplex fiber optic media. The OCC permits distances of up to 1 mile (5,280 ft.) between networked FENWALNET 6000s.

1-3.6 Trim Ring




Figure 1-11. Trim Ring

A trim ring (Figure 1-11) is available to semi-flush mount the control unit.

1-4 SMARTONE® DETECTORS

The FENWALNET 6000 uses the SmartOne Series of intelligent smoke and heat detectors. These detectors have their own data transceivers, micro-controllers, micro-controller memory, and algorithms that allow the detectors to determine whether a normal, pre-alarm, alarm, or trouble condition exists at their monitoring locations. Each detector continuously transmits its current status to the FENWALNET 6000 through the signaling line circuit, and responds to control unit polling and inquiries by the address that is set in the detector using the Handheld Programmer, P/N 74-200013-001, or using the FENWALNET 6000's display. The pre-alarm and alarm thresholds are programmable for each detector.

A blinking LED on an intelligent detector indicates communications between the detector and the control unit.

1-4.1 SmartOne Ionization Smoke Detector, Model CPD-7052

The Model CPD-7052 Ionization Smoke Detector is a low-profile, intelligent smoke detector that uses an ionization sensing chamber. This detector can be utilized for open-area coverage or can be mounted in a duct with air velocities up to 2,000 feet per minute.




Figure 1-12. SmartOne Smoke Detector

Ionization detectors respond best to small smoke particles characteristic of flaming fires, and are used primarily in areas where such fires are anticipated. They are also used in special extinguishing systems as one criterion to release the extinguishing agent. See Figure 1-12.

Note: Older-style Model CPD-7040 Ionization Detectors may be used with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.

1-4.2 SmartOne Photoelectric Smoke Detector, Model PSD-7152

The Model PSD-7152 Photoelectric Smoke Detector is a low-profile, intelligent smoke detector that uses a light-scattering sensing chamber. This detector can be utilized for open-area coverage or can be mounted in a duct with air velocities up to 4,000 feet per minute.

Photoelectric detectors respond best to large smoke particles characteristic of smoldering fires, and are used primarily in areas where such fires are anticipated and in high-velocity underfloor applications. They are also used in special extinguishing systems as one criterion to release the extinguishing agent. See Figure 1-12.

Note: Older-style Model PSD-7140 Photoelectric Detectors may be used with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.

1-4.3 SmartOne Thermal Detector, Model THD-7252

The Model THD-7252 Thermal Detector is a low-profile, intelligent heat detector that uses a thermistor sensing chamber for fast response. This detector can be used for open-area coverage on low (< 10 ft.), flat ceilings with a spacing up to 70 ft. Smaller coverage is required for high ceilings and ceilings with structural obstructions.




Figure 1-13. THD-7252 Thermal Detector

1-4.4 Detector Bases

Two detector bases are available.

1-4.4.1 FLANGED DETECTOR BASE, MODEL 6SB

The Model 6SB Detector Base is used in applications where the detector's installed appearance is a primary consideration. This base mounts to standard 3-, $3\frac{1}{2}$ -, and 4-inch electrical boxes.




Figure 1-14. 6SB Detector Base (Flanged)

1-4.4.2 FLANGELESS DETECTOR BASE, MODEL 4SB

The Model 4SB Detector Base is used in underfloor applications, or in applications where the detector's installed appearance is not a primary consideration. This base mounts to standard 3- or $3\frac{1}{2}$ -inch electrical boxes.




Figure 1-15. 4SB Detector Base (Flangeless)

1-4.5 Detector Base Adapter, Model MA-002

The Model MA-002 Detector Base Adapter allows the low-profile SmartOne detectors to be retrofitted into the older-style SmartOne detector base, P/N 70-400000-001.




Figure 1-16. MA-002 Detector Base Adapter

1-4.6 Duct Housing, Model DH-2000

The Model DH-2000 Duct Housing is used to enclose an intelligent smoke detector that is monitoring for smoke in an air duct and is located outside of the duct. The duct housing is used with inlet and outlet tubes that allow the air in the duct to be sampled uniformly and transported to the enclosed smoke detector for obscuration-level measurement.

Note: Older-style DH-4000 Duct Housings with Model CPD-7040 Ionization Detectors or Model PSD-7140 Photoelectric Detectors may be used with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.




Figure 1-17. DH-2000 Duct-Detector Housing

1-5 SMARTONE ADDRESSABLE MODULES

SmartOne addressable modules are of four general types:

- Monitor Modules. These modules provide a uniquely-identifiable interface between the FENWALNET 6000 and an initiating device.
- Relay Module. This module supplies an unpowered, Form-C contact at a point-specific address.
- Control Modules. These modules provide a uniquely-identifiable interface between the FENWALNET 6000 and conventional notification appliances such as horns and strobes.
- Remote Releasing Modules. These modules provide the ability to remotely activate extinguishingsystem control devices (i.e., electro-explosive initiators and solenoid valves).

Each addressable module continuously transmits its current status to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit via the signaling line circuit, and responds to control unit polling, inquiries, and activation commands by the address that is set in the module using the Handheld Programmer, P/N 74-200013-001, or using the FENWALNET 6000's display.

1-5.1 Addressable Monitor Module, Model AI

The Model AI Addressable Monitor Module is used to monitor conventional, unpowered, contact-type initiating devices through a Class-B, Style-B initiating device circuit. The AI, P/N 70-4070X8-001, is used to monitor normally-open, contact-type initiating devices such as manual stations, waterflow switches, and supervisory switches. The AI, P/N 70-4070X8-002, is used to monitor normally-closed, contact-type initiating devices such as older-style supervisory switches.

The AI Modules are designed to be mounted in the electrical box of the device being monitored.

1-5.2 AnaLASER II Interface Module, Model AIM

The Model AIM AnaLASER II Interface Module is a monitor module that enables a High Sensitivity Smoke Detector (HSSD) to report pre-alarm, alarm, and trouble signals to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit via its signaling line circuit. The AIM mounts inside the AnaLASER II detector housing.

Note: The AIM address cannot be set via the Handheld Programmer. Use either the LaserNET Software or the FENWALNET 6000's display to set the AIM's address.




Figure 1-19. AnaLASER II Interface Module

1-5.3 Addressable AlarmLine Module, Model AAM

The Model AAM Addressable AlarmLine Module is a monitor module that enables an AlarmLine sensor cable to report pre-alarm and alarm or overheat events, and trouble signals to the FENWALNET 6000 through the signaling line circuit. The AAM, P/N 73-100001-001, is equipped with a metal cover plate for mounting to a 4" square electrical box. P/N 73-100003-001, is a surface-mount, NEMA-4 enclosure for the AAM.

1-5.4 Addressable Relay Module, Model AO

The Model AO Addressable Relay Module provides an unpowered, Form-C contact for remote control applications. The AO Module is designed to be mounted in the electrical box of the device being controlled.




Figure 1-21. AO Relay Module

Note: Older-style Relay Modules, P/N 70-40800X-000, may be used with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.

1-5.5 Addressable Signal Modules, Models ASM and ASM-6SB

The Addressable Signal Modules permit notification appliances to be controlled by commands issued via the FENWALNET 6000's SLC. The ASM is supplied in two versions; Model ASM is supplied with a thermoplastic mounting cover and Model ASM-6SB consists of an ASM connected to a Model 6SB Detector Base. Both versions are designed to mount in a standard 4-11/16" electrical box or a 4" square, extra-deep electrical box.

Note: Set the ASMs to the audio mode and install the end-of-line resistors across the troublemonitoring and output circuits before you address the ASMs with the Handheld Programmer or the FENWALNET 6000's display. Return the module to the Auxiliary Mode before you use the ASM with the FENWALNET 6000.




Figure 1-22. ASM Addressable Signal Module

1-5.6 Remote Releasing Module

The Remote Releasing Module (RRM) provides the ability to remotely activate extinguishingsystem control devices (for example, electro-explosive initiators and solenoid valves). Connection is via the Smart One-compatible Control Panel's Signalling Line Circuit (SLC). The module is field-programmable using the Control Panel keypad or Hand-Held Programmer.

A maximum of 64 RRMs can be activated consecutively via the FENWALNET 6000. Up to 16 RRMs can be configured in a group for simultaneous activation. The FENWALNET 6000 SLC can support up to 4 groups.

The RRM is intended for indoor dry location use, and is available in two models, one for mounting in a standard electrical box and a second model for mounting in suitable UL-864 Listed cabinets.

P/N 70-600000-001: Standard Mounting

- North American 4-11/16 in. electrical box with a double gang plaster ring (Rayco Model 841 or equivalent), 1/2 in. raised
- 4 in. square, 2-1/8 in. deep electrical box

1-6 ISOLATOR MODULES

Isolator modules are automatic switches that open a segment of the signaling line circuit when a shortcircuit fault is detected in that segment. The remainder of the signaling line circuit continues to function normally and is unaffected by the short-circuit fault. The isolator modules will close and resume normal operation when the short-circuit fault is removed.

Isolator module, P/N 74-200012-002, is supplied with a plastic cover plate for mounting to a singlegang electrical box. Isolator module, P/N 74-200012-004, is designed to mount in the electrical box for the Model 6SB detector base.




Figure 1-24. Isolator Modules

1-7 SPECIFICATIONS

1-7.1 Electrical Specifications

The electrical specifications for the FENWALNET 6000 are as follows:

1-7.1.1 PRIMARY AC POWER

Primary AC connections are made through AC input-power terminals, TB 13, on the FENWALNET 6000 main PCB. Wire size is #14 AWG minimum with 600 Vac insulation.

Primary power is selected by the setting of slide switch on the side of the power supply and by the setting of Switch S4 on the printed-circuit board. Refer to Paragraph 2-5 and Paragraph 2-7.

Note: Physically disconnect the standby battery and remove primary AC power if the power supply is accidentally short-circuited. Resume normal operations by restoring the AC power and physically reconnecting the standby battery after correcting the short-circuit fault.

- A short circuit between conductors in the wiring for the SLC, the outputs (NACs, release circuits, and combination circuits), the RS-485 communications circuit, and the battery-charging circuit will create a "Short" trouble condition.

Exception: Release circuits and combination circuits wired as non-power-limited.

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CHAPTER 2 INSTALLATION

This chapter is intended for system installers. It provides information necessary to successfully prepare for and install the FENWALNET[™] 6000 Fire Alarm and Suppression System. The system design is based on the requirements of Fenwal Protection Systems, Underwriters Laboratories (UL), the Factory Mutual System (FM), and codes and standards of the National Fire Protection Association. In all cases, the installation must meet the requirements of the local Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ).

Refer also to the Installer's Wiring Diagram, P/N 06-236405-002, that is packaged with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.

2-1 PREPARING FOR INSTALLATION

Complete the following preparation procedures before installing of the FENWALNET 6000 system.

2-1.1 Control-Unit Components

Check the contents of the FENWALNET 6000 shipping carton to ensure that you have received the following components:

2-1.2 Materials/Tools Required

The materials listed below are not supplied with the system, but are required for installation.

- The FCS 6000 Configuration Software is provided on a separate CD, P/N 06-330109-001.
- No. 10 or 1/4" mounting bolts to mount the control unit cabinet
- Electrical conduit for AC input power and field circuits
- Electrical junction boxes (as required)
- Wire-nuts and crimp-on terminals (as required)
- Wrist ground strap

2-1.3 Determining Installation Location

Choose a location in an area that allows easy access for operation and maintenance of the system. If a location has been designated by an architect and/or fire-prevention authority, plan your installation according to that location. It is important that the location of the system be clean, dry, vibration-free, and maintained within the operating limits.

2-3 INSTALLATION OVERVIEW

The following paragraphs provide an overview of installation steps once the system is unpacked and site preparation is completed.

2-3.1 Step One: Installing the Control Unit Back Box and Preparing Electrical Wiring

The control unit back box can be either surface or semi-flush mounted. For full mounting and installation procedures, see Paragraph 2-4.

In addition to back box mounting, the site must be prepared with appropriate electrical wiring before system installation can begin.

• Removing knockouts.

Knockouts must be removed from the control-unit back box to enable the connection between the conduit and the back box. Consult approved electrical installation drawings for connection information.

• Installing conduit.

Route properly-sized conduit from the control-unit back box to locations designated on the approved layout drawings for peripheral devices. Refer to the locations of the automatic and manual initiating devices, notification appliances, remote display/control modules, control heads for the extinguishing system, and addressable relay modules on the system drawings.

Electrical Boxes.

Install an electrical box at each designated location for peripheral devices such as automatic and manual initiating devices, notification appliances, control heads for the extinguishing system, and addressable relay modules. Refer to the installation instructions included with the peripheral devices for the proper types of electrical boxes.

• Electrical wiring

Route the properly-sized and required wiring through conduit from the control unit to the field devices. Observe the wiring manufacturer's recommended minimum bending radii for all internal-control-unit and external wiring. Use appropriate equipment to check and record the wiring for insulation resistance to earth ground. Measure and record the wiring resistance for all external circuits. Also measure and the record the SLC wiring capacitance. Refer to the approved electrical installation drawings and to the recommendations in this manual.

• Wiring Connections and SmartOne® Devices.

Mount and make wiring connections to the peripheral devices as shown in their installation instructions. Be sure that all SLC-based SmartOne devices have been electronically addressed prior to installation.

2-3.2 Step Two: Installing the FENWALNET 6000 Power Supply and Main PCB

- Install the FENWALNET 6000 power supply and main printed-circuit board.
- Dress and connect field wiring to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit's main printed-circuit board as shown on the approved system drawings and as illustrated in this manual.

2-3.3 Step Three: Connecting AC Power and Standby Battery

Apply AC power, then connect the standby battery.

2-3.4 Step Four: Auto-Configuring the System

Auto-configure the system as directed in Paragraph 3-2.5.2.4.28, or run the AutoLearn Procedure as shown in Paragraph 3-2.5.2.4.26. Print out the list of SLC-based initiating devices and addressable control and/or relay modules detected by these procedures and compare this list to the approved set of SLC devices. Correct any inconsistencies and/or trouble messages.

Installation

2-3.5 Step Five: Uploading the Application Program and Performing the Pre-Test

Upload the site-specific application program, and pre-test the system in accordance with the approved sequence of operation. Be sure that extinguishing-system actuation devices are not connected to the extinguishing system during pre-testing.

2-3.6 Step Six: Performing Final System Test and Commissioning the System

Final test and commission the system in the presence of the owner and the authority having jurisdiction. Be sure that extinguishing-system actuation devices are not connected to the extinguishing system during final testing.

2-3.7 Step Seven: Installing the Actuation Devices and Extinguishing System


Connect the actuation devices to the extinguishing system per the procedures in the applicable agent-storage-container installation manual.

2-3.8 Step Eight: Performing Final Installation Procedures


Install the front door when testing is completed, all appropriate occupancy certificates have been secured, the end user has been thoroughly trained in the system operation, and the system is armed and ready for service. Lock the front door and give the key to the end user's designated personnel.

2-4 MOUNTING THE CABINET/ENCLOSURE

The control unit can be surface or semi-flush mounted. Figure 2-1 shows the control-unit-enclosure dimensions. All dimensions are in inches.



Note: All dimensions are in inches.



2-4.1 Preparing the Enclosure for Wall Mounting

For either mounting configuration:

- 1. Remove the keys from the envelope taped to the top of the enclosure and open the door to the control unit.
- 2. Disconnect the ground wire that connects the enclosure door to the back box.
- 3. Remove the control unit front door first by unlocking it and rotating the door approximately 90° from its closed position.
- 4. Lift up the door to allow the door's hinge pins to clear the mating-hinge sockets on the back box.
- 5. Remove the separately packaged power supply, printed-circuit board, and plastic bag (i.e., ship kit) containing installation hardware, and set them and the front door aside in a safe location to prevent damage.
- 6. Locate the top of the cabinet approximately 66" above the floor so that the control unit's display is positioned at a convenient height for viewing system events and for entering operator commands.

2-4.2 Surface Mounting

To surface mount the control unit:




Figure 2-2. Back Box Mounting Dimensions

1. Mark and pre-drill holes for four mounting bolts using the dimensions shown in Figure 2-2. The installer must supply the mounting bolts (up to size 1/4-20). There are two holes and two keyhole slots in the enclosure's rear panel that serve as a template for surface mounting.

- 2. Insert the upper two fasteners in the wall. Leave approximately 1/4" protruding for both screws.
- 3. Slip upper keyholes of the back box over the two protruding screws. Tighten the screws.
- 4. Insert and tighten the two lower screws.
- 5. Attach wiring conduit to the enclosure via the enclosure knockouts, and pull the required number of wires through the conduit to the enclosure. Leave approximately 2 to 3 feet of wire length in the enclosure for future internal connections.

2-4.3 Semi-Flush Mounting

To semi-flush mount the control unit:

1. Cut and plumb an opening approximately 14.25" wide by 19" high in the wall on which the control unit will be semi-flush mounted.




Figure 2-3. Semi-Flush Mounting Dimensions


- 2. Position and plumb the back box in the opening made in Step 1. Ensure that the front edge of the back box is at least 3/4 inches from the surface of the wall. Refer to Figure 2-3. Secure the back box to the wall with appropriate mounting bolts (up to size 1/4-20).
- 3. Attach wiring conduit to the enclosure through the enclosure knockouts, and pull the required number of wires through the conduit to the enclosure. Leave approximately 2 to 3 feet of wire length in the enclosure for future internal connections.


2-5 INSTALLING THE POWER SUPPLY



Use a ground strap to prevent static discharge that could damage the power supply.

- **Note:** Make sure the control unit location is dry and that the enclosure is free of construction dust and metal shavings prior to installing the power supply.
 - 1. Remove the power supply unit from its shipping carton.
 - 2. Connect the wire harness that is packaged in the installation kit. Next connect the fork end of the green ground wire that is also part of the installation kit to the earth-ground terminal of the power supply. Refer to Figure 2-4 for wire harness and earth-ground connections.





- 3. Locate the 3 x 10 mm mounting screw in the installation kit and thread it part way into the lower of the two threaded holes of the power supply unit. See Figure 2-4.




Figure 2-5. Primary Power Selection Switch

- 4. Ensure that the power supply unit AC-input-voltage selector switch is set to the proper position for either 120 Vac or 220/240 Vac. See Figure 2-5.

- 5. Locate the two power-supply-unit retention tabs and the fastening tab in the enclosure's back panel.
- 6. Position the power-supply unit with the wire harness down, and then slide it onto the retention tabs. The 3×10 mm mounting screw should slide into the slot of the fastening tab at the same time.
- 7. Tighten the screw onto the fastening tab.
- 8. Connect the ring end of the power supply's green ground wire to the lower earth-ground stud on the left side of the enclosure.

2-6 INSTALLING THE PRINTED CIRCUIT BOARD (PCB)



Use a ground strap to prevent static discharge that could damage sensitive components on the main PCB.





Figure 2-6. PCB Installation

Refer to Figure 2-6 before you unpack and install the PCB within the enclosure.

Note: Make sure the control unit location is dry and that the enclosure is free of construction dust and metal shavings prior to installing the PCB.


- 1. Locate the nine (9) 2-1/4 in. aluminum standoffs in the installation kit and screw one securely into each of the nine (9) threaded PEMs in the back surface of the enclosure.
- 2. Slip on a wrist ground strap and clip the ground strap to the earth ground in the enclosure. Do not remove the PCB from its shipping carton unless you have established a common earth-ground potential among yourself, the enclosure, and the PCB's shipping carton.
- 3. Remove the PCB from its shipping carton and position each of its nine (9) mounting holes over one of the aluminum standoffs so that the AC-input terminal block is in the lower-left corner.
- 4. Secure the PCB to the standoffs using the eight (8) short washer-and-screw assemblies supplied in the installation kit.

Note: Do not tighten the screws at this time.

The PCB mounting hole in the lower left corner utilizes a longer nylon screw that also holds the AC Safety Cover in place. See Section 2-7.1.

- 5. Refer to Figure 2-7 and place the free end of the longer of the two factory-installed Earth-Ground wires under the screw assembly of the main printed-circuit board as shown before tightening. Tighten the remaining eight screws. Be careful not to over-tighten.
- 6. Plug the harness from the power-supply unit into Connector J12 in the lower-left-hand corner of the PCB.





2-7 AC AND DC POWER CONNECTIONS

The control unit uses commercially- or end-user-provided AC power as the primary power source, together with a 24 Vdc standby battery (when required by local codes and/or Authority Having Jurisdiction [AHJ] requirements).



Two different sources of power can be connected to the control unit. Disconnect both sources of power and critical components such as control heads for special extinguishing systems and addressable pilot relays controlling facility-power shutoff before servicing the control unit. The control unit and associated equipment may be damaged by connecting wiring while the control unit is energized.



Use caution when connecting power. High-voltage and AC-powered circuits are present in the control unit. Be sure to adequately ground the control unit to reduce the risk of electrical shock.

2-7.1 AC Power Connection

The primary AC power for the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit is 120 Vac, 50/60 Hz, 3.2 A or 220/240 Vac, 50/60Hz, 1.6A. The default power configuration is 120 Vac and will require resetting for 220/240 Vac operation. Configuration of primary AC power requires that the power-selection switch on the side of the power supply be set correctly before the power supply

is installed in the enclosure, and that Switch S4 in the lower-left corner of the printed-circuit board be set to agree with the primary AC power being used. Refer to Paragraph 2-5.

Over-current protection for this circuit must comply with Article 760 of the National Electrical Code (NEC) and/or the local electrical code. Use a grounded power cord of #14 AWG or larger wire with 600 Vac rating to make the AC power connection to the control unit. Follow the procedure below to make AC power connections.

- 1. Disconnect all power sources from the control unit and the AC power cord
- 2. Run AC-input wiring to the left side of the enclosure, and preferably, use the lowest of the three knock-outs on the left-hand side as the entry point for primary power.
- 3. Connect the primary power earth-ground (green) wire to the lower Earth Ground stud on the left inside of the enclosure.
- 4. Connect the neutral (white) wire to the Main Circuit Board Terminal Block TB13 labeled 'N' (Neutral).
- 5. Connect the hot (black) wire to the Main Circuit Board Terminal Block TB13 labeled 'L' (Line).




Figure 2-8. Primary-Power Connections

- 6. Remove the AC Safety Cover, 3/4" nylon spacer, and 1-1/8" nylon screw from the installation kit. Fold the cover along its scored lines and install it over the AC power input terminals, as shown in Figure 2-8.

7. Set AC-Power-Selection Switch S4 on the main printed-circuit board to correspond to the AC input power (120 Vac, 50/60 Hz, or 220/240 Vac, 50/60 Hz) being used.

2-7.2 DC Power Connection



Batteries contain sulfuric acid that can cause severe burns to the skin and eyes and can damage clothing. Immediately flush areas of the skin or eyes that have been contacted with sulfuric acid for 15 minutes with water and seek medical attention promptly.

Note: Observe polarity when connecting the battery to the control unit.

To connect the standby battery to the control unit:

1. Calculate the size of the battery required for the application. Refer to Appendix A for the proper procedure.




Figure 2-9. Standby Battery Connections

2. Connect two 12-volt, series-wired batteries of the required ampere-hour (AH) capacity to printed-circuit board Terminals TB3 using the battery cable. See Figure 2-9.

2-8 SIGNALING LINE CIRCUIT

The signaling line circuit (SLC) is the communications path between the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit and the SmartOne field devices. The SLC can be wired to meet NFPA 72 Class-A, Style-6 and -7 or Class-B, Style-4 requirements.

The SLC can accommodate any combination of up to 255 devices, which include SmartOne automatic initiating devices, monitor modules, relay modules, and control modules.

2-8.1 SLC Wiring Requirements

All SLC wiring must be twisted, unshielded, low-capacitance, fire-alarm-system wire. Refer to Appendix B for recommended wire types.

2-8.1.1 CLASS-B, STYLE-4 WIRING REQUIREMENTS

The total wiring resistance from the control unit to the end of each individual branch line cannot exceed 40 ohms. Use the following procedure to determine the wiring resistance.




Figure 2-10. Measuring Class-B SLC Wiring Resistance

- 1. Short the ends of each branch line one at a time. Measure the resistance from the terminating points at the control unit to the end of the branch line. See Figure 2-10.
- 2. Remove the shorting jumper after each branch-line resistance measurement.

The total wiring capacitance cannot exceed 0.5 $\mu F.$ Use the following procedure to determine the wiring capacitance.

- 1. Ensure that the ends of each branch line are open circuited.





Figure 2-11. Measuring Class-B SLC Wiring Capacitance

- 2. Measure the capacitance from the terminating points at the control unit using a capacitance meter. See Figure 2-11.



2-8.1.2 CLASS-A, STYLE-6 WIRING REQUIREMENTS

Note: The following resistance reading MUST be taken PRIOR to the installation of any peripheral device.

The total wiring resistance from the start of the "Out" leg to the end of the "Return" leg cannot exceed 40 ohms. Use the following procedure to determine the wiring resistance.

- 1. Short the "Out" and "Return" legs as shown in Figure 2-13. Measure the resistance using the other two terminating points at the control unit
- 2. Remove the shorting jumper after the resistance measurement.




Volt-Ohm Meter

The total wiring capacitance cannot exceed 0.5 μ F. Use the following procedure to determine the wiring capacitance.

- **Note:** The following capacitance reading MUST be taken PRIOR to the installation of any peripheral device.
 - 1. Measure the capacitance using the wiring that will connect to control unit terminals TB1-1 and TB1-3 (Terminals TB1-2 and TB1-4 MUST remain disconnected from the control unit) as shown in Figure 2-14.





Capacitance Meter

Note: Isolator modules are not required for a Class-A, Style-6 signaling line circuit. A maximum of 30 SmartOne devices can be installed between a pair of isolator modules.





2-9 NOTIFICATION APPLIANCE CIRCUITS

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit has two notification-appliance circuits (NACs) that are labeled NAC1 and NAC2. These circuits have field-wiring connections that terminate at TB5 and TB14, respectively. Each NAC can supply up to 1.5 A of current at a nominal 24 Vdc for polarized notification appliances. Total current output of the FENWALNET 6000 power supply must not exceed 5.4 A.

Both circuits are supervised, power limited, and are compatible with conventional, UL-Listed, 24-Vdc notification appliances. They can also be used with the following Fenwal synchronizable horns and strobes:

- MT Series Multi-Tone Horns and Horn/Strobes
- NS Series Horn/Strobes
- NH Series Horns
- RSS(P) Series Strobes

The NS Series notification appliances provide the option to use silenceable horns and non-silenceable strobes on the same NAC. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure one or both NACs for use with the NS Series notification appliances.




Figure 2-17. Class-A, Style-Z Notification-Appliance Circuit

Figure 2-17 shows typical wiring for a Class-A, Style-Z notification appliance circuit.






Figure 2-18. Class-B, Style-Y Notification-Appliance Circuit

2-10 COMBINATION CIRCUITS

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit has two combination circuits that can be used either as notification-appliance circuits (NACs) or as releasing circuits for solenoid valves. The combination circuits are labeled Combo1 and Combo2. These circuits have field-wiring connections that terminate at TB7 and TB6, respectively.

2-10.1 Combination Circuits used as NACs

Each combination circuit can supply up to 1.5 A of current at a nominal 24 Vdc for polarized notification appliances when configured as a NAC. Total current output of the FENWALNET 6000 power supply must not exceed 5.4 A.

Both combination circuits are supervised and power limited when configured as NACs. They are compatible with conventional, UL-Listed, 24-Vdc notification appliances. They can also be used with the following Fenwal horns and strobes:

- MT Series Multi-Tone Horns and Horn/Strobes
- NS Series Horn/Strobes
- NH Series Horns
- RSS(P) Series Strobes




Figure 2-20. Combination Circuit used as Class-A, Style-Z NAC

The NS Series notification appliances provide the option to use silenceable horns and nonsilenceable strobes on the same NAC. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure one or both combination circuits as NACs and to configure them for use with the Fenwal NS Series notification appliances. Figure 2-20 shows typical wiring for a combination circuit wired as a Class-A, Style-Z notification appliance circuit.




Figure 2-21. Combination Circuit used as Class-B, Style-Y NAC

2-10.2 Combination Circuits used as Releasing Circuits

Each combination circuit can be configured as a releasing circuit to activate either one Fenwal control head or one pre-action-sprinkler or deluge-sprinkler valve. Total current output of the FENWALNET 6000 power supply must not exceed 5.4 A.

Both combination circuits are supervised and power limited when configured as releasing circuits and when the in-line device, P/N 06-220023-001, is wired in series with the solenoid valve. The compatible control heads and solenoid valves are listed in Appendix C. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure one or both combination circuits as releasing circuits.

Route non-power limited wiring at least 1/4 inch away from all power-limited wiring.



Ensure that all releasing devices are physically disconnected from the releasing circuits before performing any system testing or maintenance.





Figure 2-22. Combination Circuit used as Releasing Circuit

Figure 2-22 shows a combination circuit wired for releasing. Refer to Appendix C for further information.

2-11 RELEASING CIRCUITS

The FENWALNET 6000 has two releasing circuits that can be configured to actuate extinguishing systems through any of the following ways:

- Series-wired initiator assemblies
- Single control head or solenoid valve
- Two series-supervised, parallel-actuated control heads or solenoid valves.

The release circuits are labeled Release1 and Release2 and have field-wiring connections that terminate at TB12 and TB11, respectively.



2-11.1 Releasing Circuits for Series-Wired Initiator Assemblies



Initiator assemblies are Class-C explosives. Always use safety glasses or a face shield when handling them. Do not remove the shorting cap from the initiator assembly until the assembly is installed in the agent-storage container. Physical abuse or static-electricity discharge could cause inadvertent initiator actuation and personnel injury. The installer must establish a common electrical potential with the initiator assembly and the agentstorage container before either removing or inserting the shorting cap.

Figure 2-23 shows series-wired initiators connected to a releasing circuit. Each releasing circuit is capable of either one of the following two arrangements:

- A maximum of 12 P/N 31-199932-004 initiators, connected in series, with a total-circuit resistance of 10 ohms +/- 1 ohm.
- A maximum of 6 P/N 93-191001-001 initiators, connected in series, with a total-circuit resistance of 10 ohms+/- 1 ohm.


These two types of initiators must not be mixed together on the same release circuit. A releasing circuit is supervised and non-power-limited when used with series-wired initiators. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure one or both releasing circuits to actuate series-wired initiator assemblies.

Route non-power-limited wiring at least 1/4 inch away from all power-limited wiring.



Do not measure the total resistance of the initiator circuit with any instrument other than a blasting galvanometer or similar device with a maximum current output of 50 mA. Do not use a megohmeter with a current output greater than 50 mA to check the initiatorcircuit wiring for low impedance paths to earth ground.

Note: Choose compensating resistor so that total initiator-circuit resistance is 10 ohms +/- 1 ohm. Use resistor rated for 1/2 watt. Contact Fenwal Technical Support for information about ordering the correct compensating resistor.





2-11.2 Releasing Circuits for Single Control Head or Solenoid Valve




Figure 2-24. Releasing-Circuit Wiring for Single Solenoid

Each releasing circuit can be configured to activate either one Fenwal control head or one preaction-sprinkler or deluge-sprinkler valve. Total current output of the FENWALNET 6000 power supply must not exceed 5.4 A. Figure 2-24 shows a releasing circuit wired for singlecontrol-head or single-solenoid-valve actuation.

A releasing circuit is supervised and power limited when the in-line device, P/N 06-220023-001, is wired in series with the single control head or solenoid valve. See Appendix C for compatible control heads and solenoid valves. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure the releasing circuits for single-control-head or single-solenoid-valve actuation.

Route non-power-limited wiring at least 1/4 inch away from all power-limited wiring.

2-11.3 Releasing Circuits for Dual Control Heads or Solenoid Valves




Figure 2-25. Releasing-Circuit Wiring for Dual Solenoids

Each releasing circuit can be configured to activate either dual Fenwal control heads or dual pre-action-sprinkler or deluge-sprinkler valves that do not exceed the maximum release circuit current of 2.4A. It can also activate combinations of Fenwal control heads and/or pre-action/deluge sprinkler valves that do not exceed the maximum release circuit current of 2.4A. Total current output of the FENWALNET 6000 power supply must not exceed 5.4 A. Figure 2-25 shows a releasing circuit wired for dual-control-head or dual-solenoid-valve actuation.

Note: Total combined control head and/or solenoid current must not exceed 2.4A (continuous output).

A releasing circuit is supervised and power limited when the in-line device, P/N 06-220023-001, is wired in series with each of the two control heads or solenoid valves. See Appendix C for compatible control heads and solenoid valves. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure the releasing circuits for dual-control-head or dual-solenoid-valve actuation.

Route non-power-limited wiring at least 1/4 inch away from all power-limited wiring. Do not attach power-limited and non-power-limited wiring to the same terminal block.

2-12 AUXILIARY POWER OUTPUTS





Figure 2-26. Auxiliary-Power Terminals

Figure 2-26 shows the auxiliary-power terminals on the main printed-circuit board. Both outputs are configurable for either resettable or non-resettable operation. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programmer's Guide to configure the auxiliary-power outputs.

Both auxiliary-power outputs are power-limited.

Note: Each output 1.0 A (max.) @ 24 Vdc (nominal)









2-14 RELAYS




Figure 2-30. Programmable and Trouble Relays

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit has three Form-C, programmable relays and one Form-C, trouble relay as shown in Figure 2-30. All of these relays have the following contact ratings:

- 1.0 A @ 30 Vdc (resistive)
- 0.5 A @ 30 Vdc (inductive)
- 0.5 A @ 120 Vac (inductive)

2-15 RS-232 COMMUNICATIONS PORT

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit has two RS-232 communications ports (J3/RS232B and J8/RS232A) to connect to the Intelligent Interface Module (IIM) and various third-party supplementary devices such as serial printers and graphical monitoring systems.

Note: It is recommended that the RS232B port (J3) be used when only a single RS232 port is necessary.

The default parameters for these communications ports are:

- 9600 Baud Rate
- No Parity
- 8 Bit Word Length
- 1 Start Bit
- 1 Stop Bit

The RS-232 connection to the main printed-circuit board is via an RJ12 socket. The following signals are communicated via the RJ12 socket's pins:




Figure 2-31. RS-232 Communications Ports

2-16 USB COMMUNICATIONS PORT

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit has one USB communications port to act as a device for a laptop computer being used to upload and download a system configuration or to download the event logs.

The USB port connects to the laptop computer via a standard USB cable.

Note: When using the USB port, the ground fault circuitry is not functional. The USB port is to be used to download configurations and operating system software only. It is not intended to be used on a permanent basis. A ground fault will be reported if the USB cable is connected and no communications activity has occurred for 30 minutes. Do not connect or disconnect the USB cable while the control unit is powering up on system startup or initializing after a new configuration upload.




Figure 2-32. USB Communications Port

2-17 NETWORK INTERFACE CARD

The Network Interface Card (NIC) contains the circuitry for data communications between networked FENWALNET 6000 Control Units. One NIC is required for each networked control unit, and the control units transmit and receive messages via the RS-485 format.

The NIC supports Class-B, Style-4 or Class-A, Style-7 interconnecting wiring, and acts as a repeater to boost and regenerate the communications signals. One wire on each communications channel is an isolated, floating RS-485 transceiver and the other wire is a non-isolated, grounded RS-485 transceiver. This isolates the chassis of the networked control units to enable ground-fault detection and to eliminate ground loops.

Specifications for the NIC are provided in Table 2-3.

2-17.1 How to Install a NIC





Figure 2-33. NIC Installation

Refer to Figure 2-33 before you install the NIC and perform the following procedure to install the NIC on the FENWALNET 6000's printed-circuit board.



Remove AC and DC power from the control unit before you install a NIC.

- 1. Slip on a wrist ground strap and connect the clip to the earth ground in the enclosure. Do not remove the NIC from its shipping carton unless you have established a common earth-ground potential among yourself, the enclosure, and the NIC's shipping carton.
- 2. Remove the four screws holding the keypad / display to the main PCB. Carefully pull out the keypad/display from its connectors to the PCB and set aside in a clean, dry location.
- 3. Remove the NIC from its shipping carton and locate the three plastic standoffs included in the installation kit. Insert these standoffs into the three mounting holes in the PCB as shown in Figure 2-33.
- 4. Carefully insert the NIC into the 20-pin connector J5 and attach it to the three plastic standoffs.
- 5. Secure the upper left-hand corner of the NIC with the long screw and spacer supplied with the installation kit. The spacer will separate the NIC and the PCB and the screw will connect to the chassis. Do not over-tighten the screw.
- 6. Carefully plug the display into its receptacles on the PCB and re-attached with the four screws. Be sure that the display pins and the PCB receptacles are properly aligned.
- 7. Connect network wiring as shown in Paragraph 2-17.2.

2-17.2 Network Wiring

Note: Do not T-Tap the network wiring. Use serial wiring style only. Do not run wiring back from Node N to Node 1.







Figure 2-34. Class-B, Style-4 Network Wiring

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

- Connect wires for shields together at each intermediate NIC. Do not connect wires for shields to the earth-ground screw in upper-left-hand corner of intermdiate NICs.
- Do not T-Tap the network wiring. Use diasy-chained wiring style only.
- Do not daisy chain wiring back from Node N to Node 1.

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2-18 FIBER-OPTIC CONVERTER CARD

The Fiber-Optic Converter Card allows networked FENWALNET 6000 Control Units to be interconnected using fiber-optic medium. Use one OCC to terminate each end of a fiber-optic communications-channel(s) segment. The FENWALNET 6000 networking structure supports a mixture of fiber-optic and twisted-wire interconnections among networked control units.

Specifications for the Fiber-Optic Converter Card are provided in Table 2-4.





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CHAPTER 3 SYSTEM OPERATIONS

3-1 FENWALNET 6000 SYSTEM OPERATIONS OVERVIEW

This chapter addresses operation of individual and networked FENWALNET 6000 systems.

The FENWALNET 6000 System uses field-programmable software. Refer to the Configuration Software User's Guide in P/N 74-600000-008 for instructions on how to program the FENWALNET 6000 System.

3-2 SYSTEM OPERATION

This section instructs the end-user how to operate a FENWALNET 6000 System, including how to distinguish the different operating states, how to use the operator keys, and what the status indicating LEDs mean.

Refer also to the Operating Instructions, P/N 06-236405-001, that are packaged with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.

3-2.1 Operating States

The FENWALNET 6000 system has two operating modes: Normal and Off-Normal. Normal Mode is characterized by the absence of any initiating signals from either automatic detectors or monitor modules, and by the absence of trouble conditions. Off-Normal Mode is triggered by system events or operator interrogation via the keypad. Off-Normal Mode operating states are listed in Table 3-1.

Operating State	Triggering Event(s)
Access-Via-Menu	A operator uses the keypad to isolate initiating devices and/or outputs, list configuration settings and the application program, adjust configuration settings, or manually initiate testing procedures.
Trouble	A report of a problem that could prevent the FENWALNET 6000 System from proper operation. Typical trouble signals include: Lack of response from a configured device on the signaling line circuit; Internal fault reported by a SmartOne® detector; Loss of monitoring integrity of the installation conductors; Power-supply fault; and/or Loss of primary AC power.
Alarm	An automatic spot-type smoke or heat detector or a high-sensitivity smoke detector senses a fire signature that is greater than the detector's programmable alarm threshold, or when a monitor module programmed as a manual-alarm, manual-release, waterflow or general-alarm point activates.
Pre-Alarm	An automatic spot-type smoke, heat detector or a high-sensitivity smoke detector senses a fire signature that is greater than a programmable, lower-level warning threshold but less than the detector's programmable alarm threshold.
Supervisory	A monitor module detects a condition such as gate-valve closure, low air pressure or water level, or pump failure that could impair the operation of a building's sprinkler system. It also enters this state when an operator isolates any initiating or control devices or control- unit-based output circuits. This mode is primarily event-driven.

3-2.2 Outputs Activation

The FENWALNET 6000 System operation is control by events. Control-unit-based or signaling-line-circuit-based outputs are activated by user-specified operating instructions contained in the system's event output control (EOC) program. The EOC program is triggered by any event that transitions the system from the Normal Mode to an event-driven, Off-Normal operating state.

Note: All alarm events must be annunciated by public-mode notification.

3-2.3 Operator Keys

Operator keys for the FENWALNET 6000 System are located on the display inside the control unit. The control unit door must be open to access the operator keys.




Figure 3-1. Display Panel

Figure 3-1 shows the location of the operator keys and status indicating LEDs on the display. Table 3-2 lists the names and functions of the operator keys on the display.

3-2.5 Operating Instructions

The following paragraphs give general operating instructions for a stand-alone system.

3-2.5.1 NORMAL OPERATION

There are no active events such as alarms or troubles during Normal Mode operation. The control unit continuously monitors all initiating devices and supervised circuits for any changes of state.




Figure 3-2. Normal Operation Display

The LCD display shows the "System Status Normal" message, the time and date, and an optional user-defined custom message as shown in Figure 3-2.

3-2.5.2 MENU OPERATION

The FENWALNET 6000 has a built-in menu structure. This menu structure has been implemented to aid users with system operating functions. The following paragraphs describe the menu structure, how to access the menu, menu functions, and how to exit the menu.

An operator can use menu operation to:

- Isolate initiating devices and/or outputs
- List configuration settings and the application program
- Adjust configuration settings
- Initiate manual testing procedures

An operator cannot use menu operation if:

- He is attempting to access the main menu via an RDCM while another operator already has access to the system
- Another operator already has access to the system through the configuration program's terminal-emulation mode (Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programming Guide for information on terminal-emulation mode.)

Any of the following events cancel Menu operation:

- An alarm signal
- An operator presses the <Backspace> Key at the main menu.
- A period of 60 seconds elapses from the last pressed key.

 - **Note:** The control unit continuously monitors all initiating devices and outputs for any state change while in menu operation.

The main menu functions are shown in Figure 3-3.

Most functions will require additional data to be entered to implement the function, such as a device address or desired alarm threshold.




Figure 3-4. FENWALNET 6000 Menu Functions and Top-Level Displays

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


Figure 3-5. Menu Functions




Figure 3-6. Menu Functions Cont.

3-2.5.2.2 Isolate Menu Functions

The Isolate functions prevent the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit from acting upon signals from initiating devices or from issuing activation commands to control unit-based and SLC-based outputs. The initiating devices and outputs remain operational, but are disconnected from the control unit in the sense that events reported by isolated initiating devices are ignored by the control unit and commands to activate are ignored by isolated outputs and control modules.

A Supervisory signal will occur after each Isolation command is executed, and will remain in effect until all Isolation commands are subsequently cancelled by their corresponding De-Isolation commands.

For Top-Level Isolate Menu Functions, refer to Figure 3-4. For the complete Isolate-Menu tree, refer to Figure 3-5.

The following paragraphs list the Isolate Menu functions.

Operation of a manual-release station will cause all alarm and shutdown devices to operate as if the system had operated automatically and will cause an immediate activation of the fire-extinguishing system. Each AO output module with address within the range of 111 to 115 will be assigned as a pre-alarm output point.

Each AO output module with address within the range of 116 to 120 will be assigned as a pre-release output point.

Each AO output module with address within the range of 121 to 125 will be assigned as a release output point.

2. Sequence of Operation

The FENWALNET 6000 will progress through the pre-alarm, prerelease, and release states as defined in Paragraph 3-2.5.8.1. The time delay between the pre-release and the release states will be 30 seconds.

3-2.5.2.6 System Passwords

Password entry is required for all menu operations.

The FENWALNET 6000 System provides two distinct levels of program protection, as required by UL Standard 864. The user can only access the menu system by entering a valid password. Typical valid passwords consist of six digits, but may be up to eight characters in length.

There are two security levels:

- Level One, reserved for the system owner. This is the lowest-level security.
- Level Two, reserved for the system installer. This is medium-level security.

Passwords can consist of up to eight numeric characters (0 - 9) which allows access from the display. Alphanumeric characters can only be used with the FCS program; however, if used, they will lock out any possible entry to the menus from the display. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programming Guide for the procedure to create alphanumeric passwords. Table 3-5 describes the different password levels and their functions.

 Table 3-5. Password Levels and Descriptions

Password Level	Description
1	Level 1 passwords permit the owner to isolate devices and circuits, view events and system configuration, set certain parameters such as the time and date, and run low-level tests such as a battery-voltage check.
2	Level 2 passwords permit the installer to access to all of the options available to the owner, plus many more options that include changes to device configuration such as smoke- detector sensitivity settings and expanded testing capabilities such as alarm-simulation testing.

If alphanumeric passwords are necessary for a particular application, it is recommended that the Level One password be numeric and the Level Two password be alphanumeric so as to allow the user to retrieve system information (system information lists) and also to prevent a user from changing any programmed system parameters.

The FENWALNET 6000 System provides protection from unauthorized entry to the system menus by utilizing two levels of default passwords–Level One and Level Two. This feature provides two separate passwords which increases the security of the system. Default passwords are set when the system is shipped from Fenwal. Table 3-6 lists the default passwords.

Passwords can be changed following installation. Each password can be up to eight alphanumeric characters in length. Use the menu to select the "Set Programming Password" option to change the default numeric passwords.

3-2.5.3 TROUBLE STATE

The FENWALNET 6000 enters the Trouble State when an event occurs such as an open in a supervised installation conductor or a Level-1 or -2 Pre-Alarm reported by a high-sensitivity smoke detector (HSSD) communicating through the Intelligent Interface Module (IIM).

The upper line of the LCD display shows the trouble event by the device or circuit address, the type of trouble event and its state change, and the device or circuit type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the device or circuit using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-7. Typical Trouble Message Display

The following actions also occur when any trouble condition is reported:

- The Trouble LED on the display flashes
- The internal buzzer pulses
- The Trouble Relay de-energizes to transfer the Trouble contacts
- The trouble event is stored in the event log
- The trouble message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs and ATM-Ls, if applicable
- The trouble message is communicated via the RS-232 ports.
- Point- or group-specific and general trouble outputs activate, including previously silenced outputs.

3-2.5.3.1 What to Do When a Trouble Occurs

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to change the Trouble LED from flashing to steady and to silence the internal buzzer.

It will be necessary to press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key once for each trouble report if multiple unacknowledged trouble events are present and the multiple-trouble-event-acknowledgment-option has not been selected. (See Paragraph 3-2.5.2.4.37 to enable the multiple trouble event acknowledgment options.)

Each acknowledged trouble event (or block of events when the multipletrouble-event-acknowledgment option is used) will disappear from the display. The display changes to indicate the next unacknowledged trouble event in the case of multiple trouble events. The active troubles can be manually displayed in order of occurrence using the <SCROLL> Key at this time, after all trouble events have been acknowledged. A summary of the number of active trouble events will be displayed as shown in Figure 3-8 at the conclusion of each manual scroll cycle.

A trouble event that occurs after all previous trouble events are acknowledged will re-initialize the Trouble State as defined in Paragraph 3-2.5.3.

3-2.5.3.2 Trouble Resound

The internal buzzer will resound if one or more acknowledged trouble conditions are still active 24 hours after they were acknowledged. The display will show the following message:

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to silence the buzzer. The resound trouble signal will also be automatically retransmitted to the supervising station. Retransmission is accomplished by energizing the trouble relay for one minute and then de-energizing it.

3-2.5.3.3 How to Reset the Control Unit After a Trouble Condition

Trouble conditions are non-latching, except for an open circuit in an SLC configured for Class-A, Style-6 or -7 operation. There is no indication that a trouble event has cleared when multiple, acknowledged troubles are present. The only indication will be that the trouble event as depicted in Figure 3-7 has disappeared from the set of manually scrolled events and that the total number of troubles displayed in Figure 3-8 has decreased.

The system will automatically return to normal operations when all of the trouble events have cleared if events were non-latching troubles.

Press the <Reset> switch to return to normal operations after an open circuit in an SLC configured for Class-A wiring has been repaired.

3-2.5.4 ALARM STATE

The Alarm State occurs when the FENWALNET 6000 receives an emergency signal from an alarm-initiating device such as a smoke detector, a manual release station, or a waterflow switch, or a Level-2 Alarm signal reported by a high-sensitivity smoke detector (HSSD) communicating through the Intelligent Interface Module (IIM)

The upper line of the LCD display shows the event by the device address, the change of state, and the device type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the initiating device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-10. Typical Alarm Message Display

The following actions also occur when any alarm condition is reported:

- The Alarm LED on the display flashes
- The internal buzzer sounds continuously
- The alarm event is stored in the event log
- The alarm message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs and ATM-Ls, if applicable

- The alarm message is communicated via the NIC and RS-232 ports, as applicable
- Point- or group-specific and general-alarm outputs will activate, including previously-silenced outputs.
- 3-2.5.4.1 What to Do When an Alarm Occurs

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to change the Alarm LED from flashing to steady illumination and to silence the internal buzzer.

It will be necessary to press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key once for each device in alarm if multiple unacknowledged alarm events are present. All alarm acknowledgments are logged.

The display changes to indicate the next unacknowledged alarm event in the case of multiple alarm events.




Figure 3-11. Typical Message After Alarm Manual Scroll Cycle

The active alarms and acknowledged alarm-initiating devices can then be manually displayed, in the format of Figure 3-10, in order of occurrence using the <SCROLL> Key. A summary of the number of active alarm events will be displayed as shown in Figure 3-11 at the conclusion of each manual scroll cycle.

3-2.5.4.2 Alarm Silencing

Press the <Silence> Key to de-activate any silenceable outputs such as NACs and SLC-based signal or relay modules after all alarms have been acknowledged. Outputs are made silenceable through the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program. The control unit will display the following message for 5 to 10 seconds.

You may then manually scroll through the list of active and acknowledged alarm-initiating devices by using the <SCROLL> Key after the message in Figure 3-12 is displayed. A summary of the number of active alarm events will be displayed as shown in Figure 3-11 at the conclusion of each manual scroll cycle.

The Silence LED will illuminate when the <Silence> Key is pressed after all alarms have been acknowledged. A subsequent press of the <SILENCE> Key will re-activate any outputs that were silenced if no new alarm events have been reported since the outputs were silenced. The Silence LED will also go out. This toggling capability will remain in effect until the control unit is reset.

Note: The toggling capability is only available for stand-alone panels.

A silence command that caused all silenceable outputs to de-activate will be overridden by a subsequent alarm report. All silenced outputs associated with the subsequent alarm-initiating device will reactivate, and the Silence LED will go out. You will need to press the <SILENCE> Key again to de-activate any active, silenceable outputs.

Note: There is a 10-second buffer period during which subsequent presses of the <SILENCE> Key are intentionally ignored. A subsequent key press will only be acted upon after at least 10 seconds have elapsed since the previous key press.

3-2.5.4.3 Non-Latching Operation

Some SmartOne alarm devices can be configured for non-latching operation. Non-latching operation refers to the special way that Alarm Off messages from initiating devices are processed by the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit.

Each SmartOne alarm-initiating device (such as a smoke detector) transmits an Alarm On message when it detects a fire signature in excess of its configured threshold value. An AI Monitor Module monitoring a normally-open contact detects a contact closure from the contact.

The SmartOne automatic alarm-initiating devices and monitor modules also transmit Alarm Off messages when the detected fire signature drops below the configured threshold value and when the contact closure is removed, respectively. The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit always displays every Alarm On message, but will not display an Alarm Off message unless the alarm device is configured for non-latching operation. Each Alarm Off message from a nonlatching initiating device is treated as a system event that requires operator intervention.

3-2.5.4.4 FENWALNET 6000 Alarm-Off Messages

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit will only display an Alarm Off message from an alarm-initiating device such as a smoke detector if the device is configured for non-latching operation.

The upper line of the LCD display shows the event by the device address, the change of state, and the device type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the alarm-initiating device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-13. Typical Alarm Off Message

The following actions also occur when any Alarm Off condition is reported by a non-latching, alarm-initiating device:

- The Alarm LED on the display flashes
- The internal buzzer pulses
- The Alarm Off event is stored in the event log
- **Note:** All Alarm Off messages are logged, regardless of whether the initiating device is configured for non-latching or latching operation.
 - The Alarm Off message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs and ATM-Ls, if applicable
 - The Alarm Off message is communicated via the RS-232 ports

3-2.5.4.5 What to Do When an Alarm-Off Message is Displayed

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to change the Alarm LED from flashing to steady and to silence the internal buzzer.

It will be necessary to press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key once for each alarm off report if multiple unacknowledged Alarm Off events are present. All Alarm Off acknowledgments are logged. Each corresponding Alarm On message will be removed from the list of active, manually scrolled alarm messages after its Alarm Off message is acknowledged.

The display will show the following message if all the alarm devices are configured for non-latching operation, each activated alarm device has transmitted an Alarm Off message that has been acknowledged, and no releases are being reported:

The system will then resume normal latching-alarm-event annunciation. You may manually scroll through the list of active and acknowledged latching-alarminitiating devices using the <SCROLL> Key if both latching and non-latching alarm reports have been received. They will be displayed using the format of Figure 3-10. A summary of the number of active latching alarm events will be displayed as shown in Figure 3-11 at the conclusion of each manual scroll cycle.

3-2.5.4.6 When to Use Non-Latching Initiating Devices

Use non-latching alarm-initiating devices to prevent an inadvertent release of an extinguishing system as the result of a transitory event that can mimic a fire signature such as an air-conditioning-system leak or the initial start-up of a heating system in the fall. The real or mimicked fire signatures that trigger a countdown to release for an extinguishing system must be present for the entire countdown-delay period in order to release the extinguishing system when non-latching alarm-initiating devices are used. The extinguishing-system release will be aborted if a non-latching device reports an Alarm Off message prior to the expiration of the countdown timer.

3-2.5.4.7 Alarm Display Limitation

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit can display a maximum of 64 active alarm messages by manually scrolling through them. All alarms in excess of 64 will be processed by the Control Unit even though they are not displayed, and all outputs will be activated as programmed in the Control Unit's application program.

The LCD will display the following message if a new alarm report is received and the alarm-display limitation has been exceeded:

The normal control unit actions will also occur when any non-displayed alarm condition is reported. These actions include:

- Flashing Alarm LED on the display
- Continuously sounding internal buzzer
- Logging of the alarm event
- Transmittal of the buffer-full message to peripheral devices such as RDCMs, if applicable
- Communication of the alarm message via the RS-232 ports
- Activation of point- or group-specific and general-alarm outputs, including previously-silenced outputs.

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to resume normal alarm-event manual scrolling.

The following message will appear at the end of each manual scroll cycle when more than 64 alarm events are active:

3-2.5.4.8 How To Reset the Control Unit After an Alarm Condition

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit will not reset and resume normal operations unless it has received Alarm Off messages from all previously alarmed initiating devices. This means, for example, that:

- All automatic initiating devices such as smoke detectors are measuring obscuration levels below their programmed alarm thresholds
- All manual stations have been reset and are in non-activated positions
- Sprinkler system water has been shut off and all waterflow switches have stopped reporting discharge conditions

Press the <RESET> Key to resume normal operations after all alarm-initiating devices have transmitted Alarm Off messages.

Note: It is possible that one or more trouble and/or supervisory messages will be reported after the system-reset operation is performed. For example, a special extinguishing system may need to be recharged or a sprinkler gate valve may be in an off-normal position. Servicing personnel must take prompt action to restore the system to normal operating conditions.

3-2.5.5 SPECIAL ALARM CONDITIONS



Do not use the following special smoke-detector configurations for releasing applications.

Two special alarm states are positive alarm sequence and alarm verification.

3-2.5.5.1 Positive Alarm Sequence

The Positive Alarm Sequence (PAS) is designed to give on-site personnel time to investigate a fire-alarm report from a smoke detector and to prevent an evacuation signal from being generated in the event of a spurious fire-signature detection or an inconsequential fire-alarm report. See Chapter 6 of NFPA 72, National Fire Alarm Code, 2002 Edition, for further details. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 User's Programming Guide to configure a smoke detector for PAS operation.

The PAS State occurs when the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit receives an emergency signal from a smoke detector configured for PAS.

The upper line of the LCD display shows the event by the device address, the change of state, and the device type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the alarm-initiating device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-17. Typical PAS Message Display

The following actions also occur when any PAS event is reported:

- The internal buzzer pulses
- The PAS event is stored in the event log
- The PAS message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs, if applicable
- The PAS message is communicated via the RS-232 ports

3-2.5.5.2 What to Do When PAS Occurs




Figure 3-18. PAS Acknowledgment Message

You must press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key within 15 seconds of receipt of the PAS report to prevent a PAS condition from changing to an alarm condition as described in Paragraph 3-2.5.5.1. The internal buzzer will silence and the display will change to the appearance in Figure 3-18 if the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key is pressed within 15 seconds of receipt of the PAS report. PAS acknowledgments are logged.

The upper line of the LCD display shows the time remaining to investigate the PAS report before the PAS event transitions to an alarm condition. The investigation time will continually decrease in one-second intervals. The control unit will return to Normal Operation if you press the <RESET> Key or the smoke detector reports an Alarm Off message at any time prior to the expiration of the investigation period. A PAS de-activation event is stored in the event log if an Alarm Off message is reported.

3-2.5.5.3 Alarm Verification

Alarm verification allows a fire-alarm system to delay generating an evacuation signal when an alarm report is received from a smoke detector. The fire-alarm system will wait for a second alarm report from the smoke detector that issued the initial alarm report or another alarm signal from any other alarm-initiating device before it generates the evacuation signal. The fire-alarm system will resume normal operations if it does not receive a second alarm report from the smoke detector or another alarm signal within the user-defined alarm-verification period. See Chapter 6 of NFPA 72, National Fire Alarm Code, 2002 Edition for details. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 User's Programming Guide to configure a smoke detector for alarm verification.

The Alarm Verification State occurs when the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit receives an emergency signal from a smoke detector configured for alarm verification.

The upper line of the LCD display shows the event by the device address, the change of state, and the device type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the alarm-initiating device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-19. Typical Alarm Verification Message Display

The following actions also occur when an alarm verification is reported:

- The internal buzzer pulses
- The alarm verification event is stored in the event log
- The alarm verification message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs, if applicable
- The alarm verification message is communicated via the RS-232 ports
- 3-2.5.5.4 What to Do When Alarm Verification Occurs




Figure 3-20. Alarm Verification Acknowledgment Message

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to silence the internal buzzer. The display will change to the appearance in Figure 3-20. Acknowledgments of alarm verifications are logged.

The upper line of the LCD display shows the verification time remaining to receive an alarm confirmation signal from the smoke detector. The verification time will continually decrease in one-second intervals. The control unit will return to Normal Mode if the smoke detector does not reconfirm the alarm condition or if no other alarm-initiating device reports at any time prior to the expiration of the verification period. A verification off event is stored in the event log if neither an alarm reconfirmation nor a secondary-alarm message is reported.

3-2.5.6 SUPERVISORY STATE

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit enters the Supervisory State when an initiating event occurs such as a monitor module report of a low-air-pressure condition in a preaction-sprinkler system. It also occurs when any SLC-based initiating or control device, an IIM initiating device, or any control unit based output circuit, is isolated.

The upper line of the LCD display shows the supervisory event by the device address, the state change, and the device type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the supervisory device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-21. Typical Supervisory Message Display

The following actions also occur when any supervisory condition is reported:

- The Supervisory LED flashes
- The internal buzzer pulses
- The supervisory event is stored in the event log
- The supervisory message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs and ATM-Ls, if applicable
- The supervisory message is communicated via the RS-232 ports
- Point- or group-specific and general supervisory outputs will activate, including previously-silenced outputs.

3-2.5.6.1 What to Do When a Supervisory Event Occurs

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to change the Supervisory LED from flashing to steady and to silence the internal buzzer.

It will be necessary to press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key once for each supervisory event if multiple unacknowledged supervisory events are present and the multiple-supervisory-event-acknowledgment option has not been selected. See Paragraph 3-2.5.2.4.37 to enable the multiple-supervisory-event-acknowledgment option.




Figure 3-22. Message After Manual Supervisory Scroll Cycle

Each acknowledged supervisory event (or block of supervisory events when multiple event acknowledgment is used) will disappear from the display after acknowledgment. The display changes to indicate the next unacknowledged supervisory event in the case of multiple supervisory events. The active supervisory events can be manually displayed in order of occurrence using the <SCROLL> Key at this time after all supervisory events have been acknowledged. A summary of the number of active supervisory events will be displayed as shown in Figure 3-22 at the conclusion of each manual scroll cycle.

A supervisory event that occurs after all previous supervisory events have been acknowledged will re-initialize the Supervisory State as defined in Paragraph 3-2.5.6.

3-2.5.6.2 How To Reset the Control Unit After a Supervisory Condition

Supervisory conditions are user configurable to be non-latching or latching. There is no indication that a supervisory event has cleared when multiple, acknowledged supervisory events are present regardless of whether the supervisory event is configured for latching or non-latching operation. The only indication will be that the supervisory event as depicted in Figure 3-21 has disappeared from the set of manually scrolled events and that the total number of supervisory events displayed in Figure 3-22 has decreased.

The system will automatically return to the Normal Mode when all of the supervisory events have cleared if the monitor modules that reported the events were configured to be non-latching, or if all isolated SLC and IIM devices and control-unit-based circuits are restored to normal-operating condition.

Press the <RESET> switch to resume normal operations after a latching supervisory event has cleared.

3-2.5.7 PRE-ALARM STATE

The Pre-Alarm State occurs when a SmartOne automatic initiating device (such as a smoke detector) senses a fire signature that is below its configured alarm-threshold

value but above a lower-threshold value called the "pre-alarm" threshold. The FENWALNET 6000 can also enter the Pre-Alarm State if it receives a Pre-Alarm Level-1 or -2 signal reported by a high-sensitivity smoke detector (HSSD) communicating through the Intelligent Interface Module (IIM).

The upper line of the LCD display shows the pre-alarm event by the device address, the change of state, and the device type. The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the alarm device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-23. Typical Pre-Alarm-Message Display

The following actions also occur when any pre-alarm condition is reported:

- The Pre-Alarm LED flashes
- The internal buzzer pulses
- The pre-alarm event is stored in the event log
- The pre-alarm message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs and ATM-Ls, if applicable
- The pre-alarm message is communicated via the RS-232 ports
- Point- or group-specific and general pre-alarm outputs will activate, including previously-silenced outputs.

3-2.5.7.1 What to Do When a Pre-Alarm Occurs

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to change the Pre-Alarm LED from flashing to steady illumination and to silence the internal buzzer. It will be necessary to press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key more than once to change the Pre-Alarm LED from flashing to steady illumination and to silence the internal buzzer if multiple unacknowledged pre-alarm events are present. All pre-alarm acknowledgments are logged.

The display changes to indicate the next unacknowledged pre-alarm event in the case of multiple pre-alarm events.

The system will then continue pre-alarm-event annunciation. You may manually scroll through the list of active and acknowledged pre-alarm-initiating devices in order of occurrence by using the <SCROLL> Key. They will be displayed using the format of Figure 3-23.

3-2.5.7.2 Pre-Alarm Silencing

Press the <SILENCE> Key to de-activate any silenceable outputs such as control unit-based notification-appliance circuits and SLC-based signal or relay modules after all pre-alarms have been acknowledged. Outputs are made silenceable through the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program. The control unit will display the following message for 5 to 10 seconds:

You may then manually scroll through the list of active and acknowledged pre-alarm-initiating devices after the outputs silenced message in Figure 3-24 is displayed.

The Silence LED will illuminate when the <SILENCE> Key is pressed after all pre-alarm events have been acknowledged. A subsequent press of the <SILENCE> Key will re-activate any outputs that were silenced if no new prealarm events were reported. The Silence LED will also go out. This toggling capability will remain in effect until the control unit is reset.

A silence command that caused all silenceable outputs to de-activate will be overridden by a subsequent pre-alarm report. All silenced outputs associated with the subsequent pre-alarm initiating device will reactivate, and the Silence LED will go out. The <SILENCE> Key must be pressed again to de-activate any active, silenceable outputs.

3-2.5.7.3 How to Reset the Control Unit After a Pre-Alarm Condition

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit resumes normal operations when it receives "Pre-Alarm Off" messages from all previously-alarmed automatic initiating devices unless one or more latching outputs such a control unit based notification appliance circuit has been turned on. This mode of operation ensues regardless of whether the automatic alarm-initiating devices are configured for latching or non-latching operation.

Press the <RESET> switch to resume normal operations if latching outputs have been activated.

3-2.5.8 CONCURRENT STATES

It is possible for the FENWALNET 6000 system to be in more than one of the eventdriven, Off-Normal Mode states concurrently. In general, any new event, regardless of its type, is prioritized for immediate display, and the control unit's application program runs to activate the outputs, if any, associated with the new event. The FENWALNET 6000's hierarchy for displaying events will determine whether the details associated with the new event will continue to be displayed after acknowledgment or whether its display will be suppressed due to the presence of other higher-priority events.

The general hierarchy for the display of events is as follows:

- Alarm
- Pre-Alarm
- Supervisory and Trouble

3-2.5.8.1 Alarm Events

An alarm event is a signal indicating an emergency situation that requires an immediate response. However, there are varying degrees of alarm signals, depending on whether the system's primary objective is property protection and mission continuity or whether it is occupant notification and building evacuation.

1. Property Protection/Mission Continuity Alarm Events

A property-protection/mission continuity system is usually installed to suppress a fire in the area that it is protecting. Waterless fire-suppression systems typically progress through multiple, sequential alarm states before the extinguishing system is discharged. The automatic detection system is either crossed-zoned or arranged in a counting zone to ensure that a flaming fire is present at the time of extinguishing-system discharge and for added reliability.

The typical alarm stages of a FENWALNET 6000 System designed for property protection/mission continuity are summarized in Table 3-7.

Note: There must be at least two detectors in the protected area when either crossed-zoned or counting-zone automatic detection is used.

Table 3-7. Progressive Alarm States of a FENWALNET 6000 System	
(Designed for Property Protection/Mission Continuity)	

State	When Occurs
Pre-Alarm State	The pre-alarm state occurs when any automatic detector that is a member of a crossed-zoned or counting-zone detection system issues an alarm report. The pre-alarm state for a property-protection/mission-continuity system with waterless fire suppression typically refers to the receipt of an alarm signal from a spot-type smoke detector or an HSSD. The pre-alarm state described in Paragraph 3-2.5.7 dealt with essentially a warning signal from an automatic detector that the fire signature at a specific location had exceeded a user-configurable, low-level threshold value. That pre-alarm signal did not create an actual alarm.
	The pre-alarm state discussed here should not be confused with the pre-alarm state discussed in Paragraph 3-2.5.7.
	The pre-alarm state must be annunciated by distinctive public-mode notification.
Pre-Release State	The pre-release state occurs when two automatic detectors (one detector from each of the two crossed zones or any two detectors in a counting zone) issue an alarm report. The discharge criterion for the waterless fire-suppression system is attained when the pre-release state occurs. The pre-release state is also referred to as the countdown state because it typically triggers a time-delay period that precedes the discharge of the waterless fire-suppression system.
	The pre-release state must be annunciated by public-mode notification different from the pre- alarm state public notification mode.
Release State	The release state occurs when the waterless fire-suppression system discharges at the conclusion of the time-delay period.
	The release state can also be triggered without a time delay by a manual-release station. It is also common practice to trigger a pre-action-sprinkler system concurrently with the discharge of the waterless suppression system.
	The release state must be annunciated by public-mode notification different from both the pre- alarm-state and pre-release-state public notification modes.
Abort State	The abort state occurs when an abort switch is manually activated to interrupt or prevent the start of the countdown timer whose expiration will trigger the discharge of the waterless fire-suppression system.

2. Occupant Notification/Building-Evacuation Alarm Events

An occupant-notification/building-evacuation system is usually installed as required by fire codes to warn the occupants of a building to evacuate because of a fire. This system enters the alarm state when devices such as an automatic detector, a manual-alarm station, or a waterflow switch reports as an alarm event. The FENWALNET 6000 System uses temporalcoded horns and strobes (or other method of non-voice-messaging, public notification acceptable to the authority having jurisdiction) to notify the occupants to evacuate the building.

An occupant-notification/building-evacuation system has two sub-alarm states that are designed to delay the building-evacuation signals or to prevent a transient, non-fire signature from activating the buildingevacuation signals. These two sub-alarm states are Positive-Alarm Sequence and Alarm Verification, described previously. 3-2.5.8.2 Hierarchy for Display of Concurrent Events The hierarchy for the display of concurrent events, from highest to lowest priority, is as follows:

Lower-level events will not be automatically displayed if higher-level events are active.

3-2.5.8.3 How Concurrent Events Are Displayed

The information shown on the FENWALNET 6000 display will change if the system is in more than one state concurrently.


1. Level-1 Event Display


The upper line of the LCD display shows the time to release for the first suppression zone that has begun to count down after you acknowledge the alarm event (or events) that have triggered the countdown. The time to release will continually decrease in one-second intervals until the expiration of the time-delay period. The lower line indicates the numbers of concurrently-active events for the following Level-1 and Level-2 event types:

- Discharges
- Countdowns to Release
- Aborts
- Alarms
- PAS Countdowns in Progress

Level-2 and lower-level events will not appear on the display as long as any Level-1 event is active and is in process.

Figure 3-25 shows the appearance of the display when a suppression zone has begun to count down.





The display will show the following message when an extinguishing system has been released:





Figure 3-26. Typical Release Message

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key when the message in Figure 3-26 appears to silence the buzzer. The display will change as shown in Figure 3-27. You may then manually scroll the display using the <SCROLL> Key to show any other suppression zones (successively by order of occurrence, if applicable) that have begun to count down after the release in the first suppression zone. Otherwise, you may manually scroll the display to show the completed Level-1 events and active Level-2 events which will appear as shown in Figure 3-29.





A new event will not automatically override the appearance of the display when a countdown to release is in progress. The appropriate LED on the display will flash and the buzzer will sound when any new system event is reported, and the new event will be logged. The new event will only be displayed when the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key is pressed. $3 - 2.5 \cdot 8.4$

What to Do When a Level-1 Message is Displayed

Press the <SCROLL> Key to display the details about the impending special extinguishing system release. There is only the time remaining in the countdown to abort and halt the extinguishing-system release. A successful abort-switch activation will display the following message:




Figure 3-28. Typical Display After Abort-Switch Operation

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> key when the message in Figure 3-28 appears to silence the buzzer.

Press the <SCROLL> Key to display the information for the next highestpriority and subsequent events. The display will show the 1st event or "More than 64 Alarms" when all of current Level-2 events have been manually displayed. The upper line of the display will revert to showing the highestpriority event approximately 5 seconds after the last press of the <SCROLL> Key. You may then manually scroll the display among the active Level-2 events.




Figure 3-29. Typical Display When Manually Scrolling Through Level-1/-2 Events

The appearance of the display when manually scrolling through the completed Level-1 and active Level-2 events is shown in Figure 3-29.


3-2.5.8.5 Level-2 Event Display

The upper line of the LCD display shows the activated device or circuit address, the change of state, and the device type that reported the event or the release circuit that has activated. The lower line indicates the following numbers of active or completed Level-1 events and active Level-2 events:

- Discharges
- Countdowns to Release
- Aborts
- Alarms
- PAS Countdowns in Progress

Level-3 and lower-level events will not appear on the display as long as any Level-2 event is active.

3-2.5.8.6 What to Do When Level-2 Messages are Displayed

Press the <SCROLL> Key to display the information for the highest-priority and subsequent events. The display will show the 1st event or "More than 64 Alarms" when all of current Level-2 and completed Level-1 events have been manually displayed. The upper line of the display will revert to showing the highest-priority event approximately 5 seconds after the last press of the <SCROLL> Key. You may then manually scroll the display among the active Level-2 and completed Level-1 events.

The appearance of the display when manually scrolling through the active




Figure 3-31. Typical Display When Manually Scrolling Through Level-2 Events

Level-2 events is shown in Figure 3-31.

3-2.5.8.7 Level-3 and Lower-Level Event Display

- Alarm-Verification Countdowns





Figure 3-32. Typical Multiple Lower-Level Event Display



3-2.5.8.8 What to Do When Level-3 and Lower-Level Messages are Displayed

Press the <SCROLL> Key to display the information for the highest-priority and subsequent events. The display will show 1st Event when all of current Level-3 and lower-level events have been manually displayed. The upper line of the display will revert to showing the highest-priority event approximately 5 seconds after the last press of the <SCROLL> Key. You may then manually scroll the display among the active Level-3 through Level-5 events.

The appearance of the display when manually scrolling through the currentlyactive Level-3 and lower-level events is shown in Figure 3-33.





3-2.5.8.9 Level-3 Display Limitations

The FENWALNET 6000 can display a maximum of 300 active trouble, supervisory, pre-alarm, and alarm-verification messages. However, new events in excess of the 300 active reports will be processed by the control unit, and all outputs associated with the 300th (or higher) event will be activated as programmed in the control unit's application program.

The LCD will show the following message if a new trouble, supervisory, prealarm, or alarm-verification report is received and the display limitation has been exceeded:

The normal control unit actions will occur when any non-displayed event is reported. These actions include:

- Pulsing of the internal buzzer
- Logging of the event
- Transmittal of the buffer-full message to peripheral devices such as RDCMs, if applicable
- Communication of the event via RS-232 ports
- Activation of point- or group-specific and general state outputs, including previously-silenced outputs

Press the <ACKNOWLEDGE> Key to resume normal manual concurrent-event scrolling. The following message will be displayed at the end of each manual scroll cycle when more than 300 Level-3 and lower-level events are active:

3-2.6 System Start-Up



Do not connect or disconnect the USB cable while the control unit is powering up on system startup or is initializing after a new configuration upload.

The following paragraphs describe system start-up procedures following a successful installation.

3-2.6.1 PRELIMINARY PROCEDURES

Ensure that the following tasks were successfully completed:

- The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit is securely mounted in a clean and dry area that has a normal range of environmental temperatures.
- The power supply unit has been configured correctly for the AC supply voltage.
- All field wiring has been checked for continuity, earth grounds, and short circuits. Wiring resistance and capacitance values have been measured and recorded, where appropriate.
- All SLC-based initiating devices and relay/control modules are electronically addressed, or will be addressed shortly after the control unit is powered up. SLC wiring is not connected to the control unit.
- The initiating circuits for all AI Monitor Modules are terminated with 10 k Ohms end-of-line resistors.
- Peripheral devices such as RDCMs and ATMs have their address switches correctly set.
- Field wiring for all control unit-based NACs is terminated with 10 kOhm end-ofline resistors.
- All control heads for special-extinguishing systems, if used, are removed from the agent storage containers.
- All initiator circuits have been replaced by simulated loads.
- Pre-Action/deluge solenoids are removed from the valves that control the distribution of water to the sprinkler heads.

3-2.6.2 INITIAL POWER-UP AND CONTROL-UNIT CHECKOUT

The FENWALNET 6000 power-up procedure is as follows:

1. Close the circuit breaker to apply AC power to the control unit. Verify that the green "Power On" LED illuminates and the display shows this message for approximately 15 seconds:

2. Confirm that the yellow Trouble LED is lit and that the following message appears for 10 to 20 seconds.




Figure 3-45. Sub-Menu to Complete Current-Time Entry




Figure 3-48. Typical Device Not Registered Message

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit is now ready for site-specific programming.

3-2.6.4 SITE-SPECIFIC PROGRAMMING

Each FENWALNET 6000 System must be uniquely configured for the specific end-user application. System configuration involves assigning an address and operating characteristics to each SmartOne initiating, relay, or control device. It also involves defining what initiating events or combinations of initiating events will activate the various control unit-based output circuits and SLC-based relay and control devices. A site-specific application program can be created in the following two ways.

3-2.6.4.1 System Configuration via the Auto-Setup Routine

The Auto-Setup Routine sets operating parameters for SLC-based devices by the combination of the device's type and address on the SLC. It assigns fixed activation sequences for each control unit-based output circuit and each SLCbased relay and control device by specific-initiating-device report and combinations-of-initiating-device reports.

See Paragraph 3-2.5.2.4.28 for a complete discussion of system configuration through the Auto-Setup Routine.

3-2.6.4.2 System Configuration via the FCS Configuration Program

You can also configure the FENWALNET 6000 System via the FCS-6000 Configuration Program for individual site-specific applications. The FCS-6000 Configuration Program allows you to set the operating parameters for the SmartOne initiating devices and to create activation sequences for each control unit-based output circuit and each SLC-based relay and control device by specific-initiating-device report and combinations-of-initiating-device reports.

Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Programming Guide for an explanation of system configuration through the FCS-6000 Configuration Program.

3-3 NETWORK SYSTEM OPERATION


Multiple FENWALNET 6000 systems can be networked together to form a larger, integrated system for common event reporting, operator control, and outputs activation. A peer-to-peer network can be created for up to thirty-two (32) FENWALNET 6000 control units. These units perform the following networked fire alarm and/or suppression system operations:


- Event initiation
- Protected premises local and/or remote event annunciation
- Occupant notification by audible and visible signaling appliances
- Process and equipment control to activate safety procedures
- Fire extinguishing system release

• Off-premises transmissions to a central station or a fire department

Each networked control unit supervises its own initiating devices and output circuits. It also manages the input point to output circuit operations specific to its local protected area(s). These operations occur with or without network inter-control unit communications, lack of network communications due to catastrophic fault, or irrespective of the condition of any other control unit in the network.

A typical networked FENWALNET 6000 system is shown in Figure 3-56.





3-3.1 Communications

Each networked control unit can communicate with every other control unit in the network. Control unit communication is peer-to-peer via a token-passing protocol. This method ensures that only one control unit is broadcasting at any one time. Network Interface Cards (NICs) integrate two or more control units in a networked configuration.

Networked control units are interconnected using shielded, twisted-wire pair, fiber-optic medium, or mixed transmission media (combination fiber optic or twisted wire pair media). Each NIC regenerates the network communications, and enables control units to be up to 4,000 feet apart when using shielded, twisted-wire pair, and up to 1 mile (5,280 feet) when using a $62.5/125 \mu m$ duplex fiber-optic medium.

Network messages and broadcasts are transmitted over either single- or dual-channel communications connections. Dual-channel connections offer a redundant communications path that allows network broadcasting and inter-control-unit functionality with an open- or short-circuit fault or ground fault on one of the channels. Any fault in either a single- or dual-channel communications channel creates a network trouble condition.

3-3.2 Network Event Broadcasts

Each networked control unit can be configured to broadcast any event associated with its initiating devices or monitored output circuits:

- Locally to the control unit-of-origin only
- Selectively to a subset of networked control units
- Globally to every control unit within the network.

Network broadcasts extend to all ancillary equipment such as Remote Display Control Modules (RDCMs) and Annunciator Terminal Modules (ATMs) associated with a designated subset of control units when selective event broadcasting is chosen. Network broadcasts extend to all such equipment associated with every control unit when the network is configured for global-event broadcasting.

The default operation for event broadcast is globally to all control units in the network.

3-3.3 Operator Control

Operators can acknowledge events, silence notification appliances, and perform resets in three different configurations:

- Locally to the control unit-of-origin only
- Selectively to a subset of the networked control units
- Globally to all control units in the network.

Operator-intervention capability extends to all ancillary equipment such as Remote Display Control Modules (RDCMs) and Annunciator Terminal Modules (ATMs) associated with a designated subset of control units when selective operator control is used. It extends to all such equipment associated with every control unit when the network is configured for global operator control.

3-3.4 Event Recording

Each control unit is configurable to record and display events as follows:

- Locally from its directly-monitored peripheral devices and output circuits only
- Selectively from a subset of networked control units
- Globally from all control units in the network

The default operation for event recording and display is globally from all control units in the network.

3-3.5 Event Output Control (EOC)

A confirmed event at any control unit can create output control, including extinguishing-system activation, in any of the following ways:

- Locally to its directly controlled peripheral devices and output circuits only
- Selectively to peripheral devices and output circuits controlled by a subset of networked control units

Note: This requires EOC code on the remote control units to activate their local outputs.

- Globally to peripheral devices and output circuits controlled by all control units in the network.
 - **Note:** This requires EOC code on the remote control units to activate their local outputs.

The default operation for event-output control is globally to all control units in the network.

Any control unit can create local output control, including extinguishing system activation, only to its directly controlled peripheral devices and output circuits. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Software User's Guide for information on configuring the EOC for network events.

3-3.6 Configuration Uploads/Downloads

The FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Program can upload and download configuration settings and application programs via one control unit to and from any other control unit in the network.

Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Software User's Guide for information on configuring the different network settings.

3-3.7 Menu Routines

3-3.7.1

Menu routines for a control unit can be activated:

- Directly from its keypad/display
- Selectively from a subset of the networked control units
- Globally from all control units in the network

3-3.8 Network Groups

Autonomous sub-networks or groups can be created within a network of FENWALNET 6000 Control Units. These groups can be programmed to selectively interact as separate entities for event reporting, event output control, acknowledgment of events, alarm silencing, and system resets. There are 32 possible groupings, numbered 0 to 31. By default, all control units in the network have no pre-assigned group number.

Note: A network is configured for global operations when no groups are defined.

3-3.8.1 CONTROL UNITS WITH A NON-ZERO GROUP NUMBER

A group of networked control units will operate as described below when they are assigned a non-zero group number. Each control unit in a group will be able to:


- Display and log all events that take place in any control unit in the group
- Issue an event-acknowledgment command to all control units in the group for any event that occurs in the group
- Send alarm-silence commands to all control units in the group to de-energize any silenceable outputs that have been activated within the group
- Send reset commands to all control units in the group once all activated initiating devices have transmitted an "alarm-off" message(s) to the affected control unit(s)
- Transmit output-activation commands to any or all other control units in the group for activation of remotely-controlled outputs


3-3.8.2 NETWORK GROUP 0

One control unit in the network can be assigned to Network Group 0. This control unit serves as the master control unit for the network, and is capable of the following interactions with all sub-groups in a selectively-signaling network:

- Displaying and logging all network events from all network groups
- Issuing acknowledge, silence, and reset commands to all control units in all network groups
- Activating its outputs upon any initiating event from all control units in all network groups

Figure 3-59 shows the possible interactions among the various members of a selectively-signaling networked system with groupings and with one control unit designated as the master control unit.






3-3.9 Operating States

A network of FENWALNET 6000 Systems has the five distinct Off-Normal operating states discussed in Paragraph 3-2.1. The normal network message display when there are no active system events is as follows:





3-3.9.1 OPERATOR-DRIVEN MENU STATE

The system enters the Menu State when an operator presses the 0 Key and enters the appropriate password as described in Paragraph 3-2.5.2.6. The operator will be prompted to enter a network node number. The requested menu will be accessible if the node number corresponds to:

- The control unit whose display is being utilized
- Another control unit in the same group as the control unit whose display is being utilized
- Any control unit in a network configured for global operation
- The control unit whose display is being utilized is defined as Group 0

3-3.9.2 EVENT-DRIVEN STATES

A networked control unit will enter one of the event-driven states (pre-alarm, alarm, supervisory, or trouble) when it is configured as Group 0 or when the event that occurs is:

- Resident in the control unit or its associated peripheral devices
- From another control unit in the same group as the control unit
- From any control unit in a network configured for global operation

3-3.10 Network Outputs Activation

Control unit or SLC outputs activate when commanded on by operating instructions contained in each networked control unit's event output control (EOC) program. The EOC program for a particular control unit is triggered by any event that transitions it from the Normal Mode to any of the event-driven, Off-Normal operating states discussed in Paragraph 3-2.1. The control unit must be configured to selectively receive and respond to the event as described Paragraph 3-3.8, or the network must be configured for global operation.

3-3.11 Operator Control Keys

The operator control keys are used to:

- Acknowledge receipt of initiating or monitoring-circuitry reports
- Silence alarm-notification appliances
- Transition one or more control units back to the Normal Mode.

These keys are functional if the control unit is configured as Group 0 or if the event and/or activated appliances are:

- Resident in the control unit or in its associated peripheral devices
- From or connected to another control unit in the same group as the control unit
- From or connected to a control unit in a network configured for global operation

3-3.12 Status-Indicating LEDs

The five status-indicating LEDs (alarm, pre-alarm, trouble, supervisory, and alarm silence) will light when the control unit is configured as Group 0 or when the event is:

- Resident in the control unit or its associated peripheral devices
- From another control unit in the same group as the control unit
- From any control unit in a network configured for global operation

3-3.13 Network Display Messages

Display messages will appear as described in Section 3-2, System Operation, for the control unit in which the events occur. Remote control unit events will be displayed as described in the following paragraphs.

3-3.14 Remote Trouble Events

Remote trouble events from a networked control unit are shown in the upper line of the LCD display by:

- Node-of-origin
- Device or circuit address
- Type of trouble event and its state change
- Device or circuit type

The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the device or circuit using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-61. Typical Remote-Trouble-Message Display

The following actions also occur when the control unit is configured as Group 0 or when the trouble event is either from another control unit in the same group as the control unit or from any control unit in a network configured for global operation.

- Node-of-origin
- Device address
- Change of state
- Device type

The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the alarm-initiating device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-62. Typical Remote Alarm Message Display

Remote PAS events from a networked control unit are shown in the upper line of the LCD display by:

- Node-of-origin
- Device address
- Change of state
- Device type

The lower line indicates the up-to-40-character message assigned to the alarm-initiating device using the FENWALNET 6000 configuration program.




Figure 3-63. Typical Remote PAS Message Display

The following actions also occur when the control unit is configured as Group 0 or when the PAS event is either from another control unit in the same group as the control unit or from any other control unit in a network configured for global operation.

- 1. The internal buzzer pulses

- 3. The PAS message is transmitted to peripheral devices such as RDCMs, if applicable
- 4. The PAS message is communicated via the NIC and RS-232 ports, as applicable

- Device address
- Change of state
- Device type




Figure 3-64. Typical Remote Alarm-Verification Message Display




Figure 3-65. Typical Remote Supervisory Message Display




Figure 3-66. Typical Remote Pre-Alarm Message Display




Figure 3-67. Typical Network Countdown to Release Display




Figure 3-68. Typical Network Release Message




Figure 3-69. Typical Display After Acknowledgment of Remote-Release Message




Figure 3-70. Typical Multiple Level-2 Event-Type Display




Figure 3-71. Typical Multiple Lower-Level Event Display

Only Level-3 events will scroll, if present. Level-4 events will scroll if there are no Level-3 events. Supervisory and trouble events will scroll if there are no active pre-alarms or alarm verifications. The lower line will summarize the numbers of active Levels-3 through Level-5 events as shown in Figure 3-71.

Refer to Paragraph 3-2.5.8.8 for what to do when Level-3 and lower-level events are displayed.

3-3.21 Network Start-Up

Note: Refer to Paragraph 3-2.6 for the recommended sequence of steps to properly start up the individual nodes of a networked FENWALNET 6000 System.

It is important to proceed in a step-by-step manner when you start up, test, and commission a networked FENWALNET 6000 System. The objective is to have all the individual control units that comprise the network clear of all Off-Normal events, and fully tested as stand-alone control units, before any attempt is made to network them. Network operations, and testing to confirm proper EOC operations among the various network control units, should only begin when all the control units show the "System Status Normal" message.

3-3.21.1 SPECIAL PROCEDURES FOR NETWORKED SYSTEMS

The following paragraphs describe how a networked FENWALNET 6000 system must be configured, initialized, tested, and commissioned.

3-3.21.1.1 Network-Interface-Card (NIC) Installation and Wiring

Follow the instructions in Paragraph 2-17.1 to install each NIC. Make the wiring interconnections among all the networked control units as shown in Paragraph 2-17.2 for shielded, twisted-wire pair or as shown in Paragraph 2-18 for fiber-optic medium. The maximum wiring run between nodes is 4,000 feet of twisted, shielded, #18 AWG (or heavier) wire or 1 mile (5,280 feet) of $62.5/125 \mu m$ duplex fiber-optic cabling. Remove all power from the control units while you are installing the NICs and making the wiring interconnections.

3-3.21.1.2 Initial Configuration

Apply power (AC first, then batteries) to Node No. 1 and set the time and date as directed in Paragraph 3-2.6.2. Refer to the FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Software User's Guide and upload this Node's configuration using your laptop computer and the FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Software (FCS) Program. The configuration program can include lines of EOC for output control to/from other network nodes. The inter-node control statements can also be added at a later time.

Pay particular attention to the structure of the inter-node control statements as shown in the FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Software User's Guide. There are significant differences in sentence structure between an EOC statement for a standalone control unit and an EOC statement that references initiating points on another network node. The configuration file must also include the node's network settings, such as node number, group number, and wiring style.

Clear all trouble and supervisory conditions from Node No. 1, if present. Test Node No. 1 for proper operation in accordance with the job specifications and/or local fire codes. Verify proper operation for each initiating device and output circuit.

Repeat this procedure for each additional network control unit.

3-3.21.1.3 Activating the Network

Begin configuring the individual control units for networked operation. Start with the lowest group number if the network consists of specific sub-groups. Add and test one group at a time. If specific sub-groups are not used, configure Nodes No. 1 and No. 2 for networked communications and test these nodes for proper inter-node input/output operations. Use the following procedure to activate Nodes 1 and 2 for networked operations:

1. Press the 0 Key on Node No. 1. This display will show this message:

Confirm EOC programming for Nodes 1 and 2. Add successive network nodes one at a time as outlined in the procedure above and continue to confirm proper networked operations. Use Node 1 as the point for adding more control units to the network. Repeat this procedure until all the nodes have been successfully added. Use a consecutive range of network node addresses to simplify the process of bringing the network on line. Be sure that each node being added shows "System Status Normal" before you add it to the network.

Test the entire network for proper operation in accordance with the job specifications and/or local fire codes. Verify proper operation for each initiating device and output circuit.

3-3.21.1.4 Network Maintenance

A control unit must be isolated from the network before any maintenance is performed. The other network control units will ignore all alarm, supervisory, and trouble reports from the isolated control unit, and they will report it as a network supervisory condition subject to the operating rules discussed in Paragraph 3-3.8.

Any networked control unit can be isolated by a control unit designated as Group 0, or by

- Another control unit in the same group as the control unit to be isolated
- Any control unit in a network configured for global operation
- The control unit itself

Use the following procedure to isolate a networked control unit:

- 3-3.21.1.5 Removing Power from a Control Unit

A networked control unit should not to be powered down if it is on line. Any changes that occurred among the other control units while it was powered down may not be transmitted to the control unit when it is powered up again. This will lead to reporting discrepancies on the displays of control units that are configured to log and display all network events. Use the procedure in Paragraph 3-3.21.1.4 to isolate a control unit first if it is necessary to power it down. Do not isolate a control unit from the network if it is inadvertently powered down. Wait for control unit to restart and be recognized again by the network.

3-3.21.1.6 Resynchronizing the Network

Some networked control units may occasionally retain alarm, supervisory or trouble events from other control units in the network even if the events have cleared from the other control units. This can be corrected by the "Resynch Network" function that resynchronizes all messages across the network.

Network events can be resynchronized by using a control unit configured as Group 0, or by using

- Another control unit in the same group as the control unit retaining events
- Any control unit in a network configured for global operation
- The control unit itself

Use the following procedure to resynchronize the network:

CHAPTER 4 INSPECTION, TESTING AND MAINTENANCE

4-1 SCHEDULED SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

The FENWALNET 6000 System must be inspected, tested and maintained in accordance with the requirements of NFPA 72 (2002), Chapter 10, or in accordance with the inspection, testing and maintenance schedule mandated by the Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ).

Follow the required inspection, testing, and maintenance procedures for the associated extinguishing system(s) as directed by the manufacturer and by the standards and codes that apply to those systems.



Do not attempt any testing or maintenance of the FENWALNET 6000 System until you have:

- Isolated all onboard releasing outputs via the Isolate function.
- Ensure that all RRMs are connected to the control unit.
- Physically disconnected the wiring to initiator assemblies (if used) from the releasecircuit terminals, shorted the leads together, and wrapped the leads in insulating tape
- Physically disconnected all control heads (if used) from their associated agent-storage container discharge valves
- Physically disconnected the wiring to solenoid valves (if used) for pre-action/deluge sprinkler systems
- Ensured that emergency operations controlled by this system such as facility power shutoff are bypassed
- Notified personnel in the facility and at off-premises monitoring locations that you are working on the system and that you will inform them when system servicing has ended.

4-2 SEMI-ANNUAL AND ANNUAL TESTING

Perform the following tests as part of each semi-annual or annual system inspection:

4-2.1 Lamp Test

Test the LEDs on the control unit's display by using the procedure in Paragraph 3-2.5.2.5.16. Replace the display's membrane if any LED fails to illuminate.

4-2.2 Battery Test

Test the standby batteries by using the procedure in Paragraph 3-2.5.2.5.7. Replace all batteries if either the charging voltage or current do not fall within the specified ranges.

Replace batteries every three years, or more frequently as recommended by the battery manufacturer. Fenwal provides the following batteries:

4-2.3 Initiating-Devices Test

The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit automatically tests all of the initiating devices connected to the signaling line circuit on a daily basis.

You should re-test the initiating devices by using the procedure in Paragraph 3-2.5.2.5.1. Investigate any "Device-Failed" messages and replace any defective initiating devices as appropriate.

4-2.4 Walk Test

Confirm acceptable fire-signature-entry characteristics for all automatic initiating devices by using the procedure in either Paragraph 3-2.5.2.5.2 or Paragraph 3-2.5.2.5.3. Use these procedures to confirm that all monitor modules are also working correctly.

4-3 SEQUENCE OF OPERATION

Verify that the system continues to operate in accordance with its approved sequence of operation. Figure 4-1 and Figure 4-2 show a typical sequence of operation for a waterless fire-suppression system.

Note: These figures are for example only. Every system is unique and requires its own approved sequence of operation.

5-1 INTRODUCTION

This chapter lists all the error messages, their probable causes, and suggested procedures to return the FENWALNET 6000 System to proper operating condition.

- Physically disconnected the wiring to initiator assemblies (if used) from the releasecircuit terminals, shorted the leads together, and wrapped the leads in insulating tape
- Physically disconnected all control heads (if used) from their associated agent storage container discharge valves
- Physically disconnected the wiring to solenoid valves (if used) for pre-action/delugesprinkler systems
- Ensured that emergency operations controlled by this system such as facility power shutoff are bypassed
- Notified personnel in the facility and at off-premises monitoring locations that you are working on the system and that you will inform them when system servicing has ended.

APPENDIX A BATTERY CALCULATIONS

A-1 AC BRANCH CIRCUIT

The FENWALNET 6000 System requires a separate, dedicated connection to an AC branch circuit (120 Vac, 50/60 Hz, 3.2 A or 220/240 Vac, 50/60 Hz, 1.6 A) that must be labeled "Fire Alarm." This branch circuit must connect to the line side of the main power connection for the premises. No other equipment can be powered from the fire-alarm branch circuit.

The branch-circuit wire must run continuously, without any disconnection devices, from the source of AC power to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit. Over-current protection for this branch circuit must comply with Article 760 of the National Electric Code and any other local electrical codes. Use a minimum wire size of #14 AWG, with 600-volt insulation, for this branch circuit

A-3 EXAMPLE

Consider a FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit that is monitoring a waterless extinguishing system for a data-processing center. The automatic detection system consists of ten (10) Model PSD-7152 Photoelectric Detectors and ten (10) Model CPD-7052 Ionization Detectors, crossed-zoned in such a manner that the activation of at least one photoelectric detector and one ionization detector is required to automatically discharge the waterless extinguishing system. The initiating system also includes eight Model AI Monitor Modules for manual-release, abort, and sprinkler-supervisory requirements. Four (4) Model AO Relay Control Modules are being utilized for remote control function such as airflow shutoff and power shutdown. One AO activates at pre-alarm, two additional AOs activate at pre-release, and the final AO activates upon extinguishing-system discharge.

Six (6) Model NS-24MC combination horn/strobes (75 cd) are used for occupant notification. The horns are activated during the pre-alarm condition. The strobes are activated at pre-release, and remain on until the system is reset.

A Model 486500-01 Control Head is being used to activate the waterless extinguishing system. A preaction sprinkler system, controlled by an FM-Approved, Group B solenoid, will be activated concurrently with the waterless extinguishing system.

The system is using a Model RDCM Remote-Display Module for additional event annunciation. The standby-battery calculation is shown in Table A-2.

B-2 EXAMPLE NO. 1

Determine the recommended wire size for a daisy-chained, Class-B, Style-4 SLC with 160 devices and a total wire length of 7,500 feet. The total wire length is the sum of wiring for the positive and negative SLC legs, and is not the linear distance from the control unit to the most-remote device.

Try #14 AWG wire. The total SLC wiring resistance is:

7,500 ft. x 2.525 ohms / 1,000 ft. = 18.9 ohms.

If Coleman Cable wire is selected, P/N 98141 (from Recommended Wire Listing), the total SLC wiring capacitance is:

 $3,750 \text{ ft x } 20 \text{ x } 10^{-12} \text{ farads} / \text{ ft.} = 0.075 \text{ x } 10^{-6} \text{ farads} (\text{or}, 0.075 \text{ } \mu\text{F}).$

Coleman Cable wire, PN 98141, is acceptable.

Note: Capacitance values correspond to a pair of wires as compared to resistance values that correspond to a single conductor. The wire-pair length for this SLC is 3,750 feet, and this value is used for the SLC's capacitance calculation.

B-3 EXAMPLE NO. 2

Determine the proper wire size for a Class-A, Style-6 SLC with 100 devices and a total wire length 7,000 feet. The total wire length is the sum of wiring for the positive and negative SLC legs for both the primary and redundant communications circuits, and is not the linear distance from the control unit to the most remote device.

Try #18 AWG wire first. The total SLC wiring resistance is using #18 AWG is:

7,000 ft. x 6.385 ohms / 1,000 ft. = 44.7 ohms.

The total SLC wiring resistance (44.7 ohms) when using #18 AWG wire exceeds the maximum SLC wiring resistance of 40.0 ohms. Use larger wire.

Try #16 AWG next. The total SLC wiring resistance using #16 AWG is:

7,000 ft. x 4.016 ohms / 1,000 ft. = 28.1 ohms.

The total SLC wiring resistance (28.1 ohms) when using #16 AWG wire is less than the maximum SLC wiring resistance of 40 ohms. The SLC wiring resistance using #16 AWG wire is acceptable.

If Coleman Cable wire is selected, P/N 98161 (from Recommended Wire Listing), the total SLC wiring capacitance is:

 $3,500 \text{ ft x } 20 \text{ x } 10^{-12} \text{ farads / ft.} = 0.07 \text{ x } 10^{-6} \text{ farads (or, 0.07 } \mu\text{F)}.$

Coleman Cable wire, P/N 98161, is acceptable.




Figure C-1. Agent Release Circuits for CXV Control System (P/N 93-487100-001)




Figure C-2. Agent Release Circuit Wiring - Initiators, Non-Power-Limited

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APPENDIX D

HANDHELD-PROGRAMMER OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS

D-1 DESCRIPTION

The Handheld Programmer (hereinafter referred to as the Programmer) provides the system installer/service person with a convenient means to assign device address information and test device operation.

D-2 GENERAL NOTE

Prior to using the Programmer, you need to ensure that you have the supplied accessories, listed in the table below:

D-3 DEVICES SUPPORTED

The Programmer is designed to support all SmartOne® intelligent/addressable devices. A table of supported devices accompanies these instructions.

Prepare the Programmer for Operation with AC Adapter

- 1. Connect Device Interface Cable to the SLC connector on the top of the Programmer.
- 2. Connect the small plug of the power pack to the DC IN connector on the top of the Programmer, and then plug the line cord into a 120 Vac, 60Hz outlet.
- 3. Verify that the green "DC Input" LED is lit. The yellow "Bat. Charger" LED will also light if the batteries are not fully charged.
- 4. Set the power switch to the "on" position (up direction).
- 5. Verify that the green "Power On" LED is lit and that the display is flashing each of the segments used to display characters.
- 6. After 30 seconds ensure the top row of the display is flashing (---). The bottom row of the display should be blank.

D-4 PREPARE THE PROGRAMMER FOR OPERATION WITH INTERNAL BATTERIES

- 1. Connect Interface Cable to the SLC connector on the top of the Programmer.
- 2. Set the power switch to the "On" position (up direction).
- 3. Verify that the green "Power On" LED is lit and that the display is flashing each of the segments used to display characters.
- 4. If the "Bat. Failure" LED is lit or no LEDs are lit, charge the batteries according to the Battery Charging procedure.

D-5 BATTERY CHARGING

If the "Bat. Failure" LED lights on the Programmer, go to AC operation to charge the batteries as described below:

- 1. Ensure that the power switch is in the "Off" position (down direction).
- 2. Connect the small plug of the power pack to the DC IN connector on the top of the Programmer.
- 3. Plug the line cord into a 120 Vac, 60Hz outlet.
- 4. Verify that the "DC Input" and "Bat. Charger" LEDs are lit.
- 5. Charge batteries for at least one hour. If the "Bat. Failure" LED is illuminated after the charge, replace the Programmer's batteries.

D-6 CHANGE OR SET THE ADDRESS OF A DEVICE

- 1. Connect the alligator clips of the interface cable to the terminals of an addressable device.
- 2. After about 17 seconds, the top row of the display should indicate the device address (000 to 255), and shortly after, the bottom row of the display should indicate "000."

Note: All new addressable devices should have an address of 000.

- 3. Refer to the Trouble Code Table if the Trouble LED lights, if the Programmer beeps, or if a trouble code is displayed.
- 4. To change the address, enter a value between 001 and 255 into the keypad. The entered value will appear in the bottom row of the display. Press the <ENTER> key.
- 5. After about 10 seconds, the entered address will be displayed on the top row of the display.
- 6. Repeat Steps 1 through 5 for each device to be addressed.

D-7 BATTERY REPLACEMENT

- 1. Ensure that the power switch is off (down position) and that the power cord is disconnected.
- 2. Remove the four Phillips-head screws from the back panel of the Programmer.
- 3. Lift the rear panel from the unit carefully, preventing tension to the wiring connected to the rear panel PC board. Place rear panel on the side of the unit. Do not disconnect interconnecting wiring.
- 4. Remove the two Phillips-head screws securing the battery bracket. Lift out the bracket.
- 5. Remove battery pack and disconnect battery connector.
- 6. Insert new battery pack by reversing the steps above.


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APPENDIX E ROUTINGS FOR POWER-LIMITED AND NON-POWER-LIMITED WIRING

This appendix provides guidelines for power-limited and non-power-limited wiring requirements. The following wiring requirements shall be observed:

- Power-limited and non-power-limited wiring must be physically separated within the control-unit enclosure
- All power-limited wiring must be separated by at least $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch (6.35 mm) from any non-power-limited wiring
- Power-limited and non-power-limited wiring cannot enter and exit the control-unit enclosure through the same knockout or conduit.

Figure E-1 shows typical wiring for power-limited and non-power-limited circuits.



Note:

Route wiring as shown when combination power-limited and non-power-limited circuits are used.

Direct all non-power-limited wiring to the rear and then to the left-hand side of the enclosure. Tie wrap this wiring to the back of the enclosure to maintain a minimum 1/4-inch separation from all power-limited wiring.

Direct all power-limited wiring outward and then to the right-hand side of the enclosure. Also tie wrap this wiring as necessary to maintain a minimum 1/4-inch separation from all non-power-limited wiring.


Figure E-1. Power-Limited and Non-Power-Limited Wiring

APPENDIX F CENTRAL-STATION OPERATION


FENWALNET 6000 Relays

APPENDIX G

FACTORY MUTUAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PRE-ACTION AND DELUGE SPRINKLER SYSTEMS

 - Alarm: 135° to 155° F
- The signaling line circuit must be configured for Style 6 wiring. Refer to Figure 2-14.
- Provide 90 hours of standby battery and 10 minutes of alarm operation. Refer to Appendix A.
- Each release circuit is required to be configured for solenoid activation. The solenoid output ontime period should be set to either "90 seconds" or "on until reset".

FENWALNET 6000 Configuration Software, or FCS 6000, is a Microsoft[®] Windows-based application that is used for creating specific applications for FENWALNET 6000 systems.

FCS 6000 enables the user to create a complete system configuration, including details for initiating devices, output control and text messages. This User's Guide describes the operation of FCS 6000.

1-2 PC REQUIREMENTS

Minimum computer requirements for the FCS 6000 Configuration Software are listed below. System requirements vary between operating systems. Refer to the appropriate section.

For computers with Microsoft Windows XP installed:

- PC with 300 MHz or higher processor clock speed recommended; 233 MHz minimum required (single or dual processor system); Intel[®] Pentium[®]/Celeron[®] family, or AMD[®] K6[®]/Athlon[®]/ Duron[®] family, or compatible processor recommended.
- 128 MB of memory (RAM) or higher recommended (64 MB minimum supported; may limit performance and some features).

For computers with Microsoft Windows 2000 installed:

- 133 MHz or higher Pentium-compatible CPU.
- A minimum of 64 MB of RAM.

For computers with Microsoft Windows NT 4.0, 95, 98 and ME installed:

- 90 MHz or higher Pentium-compatible CPU.
- A minimum of 32 MB of RAM.

1-3 INSTALLING FCS 6000

- 1. Insert the CD-ROM into drive.
- 2. If AutoRun is enabled on the computer, InstallShield[®] begins automatically. If InstallShield[®] does not begin automatically, locate the drive and find the file titled "Setup.exe". Double-click on the file to begin the InstallShield_® Wizard.




Figure 1-1. FCS 6000 Welcome Screen

- 3. After the InstallShield[®] Wizard is finished processing, it displays the InstallShield Welcome Screen (Figure 1-1). Select the **<Next>** button to proceed to the next screen.

4. Choose Destination Location screen (Figure 1-2). Setup automatically defaults to place the program in the C: drive. To choose another location to place the program, click on the **<Browse>** button. The Choose Directory screen displays (Figure 1-3) to allow the user to place the program in a specified location. Click on the **<Next>** button to continue with installation after the destination for FCS 6000 has been chosen.




Figure 1-7. Main Screen




Figure 1-8. Toolbar Icon Definitions

1-5 INSTALLING THE USB DRIVER FOR CONNECTION TO CONTROL UNIT

The computer with FCS 6000 installed is not able to communicate via USB with the control unit until a USB driver has been installed. Instructions to install a USB driver are listed below. For proper installation, the computer must be equipped with Microsoft Windows 2000 or Microsoft Windows XP. Operating systems prior to Microsoft Windows 2000 should use the computer's RS-232 serial port to communicate with the control unit.

1-5.1 Microsoft Windows 2000 Installation

To install the drivers for the FENWALNET 6000 on Microsoft Windows 2000:

- 1. Insert the supplied FCS 6000 Configuration Software install disk into the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Connect the USB Cable to any available USB port.
- 3. Connect the FENWALNET 6000 control unit to the USB cable with the control unit power ON.
- 4. A "Found New Hardware" screen opens the "Found New Hardware Wizard" screen on the computer. Click **<Next>**.
- 5. Select "Search for a suitable driver for my device (recommended)". Click **<Next>**.
- 6. Check "CD-ROM drives". De-select all other boxes. Click **<Next>**.
- 7. The "Windows found a driver for this device. To install the driver Windows found, click Next" screen displays. The driver name: USBPCM.inf should be displayed. Click **<Next>**.
- 8. When the file copy is complete, a screen saying "Windows has finished..." displays.
- 9. Click **<Finish>** to complete the installation.
- 10. If Microsoft Windows prompts for a reboot after installation, do so.

1-5.2 Microsoft Windows XP Installation

- 1. Insert the supplied FCS 6000 Configuration Software install disk into the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Connect the USB Cable to any available USB port.
- 3. Connect the FENWALNET 6000 control unit to the USB cable with the control unit power ON.
- 4. A "Found New Hardware—USB Device" balloon displays followed by the "Found New Hardware Wizard" screen.
- 5. Select: "Install from a list or specific location (Advanced)" and click **<Next>**.
- 6. In the screen that displays, select: "Search for the best driver in these locations". Select "Search removable media...". De-select all other boxes. Click **<Next>**.
- 7. The next screen displays "Please wait while the wizard installs the software..." accompanied by a prompt to install the driver even though it has not passed Windows Logo testing. Select **<Continue Anyway>**.
- 8. Select **<Finish>** to complete the installation.
- 9. A "Found New Hardware: Your new hardware is installed and ready to use" balloon should display indicating that installation was performed successfully.

1-5.3 Verifying the Installation of USB Drivers (with the Panel Connected to the PC)

- 1. Open the "System" applet in "Control Panel", click the "Hardware" tab and open the "Device Manager".
- 2. In the device tree locate the "Ports (COM and LPT)" item and expand it. If "USB Serial Ports Driver" does not display in the device list, or if it has an exclamation point next to it, then it is not installed properly.
- 3. Verify there are no other Ports configured with the same COM#. If there are, that device's port designation must be changed. (The Control Panel uses the Windows enumerator to find the first available port. Port selection is beyond our control, and the conflict occurred because the other device did not enumerate itself properly in the Windows registry.)
- 4. After installing the PC configuration software open it and open the "Communications Settings" dialog by choosing the "Tools>Communications Setup" menu option.
- 5. With the panel still connected via USB, the annotation: "[PANEL]" should accompany one of the COM ports in the dialog. Otherwise the PC software doesn't recognize the port that the panel is connected on. Call Technical Support if this is the case.

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CHAPTER 2 CREATING A SYSTEM APPLICATION

2-1 INTRODUCTION

The tasks required to create an FCS 6000 application are as follows:

- Assign an address and define the operating characteristics for each device on the single-line circuit (SLC).
- Define the operating characteristics for each on-board output circuit.
- Identify and assign an address to all associated peripheral components such as Remote Display and Control Modules (RDCM) and Annunciator Terminator Modules (ATM).
- Indicate whether or not an Intelligent Interface Module (IIM) will be used
- Assign a network node address and define the operating characteristics of the control unit in a networked system (if applicable)
- Create the required initiating device to output circuit/device relationships via Event Output Control (EOC). These relationships must be created for all initiating devices and outputs associated with each FENWALNET 6000 system. In addition, all inter control unit initiating device to output circuit/device relationships for networked systems must be defined in the EOC of the affected control units. EOC configuration is described in Chapter 3.

Note: All alarm events must be annunciated by public-mode notification.

The following requirements apply to special extinguishing systems:

- The pre-alarm state must be annunciated by distinctive public mode notification.
- The pre-state must be annunciated by public mode notification different from the pre-alarm state public notification mode.
- The release state must be annunciated by public mode notification different from both the prealarm state and the pre-release public notification modes.




Figure 2-1. Definition of Tabs

Each task is invoked via a tab-control selection. Figure 2-1 gives a definition of the tabs and the paragraph numbers in which information for each tab can be found.

2-1.1 Versions

The configuration software version must match the control unit software version in the first two digits. For example, if the control unit version is 1.2.0, the configuration software version must be 1.2.x where 'x' is 0 to 9. It is possible to open files saved with older version configuration programs. It is not possible to communicate with or open saved configuration files for a control unit version that is newer than the configuration software version. Refer to Appendix C for instructions for upgrading the control unit version.

2-2 CREATE A NEW FILE OR OPEN AN EXISTING FILE (SUMMARY TAB)

- To create a new file: Select **File>New** or select the New File Icon on the toolbar (); Figure 2-2 displays.
- To open an existing file: Select File>Open or select the Open File Icon on the toolbar ([□]). Select a file and click on <Open>; Figure 2-2 displays.


Figure 2-3. Addressable Devices Screen






Figure 2-7. Addressable Relay (AO) Screen




Figure 2-8. Addressable Sounder Module (ASM) Screen




Figure 2-9. Ionization Smoke Detector Screen




Figure 2-10. Photoelectric Smoke Detector Screen


A heat detector is configurable for thermal cycling as shown in Figure 2-12. The first alarm signal from a heat detector is used to activate control unit-based outputs for a user-configurable period of time known as the Initial Time Limit Cutoff Interval (ITLCO). The outputs silence or de-energize upon expiration of the ITLCO interval. The outputs reactivate using the ITLCO time cycle if the system has not been reset and at least one heat detector remains in the alarm state. If no heat detectors are in the alarm state when the ITLCO time expires, the programmed outputs shall deactivate. If a heat detector subsequently registers a temperature in excess of its alarm-threshold and the system has not yet been reset, the outputs reactivate. The reactivated outputs silence or deactivate again after the expiration of a second user-configurable period of time known as the Cyclical Time Limit Cutoff (CTLCO)

The outputs only cycle and reactivate if the temperature at a heat detector subsequently exceeds the detector's alarm threshold after the outputs silence or de-activate. All subsequent reactivation occur for the CTLCO duration.


Valid entries for the ITLCO and CTLCO time periods are 0 to 180 seconds or 0 to 180 minutes, configurable in either 1-second or 1-minute increments, respectively. These time periods are specified in the screens that configure the various control unit-based outputs.








Figure 2-14. Alarm Contact Screen

2-3.11.1 ABORT STATION SETTING DEFINITIONS

An AI Monitor Module configured as an abort station can be programmed to operate in any of the following ways:

• Reset to Full Time Delay (Non-UL Listed)

The countdown timer restores to the full delay period after the abort station is activated. The timer resumes the full countdown if the abort station is deactivated. The timer restores to the full delay period if the abort station is reactivated with any time remaining in the countdown. A system reset is required to clear the countdown timer.

Note: The following abort-station operations are available, and are to be utilized at the discretion of, and with the approval of, the applicable Authority Having Jurisdiction.

• Underwriters Laboratories Style

The countdown timer continues to count down after the abort station is activated, and halts with 10-seconds remaining. The timer resumes the countdown from 10 seconds if the abort station is de-activated. The timer restores to 10 seconds if the abort station is activated or re-activated with less than 10 seconds remaining in the countdown. A system reset is required to clear the countdown timer.

• New York City (Not UL Listed)

The countdown timer restores to the full delay period, plus 90 seconds, after the abort station is activated. The timer resumes the countdown from the full delay period, plus the 90 seconds, if the abort station is de-activated. The timer restores to the full delay period plus 90 seconds if the abort station is re-activated with any time remaining in the countdown. A system reset is required to clear the countdown timer.


Note: EOC programming is required to implement the New York City abort station operation. Refer to Appendix B.

Freeze and Hold at Time Remaining (Non-UL Listed)

The countdown timer halts at the time remaining to expiration after the abort station is activated. 




Figure 2-18. Supervisory Screen

Note: The unpowered waterflow contact can be either normally-open or normally-closed. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 for normally-open contacts and P/N 70-4070X8-002 for normally-closed contacts.




Figure 2-20. Remote Release Module Screen (Using an Initiator as a Releasing Device)




Figure 2-21. Remote Releasing Module Screen (Using a Solenoid as a Releasing Device and Multiple Groups)




Figure 2-22. Remote Releasing Module Screen (Using a Solenoid as a Releasing Device and Thermal Cycling) 1. In the "Releasing Device" Selection drop-down menu, select "Solenoid".

- 5. If applicable, the release circuit is configurable for thermal cycling according to the alarm or non-alarm states of its associated automatic heat detectors. Refer to Paragraph 2-3.6 for a description of thermal cycling via a Model THD-7252 Heat Detector. A thermal-cycling release circuit is configured by selecting "Thermal Cycling" from the Activation Time drop-down menu.
- **Note:** The cyclical release-circuit activation is overridden by an alarm signal from any associated alarm-initiating device other than a heat detector configured for thermal cycling. The release circuit then latches into the activated state and remains activated until it is deactivated by another alarm condition or until the control unit is reset.

2-3.15 Other SLC Initiating Devices

The following SLC initiating devices do not have specific screens to further define functionality. They are all represented by an AI Monitor Module that is monitoring an unpowered switch.

- **Normal Device.** A normal is a Non-Latching initiating device. Point-specific outputs can be assigned to a normal device in the EOC section of the configuration program. The unpowered normal device can be either normally-open or normally-closed. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 for normally-open contacts and P/N 70-4070X8-002 for normally-closed contacts.
- **Trouble Input.** A trouble input creates a trouble condition and is a Non-Latching initiating device. Point-specific outputs can be assigned to the trouble input in the EOC section of the configuration program. The unpowered trouble input can be either normally-open or normally-closed. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 for normally-open contacts and P/N 70-4070X8-002 for normally-closed contacts.
- **Fan Restart.** A fan-restart point is used to de-activate specific addressable relays (i.e., AOs) after the control unit has been reset. The AOs must be configured for fan-restart operation. The unpowered fan-restart switch must be a Non-Latching, normally-open contact. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 to monitor the fan-restart switch.
- **Drill.** A drill switch is used to initiate a fire drill via an external, field-installed switch. The fire drill begins when the drill switch is activated, and stops when the drill switch is deactivated. The unpowered drill switch must be a latching, normally-open contact. Use P/ N 70-4070X8-001 to monitor the drill switch.
- **Alarm Silence.** An alarm silence switch is used to duplicate the functionality of the control unit's alarm silence switch via an external, field installed switch. The alarm silence switch de-activates silenceable outputs when the alarm silence switch is activated, and re-activates silenced outputs when the alarm silence switch is de-activated. The unpowered alarm silence switch must be a Non-Latching, normally-open contact. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 to monitor the alarm silence switch.
- **Note:** This feature does not meet UL requirements unless there is a visible display at the alarm silence switch to indicate that the alarms are silenced.
 - **Reset.** A reset switch is used to duplicate the functionality of the control unit's reset switch via an external, field installed switch. The unpowered reset switch must be a Non-Latching, normally-open contact. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 to monitor the reset switch.

- **Acknowledge.** An acknowledge switch is used to duplicate the functionality of the control unit's acknowledge switch via an external, field installed switch. The unpowered acknowledge switch must be a Non-Latching, normally-open contact. Use P/N 70-4070X8-001 to monitor the acknowledge switch.
- **Note:** This feature does not meet UL requirements unless there is a visible display at the acknowledge switch that indicates what is being acknowledged.

Alarm Initiating Device	A device such as a smoke detector or manual station configured to create an alarm condition in the system when it activates.
Alarm Verification	Alarm verification allows a fire alarm system to delay an evacuation signal from being generated as the result of an alarm report from a smoke detector. The fire alarm system waits for a second alarm report from the smoke detector that issued the initial alarm report or from any other alarm-initiating device before it generates the evacuation signal. The fire alarm system resumes normal operations if it does not receive a second alarm report within the alarm configuration time period. See Chapter 6 of NFPA 72, National Fire Alarm Code, 2002 Edition, for details.
Day/Night/Weekend	The periods of time during which smoke detector sensitivities can be automatically adjusted by the control unit. Day and night periods are defined in the Globals Tab.
Drill	A manually initiated test of the system's notification appliance circuits. The test can be initiated via the control-unit's Test sub-menu or via a monitor module configured as a drill switch.
Fan Restart	A switch connected to a monitor module designed to de-energize control modules that do not resume normal operation after a system reset. The monitor module and control modules must be configured for fan-restart operation. The control modules only de- energize and resume normal operation after the fan restart switch is activated.
General Alarm List	The set of outputs that are activated by any alarm initiating device.
Non-Latching Input	Some SmartOne alarm initiating devices can be configured for Non-Latching operation. Non-Latching operation refers to the special way that "Alarm-Off" messages from initiating devices are processed by the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit. Each SmartOne alarm initiating device transmits an "Alarm-On" message when, in the case of an automatic initiating device, it detects a fire signature in excess of its configured threshold value, and, in the case of an AI Monitor Module for a normally-open contact, it detects a contact closure from the switch that it is monitoring. The SmartOne automatic alarm- initiating devices and monitor modules also transmit "Alarm-Off" messages when the detected fire signature drops below the configured threshold value and when the contact closure is removed, respectively. The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit always displays every "Alarm-On" message, but does not display an "Alarm-Off" message unless the alarm-initiating device is configured for Non-Latching operation. Each "Alarm-Off" message from a Non-Latching initiating device is treated as a system event that requires operator intervention. Use Non-Latching alarm initiating devices to prevent an inadvertent release of an extinguishing system as the result of a transitory event that can mimic a fire signature such as an air conditioning-system leak or the initial start-up of a heating system in the fall. The real or mimic fire signatures that trigger a countdown to release for an extinguishing system must be present for the entire countdown-delay period in order to release the extinguishing system when Non-Latching alarm-initiating devices are used. The extinguishing system release is aborted if a Non-Latching initiating device reports an "Alarm-Off" message prior to the expiration of the countdown timer.

PAS	Positive Alarm Sequence (i.e., PAS) allows a fire-alarm system to delay an evacuation signal from being generated as the result of an alarm report from a smoke detector. The operator must acknowledge the initial alarm report within 15 seconds of its receipt, or the normal evacuation signals activate. Personnel have a user-programmable period of up to 3 minutes to investigate the nature of the alarm and reset the system if they acknowledge the initial alarm within 15 seconds. The evacuation signal activate if the system is not reset during the investigation period. The fire-alarm system also generates the evacuation signal if a second smoke detector configured for PAS or any other initiating device transmits an alarm signal during either the initial-acknowledgement period or the investigation period. The fire-alarm system resumes normal operations if it is reset within the investigation period. See Chapter 6 of NFPA 72, National Fire Alarm Code, 2002 Edition, for details.
Pre-Alarm Reporting	The Pre-Alarm State occurs when a SmartOne automatic initiating device such as a smoke detector senses a fire signature that is below its configured alarm threshold value but above a lower threshold value called the "pre-alarm" threshold.
Sequential Deactivation	A method of scheduling the de-activations of control modules that have been activated as the result of an alarm condition. The system can be programmed to insert a delay of up to 15 seconds between the de-activation times of control modules that resume normal operations following either a system reset or a fan-restart command. The control modules must be configured for sequential deactivation and the delay period is defined in the Globals Tab. Up to 16 control modules can be programmed for sequential deactivation.
Silenceable	An output that changes its state of activation upon commands issued by the control unit's SILENCE Switch. The output de-energizes if an alarm condition exists and if it is activated when the SILENCE Switch is pressed, and re-activates if the alarm condition still exists and it is de-energized when the SILENCE Switch is pressed.
Walk Test	A test mode in which the control unit responds to alarm-initiating signals by pulsing designated notification-appliance circuits for one second and recording the alarm-initiating device's alarm report in the Walk Test Log. This is referred to as a normal walk test. The alarm-initiating devices must be activated for Walk Test via the control unit's Test sub-menu, and the NACs must be configured for Walk Test activation. A Silence Walk Test does not activate the NACs, but records each alarm-initiating device's alarm report in the Walk Test Log.




Figure 2-23. Location Entry Box




Figure 2-28. Access Options Screen for Control Unit-Based Outputs




Figure 2-29. NAC Screen (Conventional NAC Selected)




Figure 2-30. NAC Screen (Intelligent NAC Selected)

- Cutoff Delay. A NAC automatically silences after the period of time specified in the "Cutoff-Delay" Drop-Down Menu. Valid entries for the "Cutoff-Delay" time period are 5, 10 and 15 minutes.
- **Note:** A NAC configured for Cutoff Delay turns off and remain off until a new alarm event causes it to resound. The NAC cannot be manually resounded via the Silence Key on the display.
 - Thermal Cycling. A NAC is configurable for thermal cycling according to the alarm or non-alarm states of its associated heat detectors. Refer to Paragraph 2-3.6 for a description of thermal cycling via Model THD-7252 Heat Detectors. The cyclical NAC activation is overridden by an alarm signal from any associated alarm-initiating device other than a heat detector configured for thermal cycling. The NAC then latches into the activated state, and remain activated until it is subsequently silenced, deactivated by another alarm condition or the control unit is reset.




Figure 2-31. Combo Box for Combination Circuits




Figure 2-32. Release Circuit Screen




Figure 2-33. Programmable Relay Screen




Figure 2-34. Peripheral-Devices Main Configuration Screen




Figure 2-35. Peripheral-Devices Address-Range Selection

2-7 NETWORKING (NETWORK TAB)

Multiple FENWALNET 6000 Systems can be networked together to form a larger, integrated system for common event reporting, operator control, and outputs activation. A peer-to-peer network of up to thirty-two (32) FENWALNET 6000 Control Units can be created. That network is then capable of performing the following fire-alarm and/or suppression system operations on a network-wide basis:

- Event initiation
- Protected-premises local and/or remote event annunciation
- Occupant notification via audible and visible signaling appliances
- Process/equipment control to activate safety procedures
- Fire extinguishing system release
- Off-premises transmissions to central station or fire department via a third-party digital communicator and programmable relays.

Every control unit on the network supervises its own initiating devices and output circuits and manages the input-point to output-circuit operations specific to its local protected area(s). These operations occur without regard to inter control unit communications, lack of network communications due to catastrophic fault, or irrespective of the condition of any other control unit in the network.

A separate application file must be created via FCS 6000 for each control unit in the network.

2-7.1 Communications

Every control unit is capable of communicating with every other control unit in the network. The method of communication is peer-to-peer via a token-passing protocol to ensure that only one control unit is broadcasting at any time. Network Interface Cards (NIC) permit the integration of two or more control units into a networked system.

Network messages and broadcasts are transmitted over either single- or dual-channel communications connections. Dual-channel connections offer a redundant communications path that allows all network broadcasting and inter-control-unit functionality to continue with an open- or short-circuit fault or ground fault on one of the channels. Any fault in either a single- or dual-channel communications channel creates a network trouble condition.

2-7.2 Network Event Processing

Networked control units are programmed to listen to messages from other nodes but are not configured to identify where to send messages. Thus, a node can be programmed to process events as follows:

- Locally (i.e., in the control unit of origin only)
- Selectively from a subset of networked control units
- Globally from all control units in the network.

Processing of network events extends to all ancillary equipment such as Remote Display Control Modules (RDCMs) and Annunciator Terminal Modules (ATMs) associated with a designated subset of control units when selective event broadcasting is chosen. Network event processing extends to all such equipment associated with every control unit when the network is configured for global-event broadcasting.

The configuration of event processing is accomplished by the Group parameter and the 'Log All Network Events' parameter described in later sections.

The default operation for a control unit's event processing is globally from all control units in the network.

2-7.3 Operator Control

Operator intervention to acknowledge events, silence notification appliances and perform resets is configurable to operate:

- Locally in the control unit of origin only
- Selectively in a subset of the networked control units
- Globally in all control units in the network.

Operator intervention capability extends to all ancillary equipment such as Remote Display Control Modules (RDCMs) and Annunciator Terminal Modules (ATMs) associated with a designated subset of control units when selective operator control is used. It extends to all such equipment associated with every control unit when the network is configured for global operator control.

The configuration of acknowledge button processing is accomplished by the Group parameter and the 'Log All Network Events' parameter described in Paragraph 2-7.7. The configuration of silence button processing is accomplished by the Group parameter and the 'Network Silence Event' parameter described in Paragraph 2-7.7. The configuration of reset button processing is accomplished by the Group parameter and the 'Network Reset Event' parameter described in Paragraph 2-7.7.

The default operation for operator control is globally to all control units in the network.

2-7.4 Event Recording

Each control unit is configurable to record events as follows:

- Locally from its directly-monitored peripheral devices and output circuits only
- Selectively from a subset of networked control units
- Globally from all control units in the network.

The default operation for event recording is globally from all control units in the network.

2-7.5 Event Output Control (EOC)

A control unit within a network shall only have the capability of defining output control and subsequently activating the outputs that are physically a part of the control unit. However, the output control can be based on inputs that reside on other control units within the network. These inputs can be:

- Local SLC based detectors and inputs
- Selected from a subset of networked control units' SLC- and IIM-based detectors and inputs
- Global from all networked control units' SLC- and IIM-based detectors and inputs.

Configuring networked EOC is accomplished using EOC programming, the Group 'Log All Network Events' and (to a limited extent) the 'Network Reset Event' as well as 'Network Silence Event' parameters described in Paragraph 2-7.7.

The default operation for event-output control is global from all control units in the network.

Note: Only alarms originating on the local control unit and configured to activate the General Alarm List Outputs can activate General Alarm List Outputs.

2-7.6 Network Groups

The network group concept is used to create autonomous sub-networks within the overall set of networked control units. These groups may be programmed to respond selectively as separate entities in terms of event reporting, event output control, acknowledgement of events, alarm silencing, and system resets. There are 32 possible groupings, numbered 0 to 31. By default, all control units in the network have no pre-assigned group number.

A sub-network group operates as described below when it is assigned a non-zero group number. Each control unit in a group is able to:

- Display and log all events that take place in any control unit in the group
- Process an event-acknowledgement command from any control unit in the group for any event that occurs in the group when the acknowledge button is pressed on any control unit in the group
- Process an alarm-silence command from any control unit in the group and de-energize any silenceable outputs on the control unit
- Process a reset command from any control unit in the group once all activated initiating devices have been cleared of their alarm condition(s)
- Execute local output-activation commands based on events from any or all other control units in the group

A network is configured for global operations when no network sub-groups are defined.

2-7.7 Network Group 0

Group 0 can be used to create a 'master' type controlling node in the control unit network. Depending on how many masters are needed, one or more control units in the network should be assigned to Network Group 0 and 'Log All Network Events' should be enabled. Disable 'Network Silence Event' and 'Network Reset Event' on the master node(s) unless the master node(s) can be reset by non-master nodes. All non-master nodes should be assigned group numbers and 'Network Silence Event' and 'Network Reset Event' enabled. 'Log All Network Events' should be disabled on the non-master nodes.

The master control unit is capable of the following interactions with all sub-groups in a selectively-signaling network:

- Displaying and logging all network events from all network groups
- Issuing acknowledge, silence, and reset commands to all control units in all network groups
- Activating its outputs upon any initiating event from all control units in all network groups




Figure 2-38. Typical Network with Groups and Master Node in Group 0

Figure 2-38 shows the possible interactions among the various members of a selectivelysignaling networked system with groupings and with one control unit designated as the master control unit.

2-7.8 Network Settings




Figure 2-39. Network Node Settings

Select the "Network" tab to define the operating characteristics of each control unit in the network; Figure 2-39 displays.

Node Number - sets the unique idenitifer to each panel on the network . Valid settings are 1-32. A value of "0" disables netowrking on this node.

Channel - set the communication channel(s) that the control unit uses to communicate. The entire network should use the same channel configuration.

Time Synch Period – the periodic interval where the time and date on all nodes is synchronized. The time is entered in seconds. Valid settings are 0 (for disabled) or any value from 10 minutes (600 seconds) to 32767 seconds.

Network Reset Event – defines whether or not a control unit can be reset remotely by another node on the network.

Network Silence Event – defines whether or not a control unit can be silenced remotely by another node on the network.

Log All Network Events – defines whether or not a control unit processes events and key presses from any remote node on the network. If this parameter is not set, the control unit only processes events from nodes in the same group.

2-8.1 Central Station

The operations of the programmable relays default to the following off-normal states when the Central Station option is selected:

Programmable Relay No.	Off-Normal State
1	Alarm
2	Supervisory

The transmission of a loss of AC-power trouble signal to the central station can be delayed for up to 12 hours when the Central Station option is enabled.

2-8.2 Drill Notification Pattern

The following coded patterns can be selected from the "Drill Notification Pattern" drop-down menu:

Note: These patterns are not available for intelligent NACs.

- 60 beats per minute (bpm)
- 120 bpm
- Temporal per ANSI S3.41
- Steady (i.e., non-coded).

All control unit based NACs programmed for a coded drill signal utilizes the pattern that is selected from this drop-down menu.

Note: The same drill notification pattern should be used for all control units in a networked system.

2-8.3 Timers




Figure 2-41. Global Timers Screen

1. Select the **<Timers>** button; Figure 2-41 displays.

The timing options on this screen are:

• AC Fail Delay.

The off-premises transmission of an AC-power failure to a central station via the trouble relay can be delayed by selecting the "Central Station" option on the Global Tab. The delay period is programmable from 0 to 180 minutes or from 0 to 12 hours in one-unit increments.

• Sequential Deactivation Timer.

A delay from 5 to 15 seconds can be inserted between successive deactivations of AOs configured for "Sequential Deactivation". Refer to Paragraph 2-3.2.

Alarm Verification Timer

Note: Do not use alarm verification for special extinguishing system applications.

The period of time (after an initial alarm report) that a smoke detector attempts to verify that the smoke signature at its location actually exceeds its alarm threshold can be programmed to confirm that the initial alarm report was valid. The alarm verification period is programmable from 60 to 180 seconds in one-second increments.

Note: Use the same global timers for all control units in a networked system.

• Positive Alarm Sequence (PAS) Timer

Note: Do not use PAS for special extinguishing system applications.

The PAS investigation period can be programmed from 0 to 180 seconds in onesecond increments. The initial PAS alarm report must be acknowledged within 15 seconds to activate the investigation period.

Note: Use the same global timers for all control units in a networked system.

2-8.4 General Alarm Outputs (GAO) List Screen

The General Alarm Outputs (GAO) list can be viewed by selecting the **<GAO List>** button. Figure 2-42 displays.

2-8.5 Isolation Macros


Two lists of initiating devices and/or output control devices/circuits can be created which can be isolated via a single menu selection. The list of inputs and/or outputs to be isolated are assigned to isolation macros that are created when either the "Macro 1" or "Macro 2" button is selected. The "Macro 1" button creates one list of isolation commands and the "Macro 2" button creates a second list that is independent of the first list. Each macro can process up to ten separate isolation commands. The specific isolation commands are executed when either the "Isolation Macro 1" or "Isolation Macro 2" menu option is selected. Refer to the FenwalNET 6000 Installation, Operation and Maintenance Manual, P/N 06-236529-001 for more information.

The isolation lists can include any of the following initiating devices, control modules or control unit based outputs individually or by address range:

- Automatic initiating devices
- Monitor modules
- Control modules
- Releasing circuits
- Notification-appliance circuits
- Combination notification appliance/releasing circuits
- Programmable relays
- HSSDs reporting via an IIM.
- Isolate the control unit from the network

Selecting the **<MACRO1>** button creates one list of isolation commands; selecting the **<MACRO2>** button creates a second list. Figure 2-43 displays.






Figure 2-47. Day/Night Time Definition Tab

2-10 STRINGS (STRINGS TAB)

A string is an alphanumeric text output that is activated by an event output control (EOC) execution statement (refer to Chapter 3 for information on EOC). The text in the string can be up to 40 alphanumeric characters in length, and displays on the second line of the control unit's display in lieu of the normal event message that would ordinarily be displayed as a result of the system event. The string variable is placed on the output side of the EOC statement, like any other physical or virtual output.

String variables are defined in the Strings tab, as shown in Figure 2-48. To enter a string:

- 1. Double-click on the string variable name.
- 2. Enter the alphanumeric text in the screen that displays.
- 3. Select **<OK>** to assign the text to the string variable.
- 4. Enter the string in the EOC statement, as required. See Chapter 3 for more information on EOC statements.

The 16 possible strings are prioritized for display by the string's number (i.e., String #16 is the highest priority and String #1 is the lowest priority). The active string with the highest string number is the only string displayed on the second line of the display. A string becomes inactive via a subsequent "NOT" operator, via the subsequent clearing of the non-latching initiating condition that triggered it, or via a system reset.

The next highest priority string that is active is displayed whenever a currently-displayed string is deactivated by a subsequent EOC statement (by using NSx on the right-hand side of an EOC line), or by the clearing of the initiating condition that triggered it.

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CHAPTER 3 EVENT OUTPUT CONTROL (EOC)

3-1 INTRODUCTION

The procedures in Chapter 2 discussed defining the scope of a specific application and assigning operating characteristics and functionality to SLC-based initiating and control devices and to control unit based output circuits. Chapter 3 discusses how to create the operating sequence (i.e., the initiating point to output device/circuit relationships) for a FENWALNET 6000 system.

3-1.1 Event Output Control

Event Output Control (EOC) is the set of instructions that are be executed in response to point specific alarm, supervisory, or trouble events. The objective is to trigger physical outputs (i.e., notification appliance circuits, release circuits and control modules) as the result of one or more initiating event(s) in accordance with the approved sequence of operations.

The general form of an EOC instruction is "expression=designated outputs".

If the expression is True, or non-zero, then activate "designated outputs".

An expression can be a simple argument (see Paragraph 3-2.1) or an compound argument (see Paragraph 3-2.2).

3-2 CONSTRUCTING ARGUMENTS

The constituents (i.e., variables) of the "expression" are of two general types:

- Independent variables that consist of physical initiating devices (automatic detectors or monitor modules). The types of physical initiating devices that are supported were discussed in Chapter 2.
- Dependent variables (i.e., Counting Identifiers or State Variables) that assume values during program execution. Dependent variables are incremented or change state as the result of some prior independent variable activation. They are placeholders either for the arguments that incremented them or for the execution of a specific EOC command.

Table 3-1 summaries the types of initiating devices and their effects on the system's physical and virtual outputs.

3-2.1 Simple Arguments

A simple argument consists of a single independent or dependent variable. The physical initiating devices are represented by their SLC address or IIM address. The designator "HSD" prefixes HSSD addresses when an IIM is used.

3-2.2 Compound Arguments

A compound argument consists of a combination of two or more simple arguments. Both independent and dependent variables can be combined in a compound argument.

The combining operators used to create compound arguments are shown in Table 3-2.

Each simple argument component of a compound argument constructed with "OR" or "THRU" Operators is capable of causing execution (or re-execution) of a particular EOC instruction. The 'OR' and '#' operators actually perform addition operations with the result being the sum of all terms that are active. This type of EOC instruction is executable or re-executable until all the simple argument components become true if the initiating devices are programmed for latching operation. Virtual outputs are capable of triggering the activation of physical outputs in another EOC statement when their value is changed. They are also capable of continuously reactivating these outputs when their value subsequently changes again if the outputs have been deactivated or silenced.

All simple argument components of a compound argument constructed with "AND" Operators must be true for the compound argument to be true.

The truth or falsehood of a compound argument follows the rules ordinary Algebra. More than one type of combining operator can be used to construct a particular compound argument. The hierarchy for operator execution is as follows:

- "THRU" operators
- Compound arguments in parenthesis
- "NOT" operators
- "AND" operators
- "OR" operators

Note: The "THRU" operator is the most tightly bound, even more than parentheses (i.e., one cannot code 3#(...) or (...)#4 in an EOC line).

Compound arguments are evaluated sequentially from left to right on an EOC statement when all operators are of equal hierarchy.

3-2.2.1 "AND" OPERATOR

In previous versions of the control unit, the '*' "AND" operator was strictly a logical operator resulting in a TRUE (1) or FALSE (0) value.

The "AND" operator has been modified and enhanced to provide support for resounding. The result of the 'X*Y' operation shall be the value of the greater of the two factors as long as both factors are non-zero. If more than two factors are involved, the factors are read and processed from left to right. For example,

1#10=I1

20#30=I2

50#60=C3

I1*I2*C3=SG1,I4

If detector 1 activates, detectors 25 and 26 activate and device 52 activates, then SG1 turns ON and I4 is set to 2. I2 is the greatest of the 3 non-zero variables.

Subsequently if detector 5 alarms, only the outputs of line 1 are processed, and I1 is set to 2. The result of line 4 remains equal to 2, so SG1 does not reactivate once it has been silenced.

If an additional device from the range 50#60 activates, the C3 variable remains TRUE (equal to 1), so the right hand side of line 4 again does not get processed.

Should another detector from 1#10 or 20#30 alarm, then line 4 result, and I4, becomes 3 and SG1 re-activates if it had been silenced.

When there's no change in state on the left hand side of the equation, the right hand side does not get processed. In order to assure processing of every change of state, additional 'C' variables and extra lines of EOC are necessary.

The 'C' variables are limited to values of 0(FALSE) or 1(TRUE), while I variables are set to values representing the result of evaluating the left hand side. These concepts along with the new "AND" definition are used to provide support for resounding crossed-zone applications.

Refer to the following example, using non-latching initiating devices.

- 1.1#10=I1,C1
- 2.20#30=I2,C2
- 3.50#60=I3,C3
- 4. NI1=NC1 \$ necessary to set C1 to zero when I1 goes to zero
- 5. NI2=NC2 \$ necessary to set C2 to zero when I2 goes to zero
- 6. NI3=NC3 \$ necessary to set C3 to zero when I3 goes to zero
- 7. I1*C2*C3=SG1,I4
- 8. C1*I2*C3=SG1,I5
- 9. C1*C2*I3=SG1,I6

Since the C variables can only be 0 or 1, lines 7, 8 and 9 result in the value of I1, I2 and I3 respectively, when all three are non-zero. Therefore, any changes of state in the three ranges are processed and SG1 resounded whenever necessary.

3-3 OUTPUTS

An output can be a physical output or a virtual output.

3-3.1 Physical Outputs

Physical outputs can be any of the following types:

• **Control Unit-Based Circuits**. The types of outputs that are supported, with symbolic representations, are listed in Table 3-3.

• **SLC-Based Modules.** The types of modules that are supported are as follows:

- Addressable Control Modules (AOs)
- Addressable Signal Modules (ASMs)
- Remote Releasing Modules (RRMs)

Note: Each SLC-based module is referenced by its signaling line circuit address.

• Remote, ATM Series Driver Modules. A specific ATM output is referenced as follows:

AMy:z

where:

y is the module address, 1 to 16

z is the specific output, 1 to 32.

Refer to Table 3-1 for how physical outputs track or do not track the activation states of their associated initiating devices.

3-3.2 Virtual Outputs

Virtual outputs consist of State Variable and Counting Identifiers. Counting Identifiers(Ix) follow the result of evaluating the left hand side of the EOC equation which can include being set to zero. Saved Variables (C) are zeroed ONLY at reset and system initialization or when a subsequent "NOT" operation is executed to reset them.

3-3.2.1 COUNTING IDENTIFIERS (IX)

A Counting Identifier, symbolized by Ix, is initially activated by the execution of a specific EOC statement. The Counting Identifier becomes a placeholder for the argument that activated it. It can then be used as a substitute for its triggering argument in a subsequent EOC statement to activate additional physical outputs or to operate on other dependent variables. It can also be used as a substitute for its triggering argument in an EOC function (see Paragraph 3-6). Counting Identifiers assume the initiating device type identities of the arguments that activated them and track the activation or non-activation states of their associated initiating device type arguments as shown in Table 3-1.

The values assigned to a Counting Identifier depend upon the type of argument that activated it. It assumes the value of a counter when it is associated with a compound argument constructed with "OR" or "THRU" Operators. It assumes the value of "One" ("TRUE) or "Zero" ("FALSE") when it is associated with a simple argument, with an argument constructed exclusively with Save State Variables (see Paragraph 3-3.2.2) or with an argument constructed exclusively with the Initiating Event Counting Function (see Paragraph 3-6.15).

Consider the following example of the use of a Counting Identifier as a substitute for a set of 100 alarm initiating devices addressed from 1 to 100, and therefore used as a counter:

The value of I1 could range anywhere from 0 to 100 depending upon the number of concurrent and active alarm initiating events that occur within the set of 100 alarm initiating devices. Equation 3-1 represents a common application for a Counting Identifier where it triggers the initial activation and subsequent resounding of a notification appliance circuit via a statement like the following upon the receipt of one or more alarm initiating events:

I1=SG1

(3-2)

(3-1)

Any subsequent alarm increments the Counting Identifier, which creates the ability to resound notification appliance circuit SG1 if silenced.

Now consider the following example of the use of a Counting Identifier as a substitute for the activation of two groups of alarm initiating devices, one in the address range 1 to 50 and the other in the address range 51 to 100:

1#50*51#100=I1 (3-3)

The value of I1 shall be "zero", "one", or more depending on how may detectors in the ranges of 1#50 and 51#100 are in alarm. This equation is not sufficient to handle resounding, please refer to section 3-2.2.1 for proper programming. Equation 3-3 represents a common application for a Counting Identifier where it triggers the activation of a Delay Function (see Paragraph 3-6.3 or Paragraph 3-6.4) for subsequent activation of outputs:

$$D(I1,30) = AR1$$
 (3-4)

The output AR1 is not activated by the Delay Function in Equation 3-4 if I1 becomes "Zero" prior to the expiration of the 30-second delay period. I1 returns to "Zero" if and when there are no longer detectors in alarm in the range 1#50 or the range 51#100.

It is good practice to use a separate Counting Identifier as a substitute for one and only one expression. A Counting Identifier being used as a counter and activated and incremented by multiple expressions is separately and independently incremented by each expression. Increments for the Counting Identifier triggered by different expressions are not cumulative. A Counting Identifier's current value is determined by the value assigned to it on the most recently executed EOC command. Likewise, the truth or falsehood assigned to a Counting Identifier is the value assigned to it on the most recently executed EOC command. It is a dangerous practice to use a Counting Identifier as a logical variable for two or more expressions, particularly where fire extinguishing systems and critical process control interlocks are concerned.

All Counting Identifiers are re-initialized either to zero or "FALSE" upon a system reset.

3-3.2.2 STATE VARIABLE (CX)

(

A State Variable, symbolized by Cx, is a binary, true or false variable that is initialized to the "FALSE" (equals 0) value upon EOC file upload. It can be subsequently set to the "TRUE" (equals 1) value by the execution of a particular EOC statement. Like the Counting Identifier, the State Variable becomes a placeholder for the argument that activated it. Accordingly, it can then be used as a substitute for its triggering argument in a subsequent EOC statement to activate additional physical outputs or to operate on other dependent variables. It can also be used as a substitute for its triggering argument in an EOC function (see Paragraph 3-6).

State Variables assume the initiating device type identities of the arguments that activated them, but do not track the activation or non-activation states of their associated initiating device type arguments as shown in Table 3-1. A State Variable, once activated and assigned a "TRUE" value, can only be re-assigned to its initial "FALSE" value by the subsequent execution of another EOC statement that re-initializes it to "FALSE" via the "NOT" Operator (see Paragraph 3-5) or a successful system reset operation.

Do not use State Variables as counters to be associated with a compound argument constructed with "OR" or "THRU" Operators. They do not count, but only become "TRUE" (1).

Consider the following example of the use of a State Variable as a substitute for the activation of two alarm initiating devices anywhere in the address range 1 to 100 (see Paragraph 3-6.15 for a description of the Initiating Event Counting Function):

$$1\#100>1=C1$$
 (3-5)

The value of C1 is either "TRUE" or "FALSE" depending upon the truth or falsehood of the left hand side of Equation 3-5. The equation represents a common application for a State Variable where it triggers the activation of a Delay Function (see Paragraph 3-6.3 or Paragraph 3-6.4) for subsequent activation of outputs:

$$D(C1,30) = AR1$$
 (3-6)

The output AR1 is activated unconditionally by the Delay Function in Equation 3-6 unless the State Variable C1 is re-initialized to "FALSE" by the execution of a subsequent EOC statement with an output "NC1" prior to the expiration of the 30-second delay period. See Paragraph 3-5 for a description of the "NOT" Operator.

All State Variables are re-initialized to "FALSE" upon a system reset.

3-4 MULTIPLE OUTPUTS

A simple output consists of the activation or de-activation of one physical or virtual output. A compound output consists of the activation or de-activation (or some combination of both operations) of two or more physical or virtual outputs.

The operators used to create compound outputs are listed in Table 3-4.

Table 3-4. Combining Operators for Outputs

Outputs activated by alarm events latch into the activated state regardless of whether the initiating device is configured for latching or Non-Latching operation, except when they are programmed for thermal cycling or time limit cutout operation. Outputs activated by either supervisory or trouble events follow the activation state of the initiating device or fault condition that activated them (i.e., they de-activate when the initiating device restores or the fault condition is corrected).

Exception: Cyclical alarm outputs can only be activated for the ITLCO and CTLCO periods as discussed in Paragraph 2-3.6.

3-5 THE "NOT" OPERATOR

Physical outputs can be deactivated with the "NOT" (N) Operator triggered subsequently by the execution of another EOC statement. An activated (i.e., set to "TRUE") State Variable (Cx) can also be de-activated (i.e., re-initialized to "FALSE") by the "NOT" (N) Operator. A Counting Identifier (Ix), when used as a counter, can only be incremented in an EOC statement. It can never decrement, and therefore cannot be used with the "NOT" Operator as a negated virtual output.

The "NOT" Operator can be used in an argument where it checks for the absence of an initiating signal from a physical device or for the falsehood of a Counting Identifier (Ix) or a State Variable (Cx).

3-6 FUNCTIONS

An EOC Function activates outputs for a particular set of initiating conditions, delays execution of outputs for a certain period of time, modifies automatic initiating device thresholds, or alters outputs in a specific way when an argument activates. The following EOC functions are available:

3-6.1 Alarm Threshold Adjustment Function (Smoke Detectors Only)

The Alarm Threshold Adjustment Function changes the alarm thresholds of one group (*arg2*) of smoke detectors as the result of an alarm signal from any smoke detector in a second group (*exp1*) of detectors. The format of this function is:

exp1=x.y=Aarg2

where:

exp1 is an alarm initiating event or a combination of alarm initiating events

x.y is the new alarm threshold in percent per foot obscuration

arg2 is the range of smoke detectors whose alarm thresholds are to be adjusted

The adjusted alarm thresholds revert to programmed, standby thresholds upon system reset, or when *exp1* is a Non-Latching initiating device(s) or a Counting Identifier that subsequently goes false.

3-6.2 Pre-Alarm Threshold Adjustment Function (Smoke Detectors Only)

The Pre-Alarm Threshold Adjustment Function changes the pre-alarm thresholds of one group (*arg2*) of smoke detectors as the result of a pre-alarm signal from any smoke detector in a second group (*exp1*) of detectors. The format of this function is:

where:

exp1 is a pre-alarm initiating event or a combination of pre-alarm initiating events

x.y is the new pre-alarm threshold in percent-per-foot obscuration

arg2 is the range of smoke detectors whose pre-alarm thresholds are to be adjusted

The adjusted pre-alarm thresholds revert to programmed, standby thresholds upon system reset or when *exp1* subsequently goes false.

3-6.3 Delayed Output Activation Function

The Delayed Output Activation Function delays the activation of *outputs* being activated by an alarm initiating condition (exp) for a specified period of time (delay). The format of this function is:

D(exp,delay) = outputs

(non-repeatable)

where:

exp is an initiating event or a combination of initiating events

delay is the delay in seconds before outputs are activated

Note: The control unit automatically adds 3 seconds to the period of time specified in the *delay* parameter.

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

The Delayed Output Activation Function tracks the validity of the expression (*exp*) and interrupt its countdown, reset the delay period, and perform no actions if the argument becomes either "Zero" (in the case of a Counting Identifier) or "FALSE" (in the case of a State Variable or of an explicit argument).

An alarm argument latches the physical outputs associated with the Delayed Output Activation Function when the time delay period expires. Virtual Outputs and all other physical outputs not activated by alarm initiating events track the validity of the expression, and either are "Zero" or "FALSE" in the case of Virtual Outputs or de-energize in the case of physical outputs if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g., in the case of tracking non-latching supervisory events) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit simple or compound trouble argument).

3-6.4 Delayed Output Activation Function (with Abort Interruption)

The Delayed Output Activation Function with Abort Interruption delays the activation of *outputs* being activated by an alarm initiating condition (*exp*) for a specified period of time (*delay*). The activation of any abort switch (*abort addresses*) interrupts the countdown delay and prevent outputs activation while the abort switch is active (see Paragraph 2-3.11.1 for exception when IRI Abort Option is selected). The format of this function is:

D(exp, delay, abort addresses)=outputs

where:

exp is an alarm initiating event or a combination of alarm initiating events

delay is the delay in seconds before outputs are activated

Note: The control unit automatically adds 3 seconds to the period of time specified in the *delay* parameter.

abort addresses is the comma delimited list of abort switch addresses

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

The Delayed Output Activation Function (with Abort Interruption) tracks the validity of the expression (*exp*) and interrupts its countdown, reset the delay period, and perform no actions if the expression becomes "FALSE".

The activation of any abort switch in the abort switch list prior to the expiration of the countdown timer interrupts the countdown of the timer in accordance with the operating characteristics of the abort switch. Refer to Paragraph 2-3.11.1 for abort switch operating instructions.

Note: Countdown timer interruption is not allowed after the countdown timer has begun to count down if the IRI option is selected.

All outputs associated with the Delayed Output Activation Function (with Abort Interruption) latch upon expiration of the time delay period.

3-6.5 Trouble Function for Initiating Devices

The Trouble Function for Initiating Devices activates *outputs* when a trouble condition occurs as defined in *exp*.

T(exp) = outputs

where:

exp is a trouble report from an initiating device or a combination of trouble reports from initiating devices

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

The Trouble Function for Initiating Devices tracks the validity of the expression (*exp*) and deenergizes its associated outputs if the expression becomes "FALSE".

3-6.6 General Trouble Function

The General Trouble Function activates *outputs* when any system trouble condition occurs.

GT=outputs

where:

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

The General Trouble Function tracks the Trouble State of the control unit and de-energizes its associated outputs when the Trouble State clears.

3-6.7 General Supervisory Function

The General Supervisory Function activates *outputs* when any system supervisory condition occurs.

GS=outputs

where:

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

The General Supervisory Function tracks the Supervisory State of the control unit and deenergizes its associated outputs when the Supervisory State clears.

3-6.8 Pre-Alarm Function for Initiating Devices

The Pre-Alarm Function for Initiating Devices activates *outputs* when a pre-alarm condition occurs as defined in *exp*.

P(exp)=outputs

where:

exp is an pre-alarm initiating event or a combination of pre-alarm initiating events.

(These are Level-2 Pre-Alarm events for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM.)

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

The Pre-Alarm Function for Initiating Devices tracks the validity of the expression (*exp*) and de-energizes its associated outputs if the expression becomes "FALSE".

3-6.9 Warning Function for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM

The Warning Function for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM activates *outputs* when a Level-1 Pre-Alarm condition occurs as defined in *arg*.

W(arg)=outputs

where:

arg is an AnaLASER II Level-1 Pre-Alarm initiating event or a combination of AnaLASER II Level-1 Pre-Alarm initiating events

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits or virtual outputs.

The Warning Function for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM tracks the validity of the argument (*arg*) and de-energizes its associated outputs if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g, in the case of tracking warning signals from HSSDs via a counting identifier) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit compound argument representing an HSSD warning event).

3-6.10 Level-2 Alarm Function for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM

The Level-2 Alarm Function for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM activates *outputs* when a Level-2 Alarm condition occurs as defined in *arg*.

X(*arg*)=*outputs*

where:

arg is an AnaLASER II Level-2 Alarm initiating event or a combination of AnaLASER II Level-2 Alarm initiating events

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits or virtual outputs.

The Level-2 Alarm Function for AnaLASER IIs reporting via the IIM latches the physical outputs associated it. Virtual outputs track the validity of the argument and is non-incremental or "FALSE" in the case of Non-Latching Identifiers if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g., in the case of tracking non-latching HSSDs) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit simple or compound argument or a Non-Latching Identifier substituting for a non-latching, compound HSSD Level-2 alarm event).

3-6.11 Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function to 60 BPM

This function changes a NAC's signal pattern to 60 beats per minute.

SGx/60

where:

SGx is a control unit-based notification appliance circuit.

An alarm event or an irrevocable event such as the expiration of a delayed-alarm output activation function (with abort interruption) latches the associated notification appliance circuit to 60 BPM via the Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function. The NAC in all other cases tracks the validity of the argument and de-energizes if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g., in the case of tracking non-latching supervisory events) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit simple or compound argument or a Virtual Output substituting for a compound trouble argument).

Exception: Cyclical alarm outputs activate only for the ITLCO and CTLCO periods as discussed in Paragraph 2-3.6.

Note: Do Not use this function for Intelligent NACs.

3-6.12 Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function to 120 BPM

This function changes a NAC's signal pattern to 120 beats per minute.

SGx/120

where:

SG*x* is a control unit-based notification appliance circuit.

An alarm event or an irrevocable event such as the expiration of a delayed-alarm output activation function (with abort interruption) latches the associated notification appliance circuit to 120 BPM via the Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function. The NAC in all other cases tracks the validity of the argument and de-energizes if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g., in the case of tracking non-latching supervisory events) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit simple or compound argument or a Virtual Output substituting for a compound trouble argument).

Exception: Cyclical alarm outputs are activated only for the ITLCO and CTLCO periods as discussed in Paragraph 2-3.6.

Note: Do Not use this function for Intelligent NACs.

3-6.13 Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function to Temporal Coding

This function changes a NAC's signal pattern to the temporal code.

SGx/T

where:

SG*x* is a control unit-based notification appliance circuit.

An alarm event or an irrevocable event such as the expiration of a delayed-alarm output activation function (with abort interruption) latches the associated notification appliance circuit to temporal coding via the Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function. The NAC in all other cases tracks the validity of the argument and de-energizes if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g., in the case of tracking non-latching supervisory events) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit simple or compound argument or a Virtual Output substituting for a compound trouble argument).

Exception: Cyclical alarm outputs are activated only for the ITLCO and CTLCO periods as discussed in Paragraph 2-3.6.

Note: Do Not use this function for Intelligent NACs.

3-6.14 Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function to Continuous Output

This function changes a NAC's signal pattern to a steady (i.e., non-coded) output.

SGx/C

where:

SGx is a control unit-based notification appliance circuit.

An alarm event or an irrevocable event such as the expiration of a delayed-alarm output activation function (with abort interruption) latches the associated notification appliance circuit to continuous output via the Notification Appliance Pattern Change Function. The NAC in all other cases tracks the validity of the argument and de-energize if the argument becomes either non-incremental (e.g., in the case of tracking non-latching supervisory events) or "FALSE" (e.g., in the case of an explicit simple or compound argument or a Virtual Output substituting for a compound trouble argument).

Exception: Cyclical alarm outputs are activated only for the ITLCO and CTLCO periods as discussed in Paragraph 2-3.6.

Note: Do Not use this function for Intelligent NACs.

3-6.15 Initiating Event Counting Function

A special EOC Function is the Counting Function for Initiating Devices and Counting Variables (>n) whose general form is illustrated below. Outputs activate when the number of single or combinations of alarm initiating events as defined in *exp* exceeds *n*.

(exp)>n=outputs

where:

exp is an initiating event, a combination of initiating events or a virtual output.

n is the number of initiating events required to activate the outputs.

outputs are SLC-based modules, control unit-based circuits, a string or virtual outputs.

Note: The above initiating expression, i.e., (exp) > n, can be used with other simple arguments and the "OR" and "AND" Operators discussed in Paragraph 3-2.2 to create compound arguments. It can also be used as all or part of the arguments described in Paragraph 3-6.1 through Paragraph 3-6.5. Refer to Table 3-5 for special requirements when creating compound arguments with the Initiating Event Counting Function.

An alarm argument latches the physical outputs associated with the Initiating Event Counting Function when the designated count is exceeded.

3-7 CONSTRUCTING ARGUMENTS FOR INITIATING EVENTS FROM REMOTE, NETWORKED CONTROL UNITS

Arguments that consist of initiating events from remote, networked control units must be prefixed with the letter F, the network node number, and a colon (i.e., :).

3-7.1 Remote-Node Simple Arguments

A remote-node simple argument consists of the network-node prefix and the three-digit SLC or HSSD address of the initiating device on the remote node. For example, a simple argument using the initiating device at Address 21 on Node 3 would be referenced in any other node as follows:

• F3:021

The designator "HSD" prefixes HSSD addresses when an IIM is used for the remote node.

3-7.2 Remote-Node Compound Arguments

A remote-node compound argument consists of a combination of two or more simple arguments. However, there is one instance where it is not necessary to prefix all the simple arguments with the letter F, the network node number, and a colon. The "THRU" Combining Operator should be used as follows to reference all initiating points at addresses 1 through 20 on Node 2 in any other node:

• F2:1#20.

All other compound arguments that reference remote-node initiating devices require that all the remote-node initiating devices be prefixed with the letter F, the network node number, and a colon. For example, references to initiating points 8, 12, and 15 on Node 1 would be entered in any other node as follows:

- F1:8+F1:12+F1:15.
- F1:8*F1:12*F1:15.

A complete summary of EOC operators and functions, with specific examples of usage, is presented in Table 3-5.

3-7.3 Remote State Variable (Fy:Cx)

The Cx State Variables described above can be used across networked control units. The proper usage of this feature is an operator 'Fy:Cx', where 'y' is a valid node number and 'x' is a valid 'C' variable number used on the 'y' node. These network state variables are processed the same way non-networked state variables are processed by the control unit. Whenever the state variable changes on the originating node, a network message is generated with the new value, "TRUE" or "FALSE", of the variable. When control units receive the C variable network messages, the local EOC is processed.

There is no verification between control unit configurations, so it is imperative that the EOC programs for different nodes sharing state variables are manually and thoroughly reviewed to be sure there are no errors.

'Fy:Cx' cannot be used on the right hand side of EOC equations. Control units cannot change state variables originating on other nodes. Networked state variables are read only.







3-9 STRUCTURING EVENT OUTPUT CONTROL

In general, one EOC statement needs to be written for each input-to-output operating sequence required for the specific application. Up to 256 EOC statements can be used for any application, and an EOC statement can have up to 128 characters. Use the following guidelines to construct an EOC application:

- 1. Arrange the sequence of EOC statements from the start to the end of the application according to the following event priority:
 - Alarm
 - Supervisory
 - Trouble

Note: All alarm events must be annunciated by public mode notification.

- 2. Put the most likely to be executed statements at the start of the prioritized segments above. This means that statements with simple arguments or compound arguments constructed with either "OR" (+) or "THRU" (#) Operators should be entered first in each prioritized segment.
- 3. Use a separate Counting Identifier or State Variable for each compound argument that is used on more than one EOC statement.
- 4. Never use a Counting Identifier to trigger outputs unless it has been defined first in a prior EOC statement.
- 5. If possible, activate physical and virtual outputs in the same EOC statement to keep the number of statements to as few as possible.
- 6. Write the pre-release, release, and post-release EOC statements on consecutive lines for each special extinguishing system. A separate pre-release statement is typically required because release outputs are not activated until after the expiration of a time delay. Enter these statements in ascending order according to the more progressively serious alarm condition (i.e., write the pre-alarm statement first, the pre-release statement second, and the release statement third).

Note: The following requirements apply to special extinguishing systems:

- The pre-alarm state must be annunciated by distinctive public mode notification.
- The pre-release state must be annunciated by public mode notification different from the pre-alarm state public notification mode.
- The release state must be annunciated by public mode notification different from both the pre-alarm state and pre-release state public notification modes.
- 7. The manual release station(s) for a special extinguishing system must appear in the arguments of the pre-alarm, pre-release, and release statements for the system if required interlocks such as door closures, airflow shutoff, and power down procedures are distributed throughout these three alarm stages.
- 8. Place the least likely to be executed statements at the end of the prioritized segments in 1). For example, open area smoke detectors are more likely to activate before duct detectors because of the high smoke dilution factors associated with duct detection. Therefore statements associated with duct detectors should be entered after the statements associated with open area detectors and after any special extinguishing system execution statements.
- 9. Add in remote alarm-initiating events from other networked control units according to the guidelines 2) through 7), but add them after the control unit's local events. Arrange remote alarm-initiating events in ascending order by network node number.
- 10. It is recommended that the terms involved in contiguous "ANDing" be limited to only one term that can have a value of more than 1, and the rest limited to logical "TRUE" or "FALSE" only. For example, 'I1 * NI2 * N(10#40)' is good because only I1 can have a value greater than 1 (NI2 and N(10#40) is always "TRUE" or "FALSE). However, '10#40 * I3' is not acceptable because both factors can be greater than 1.

Refer to section 3-2.2.1 for more information.

3-10 EVENT OUTPUT CONTROL EXAMPLES

Table 3-6 illustrates specific example of event output control. This is a two-zone waterless suppression system with associated pre-action sprinkler systems. Refer to Appendix A for the sequence of operation and device/circuit configuration associated with this application.

A four-zone deluge sprinkler system is being designed according to the following water supply constraints:




Figure 3-7. Tracking NAC

The system shown in Figure 3-7 is to be designed according to the following criteria:

- Deactivate NAC if all alarmed HSSDs issue alarm off reports
- Latch the NAC into the active state if any spot type smoke detector alarms.

3-11.3 External Maintenance Bypass Switch Example

An end user wants to provide service personnel with a simplistic way to prevent the activation of notification appliances during facility maintenance periods. The user wants to use an externally mounted switch to accomplish this requirement. The necessary sequence of operation is as follows:

- The NAC shall activate if an automatic detector alarms and the maintenance bypass switch has not been activated
- The NAC shall not activate if an automatic detector alarms subsequently to the activation of the maintenance bypass switch
- The NAC shall deactivate if the maintenance bypass switch is activated subsequently to an automatic detector alarm.




Figure 3-8. Maintenance Bypass Switch

The AI monitor module for the maintenance bypass switch is configured as a non-latching supervisory initiating device. Figure 3-8 illustrates the application.

CHAPTER 4 COMMUNICATIONS TO CONTROL UNIT

4-1 INTRODUCTION




Figure 4-1. Tools Menu

An application created via the procedures described in Chapters 2 and 3 must be uploaded to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit to establish a working fire protection system. The utility programs in the Tools Menu are used to communicate with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit. Figure 4-1 shows the selections in the Tools Menu.




Figure 4-2. FCS Main Toolbar

Most of the utilities in the Tools Menu can also be accessed via the toolbar on the main screen. Figure 4-2 defines each of the icons.


4-1.1 Hardware Connections

Use either a laptop or desktop computer to upload the applications program to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit. The computer must have a USB or RS232 communications port.

Set the serial-port baud rate to 9600, and use communications cable P/N 74-100016-003 to communicate with the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit via the computer's serial port.

Use a standard USB communications cable to connect to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit via the computer's USB port.

Figure 4-3 illustrates a typical control unit-to-laptop configuration.





4-1.2 Communications Setup




Figure 4-4. Communications Settings

Select **Tools>Communication Setup** from the main screen to select the communication port and define options when selecting an RS-232 serial port on the computer to transfer data to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit. In response, the communication settings (Figure 4-4) are displayed.

4-1.3 Sending a Configuration

Select **Tools>Send Configuration** to send a particular application (that was created via the methodology described in Chapter 2 and Chapter 3) to the FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit. The FENWALNET 6000 Control Unit then assumes the responsibility of monitoring the SLC and other peripheral devices that have been specified in the application file, and carries out the instructions that are encoded in the EOC statements. Alternatively, select the Send Configuration Icon (

If only one configuration file is open, the password prompt (Figure 4-7) is displayed; if more than one configuration file is open, the select configuration dialog box (Figure 4-5) is displayed and the appropriate configuration file to upload must be selected.





 - **Note:** When sending/receiving configurations to/from remote networked control units, the time to complete the operation is considerably longer than a direct upload/ download. When a networked node is executing a local upload or download with FCS, it does not communicate on the network. Network communication troubles annunciate on other nodes during the process.

Following selection of the configuration file, FCS immediately displays the password prompt (Figure 4-7) for **Single Control Unit** installations.




Figure 4-13. Receive Configuration Progress






Figure 4-16. Select Node and Enter Password - Get Sensitivity Levels





Figure 4-21. Clear Event Log Progression




Figure 4-25. Enter Password




Figure 4-27. Receive Event Log Progression

APPENDIX B NEW YORK CITY ABORT SEQUENCE

B-1 INTRODUCTION

The following EOC program example demonstrates a typical method of supporting the unique N.Y.C. suppression system abort sequence. Use of this program negates the need for any external equipment to control the notification appliances.

B-2 GENERAL DISCUSSION

This discussion is based on a typical single suppression zone, as illustrated in Figure B-1. The room contains: six smoke detectors, one manual release station, one abort station, one power shutdown and one HVAC shutdown.

B-2.1 Sequence of Operation

- Any detector–Activate the bell.
- Second smoke detector alarm–Turn off bell, turn on horn (pulsing), turn on strobe (steady), begin (30 second) discharge delay, shut down power, shut down HVAC.
- When timer counts down–Discharge agent, turn on strobes (steady) and horn/strobe (steady).
- Abort Active–Turn off horn, turn off strobe, turn on bell and add 90 seconds to initial time delay.

B-2.2 System Configuration

The configuration of the system depicted in Figure B-1 contains the following hardware with assigned addresses:

- Six Smoke Detectors (1 through 6)
- One Abort Station (7)
- One Manual Release Station (8)
- One Bell (SG1)
- One Horn Circuit (SG2)
- Two Strobes on one circuit (SG3)
- Two Release Devices on one circuit (AR1)




Figure B-1. New York City Installation

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APPENDIX C

FN6000 FIRMWARE UPGRADE INSTRUCTIONS

C-1 INTRODUCTION

Follow the procedures below to upgrade the FN6000 Control Unit firmware.

If you experience any problems when executing these procedures, please call Fenwal Technical Support, (866) 287-2531.

C-2 PREPARATION

- 1. Download your current configuration from the control unit to the PC using the latest PC Configuration Software. Save the file.
- 2. Download the event log and save as a text file.
- 3. In order to use USB for this operation, make sure the USB driver has been previously installed. (see the User CD for instructions to install the driver).

C-3 UPGRADE THE CONTROL UNIT

- 1. With the control unit powered down, connect your PC to the panel via a USB or RS232 cable.
- 2. Insert the Upgrade CD into the CD ROM drive.
- 3. Browse, locate, and execute 'loadSLCC.bat' on the CD.

Note: Perform steps 4 through 6 quickly, as you only have 10-15 seconds to start the load.

- 4. Connect Power to the panel.
- 5. Pause a moment and select 'Program" (if using USB, allow time for the PC to detect the panel as a USB device)
- 6. Select the appropriate COM port and click "Ok".
- 7. After a few seconds, the Control Unit displays "ERASING OLD CODE".
- 8. The Control Unit display indicates 'LOADING COMPLETED' along with confirmation from the PC
- 9. Observe the LCD display on the Control Unit until you see "SYSTEM" "INITIALIZING" on the top line and the versions "y.y.y/1.2.0" on the bottom line (where y.y.y is the existing version of the FN6000).
- 10. Allow the panel to continue its boot, and it will eventually report "Date and Time Not Set" and "SLC Not Monitoring" faults.
- 11. The Control Unit is now upgraded. Exit the PCISP program.

The Control Unit configuration will be set to defaults by the upgrade operation. You must now upload the saved configuration using the newest version of the FCS 6000 Configuration Software.
